



## Plains-Grown Watermelons Affected By Too Much Rain

Too much rainfall in too short a time span has limited the crop currently being processed by Anderson Produce and a new company, "What-A-Melon".

Watermelons grown in the Plains area were ready for shipment early in August. The short crop expected for 1988 resulted not only in too much rain but was also affected by too many mornings with lots of dew. The season is expected to be finished by the first of October rather than the normal season of about one more month.

A family oriented business, Anderson Produce is owned by Deroy Anderson. Helping him operate are his son, Todd, and son-in-law, Guy Jones. Anderson's wife, Gerry, and daughter, Teretha Jones, man the office. Another daughter, Tamyia also helps out.

Todd Anderson and Jones formed their own company, "What-A-Melon", this year.

Farmers who grew watermelons for Anderson Produce and "What-A-Melon" this season were Macky

McWhirter, Eddie Earnest, Ronnie Johnson and Neal Newsom.

McWhirter planted 60 acres of seedless watermelons this year. Seedless melons have been on the market about eight years with limited production. Growing in popularity, the small round, striped melons are very sweet with firm texture. They draw good demand from small families, restaurants and other institutions all over the United States and Canada.

## City Water Department To Complete Needed Repairs

## Boys Invited To Join Scouts


Little boys in the second through fifth grades are invited to join the Cub Scouts. An organizational



## From The Superintendent's Desk

As I have mentioned before, the students at Plains I.S.D. participate in many extra-curricular activities and are very successful in their efforts. We are proud of our students and their achievements and have confidence in their ability to succeed again in the 1988-89 school year.

Mention extra-curricular activities in Texas and most people's thoughts turn to Friday night football games in the fall. But extra-curricular activities mean more than just football. Other types of extra-curricular activities include various sports from basketball to baseball, track and field and volleyball to drill team and cheerleading.

Many extra-curricular activities extend beyond the sporting season. These might include such activities as Future Farmers of America, Future Homemakers of America, National Honor Society, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and Student Council.

Most extra-curricular activities in Texas are governed by the rules and regulations of the University Interscholastic League (UIL). Based in Austin, the UIL sanctions academic contests and band competitions as well as most public school athletic events in the state. All UIL rules and regulations must be approved by the State Board of Education. School sponsored activities are divided into three categories: Curricular, Co-curricular and Extra-curricular.

Curricular activities occur within the regular school day and are part of the instructional process.

Co-curricular activities are an extension of classroom instruction in which a majority of the class participates. They relate directly to the essential elements of the class and may include field trips, demonstrations, illustrations and observations. Co-curricular activities may occur during or outside the regular school day.

Extra-curricular activities are school-sponsored activities which are not directly related to instruction of the course curriculum. They may, however, have an indirect relation to some areas of the curriculum and include performances, contests, demonstrations, displays and club activities. All activities that are competitive or charge for admission are presumed to be extra-curricular. Any activity conducted in connection with an extra-curricular activity is also presumed to be extra-curricular.

A student is required to pass all of his or her courses to be eligible to participate in extra-curricular activities for the following six weeks grading period. A student who fails an honors course or a Texas Education Agency recognized advanced course may be exempted from this position, however, at the discretion of the school principal.

An informal study conducted by the Agency indicated the "no pass/no play rule" had succeeded in encouraging students interested in extra-curricular activities to take their classes more seriously and work harder in them.

Due to the cancellation of Ropes football program, Homecoming activities have been rescheduled for Oct. 14 against Anton. Plains is now scheduled to play Memphis at Floydada on Sept. 30 at 7:30 p.m. School will dismiss at 1:15 on this date.

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
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## Cowboys Scalp Morton Indians

OF PROPOSED  
**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
GENERAL ELECTION  
NOVEMBER 8, 1988

**PROPOSITION NO. 1  
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2  
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3  
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."



Oil shale is a dark, fine-grained rock that contains oil. The extraction process involves heating crushed shale until the oil in it is vaporized. This vapor is then condensed to form liquid shale oil. Major obstacles now are cost, technology and water.
