School Financing Legislation Program Topic For Tsa Mo Ga

J.B. Wilson, principal of Plains High School, was guest speaker Monday evening for the regular meeting of GFWC Tsa Mo Ga Club. He spoke to the group of the recent Texas Supreme Court decision concerning Edgewood vs Kirby.

Edgewood ISD filed suit against the State of Texas and Commissioner of Education William Kirby, May 23, 1984 charging the Texas system of school financing is unconstitutional. District Judge Harley Clark of Austin ruled April 29, 1987 that the method was unconstitutional and must be overhauled, Wilson explained.

That decision was overturned Dec. 14, 1988 when the Third Court of Appeals ruled that the system, while not fair to all students, does meet constitutional requirements. On Oct. 2, 1989, the Texas Supreme Court, in a 9-0 vote, threw out the state's \$11 billiona-year school finance system and ordered the legislature to design a new system by May 1, 1990.

Wilson added that Gov. Bill Clements has stated he will call a special session in the spring of 1990. He appointed a task force to study the issue. The District Court in Austin must approve the legislative financial plan.

Judge Clark will retire from the bench Dec. 1, 1989 requiring the governor to appoint a new judge to fill the vacancy. This new judge will determine the constitutionality of the legislative plan. Should the judge rule against the plan, he or she will then propose his or her own plan.

Following his address, Wilson answered questions concerning possible ramifications facing Plains ISD due to the Edgewood vs Kirby decision.

Connie McWhirter presented Wilson with a Texas Federation of

ABOVE GROUND PRECAUTIONS FOR

UNDERGROUND SERVICE

Transformers, junction boxes and meter pedestals for underground power lines are almost always installed above ground. Unless you are digging, trenching or drilling, you are not likely to come into contact with the buried conductor except where it enters an aboveground enclosure.

AVOID UNWANTED CONTACT WITH UNDERGROUND POWER:

Make sure that all transformer enclosures are kept locked - and alert your electric utility when they are not!

Never allow children to play on or near enclosures or other electrical facilities.

Don't allow garbage cans, junk or wood piles to be stacked on or near enclosures.

Don't allow contruction of fences or outbuilding to contact enclosures or to restrict access to them.

Immediately report any damage to enclosure structures or foundations to your electric utility.


Never assume that an enclosure is safe to touch - some damage may cause metal cabinets to become energized and dangerous.


Ex-Student Assoc. Looking For File



'Home of the Cowboys & Cowgirls'

From The Superintendent's Desk



This is the sixth in a series of eight articles based on research entitled "What Works at Home" that can be very beneficial to students if implemented in a home learning environment.

RESEARCH FINDING:

A good foundation in speaking and listening helps children become better readers.

When children learn to read, they are making a transition from spoken to written language. Reading instruction builds on conversational skills: the better children are at using spoken language, the more successfully they will learn to read written language. To succeed at reading, children need a basic vocabulary, some knowledge of the world around them, and the ability to talk about what they know. These skills enable children to understand written material more readily.

Research shows a strong connection between reading and listening. A child who is listening well shows it by being able to retell stories and repeat instructions. Children who are good listeners in kindergarten and first grade are likely to become successful readers by the third grade. Good fifth-grade listeners are likely to do well on aptitude and achievement tests in high school.

Parents and teachers need to engage children in thoughtful discussions on all subjects - current events, nature, sports, hobbies, machines, family life, and emotions - in short, on anything that interests children. Such discussions should not be limited to reading selections that are part of classwork.

Conversing with children about the world around them will help them reflect on past experiences and on what they will see, do, and read about in the future.

Speaking English at school is especially important for children who have not grown up speaking English.

EXERCISES:

1) If you have a tape recorder, have your children form the habit from early grades on of recording themselves reading aloud any papers they write. If they look at their papers while listening to their recording, they are more likely to catch errors and to recognize awkward sentences.

2) In many cities there are numbers you can dial to hear prayers, jokes, time and temperature, etc. Toddlers can improve their habits of listening, and sometimes learn some words, by listening to these.

3) Too much television can interfere with learning, but there are excellent children's programs on PBS and other educational channels or networks. Let your children spend their television time on these.

4) If your children are learning English (or Spanish, French, Latin, German, etc.) at school, have them become teachers for their family at home. Really listen and work to learn the materials they bring home. Let them know they are helping the family. If you have a tape recorder, use it to check everyone's progress with pronunciation and accent.

5) Elect your child "family messenger" and explain that the job is very important. Start with simple things like telling grandma "dinner is ready" and progress to taking telephone messages.
