Food Stamp Eligibility/AFDC Not Affected By Census Work

Announcement was made this week by the U.S. Department of Commerce that Texas and other states will allow people who receive aid for families with dependent children and persons on food stamps to do temporary work for the Bureau of the Census

Immunizations Set For Thursdays

Immunization clinics have been scheduled from 2 to 4 p.m. Thursdays in Denver City Community Building. Beginning Aug. 2, a clinic will be held in Plains in the clinic building every first Thursday of each month.

A fee of \$2 per person is charged. Anyone under 18 years of age must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Denver City clinics scheduled this summer include May 31; June 7, 14 and 28 (no clinic June 21) and July 5, 19 and 26 (none July 12).

The census bureau has a great need for short-term workers and the U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that food stamp recipients can do this work and still maintain food stamp allowance. The Family Support Administration of Health and Human Services has authorized a plan that allows those receiving aid for families with dependent children to also work for the census without losing benefits. Both exemptions are in effect from March 1 to Aug. 31, 1990.

Persons receiving food stamps or aid to families with dependent children are encouraged to consider short-term employment as census takers. For information about temporary employment, contact Joe Garcia, 1-800-742-8600. Workers will receive \$5.50 per hour plus mileage allowance of 24 cents per mile for any official use of a private vehicle.

Applicants must be 18 years old or older, a U.S. citizen and take a written test.

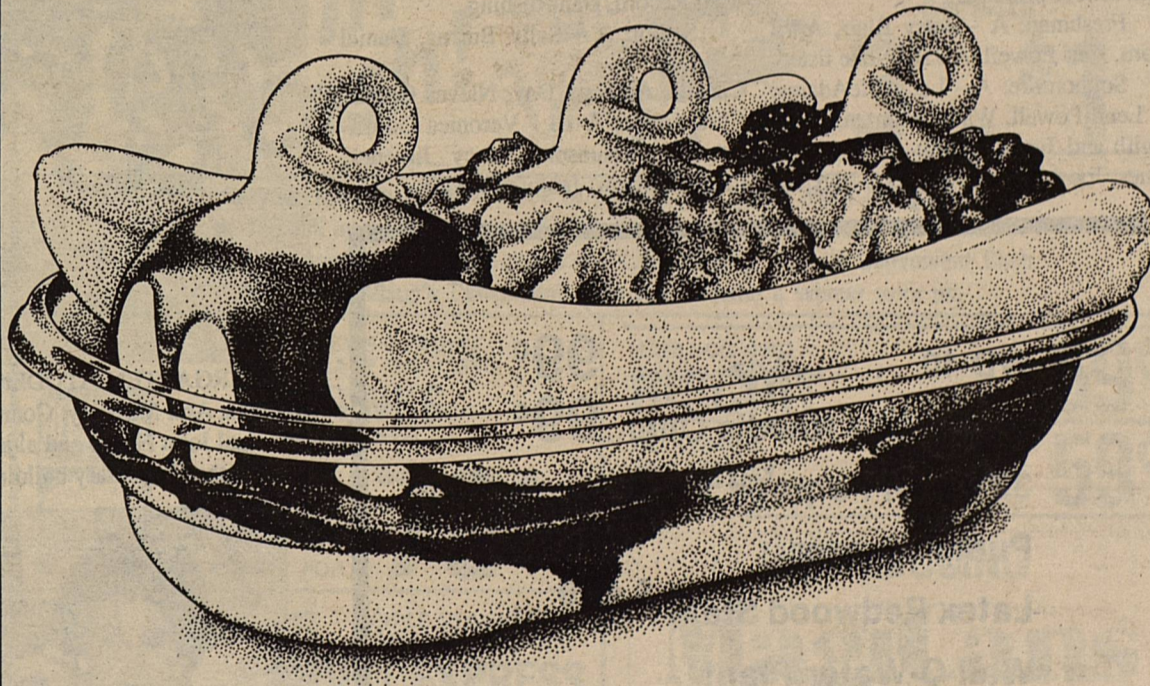

During the months of June and July, Plains Independent School District may seem to many people, a place of very little activity. That is probably the most misunderstood part of school business. Members of the "Class of 2002" planted a Golden Locust in front of the elementary school building May 22. Assisting them were teachers and parents.

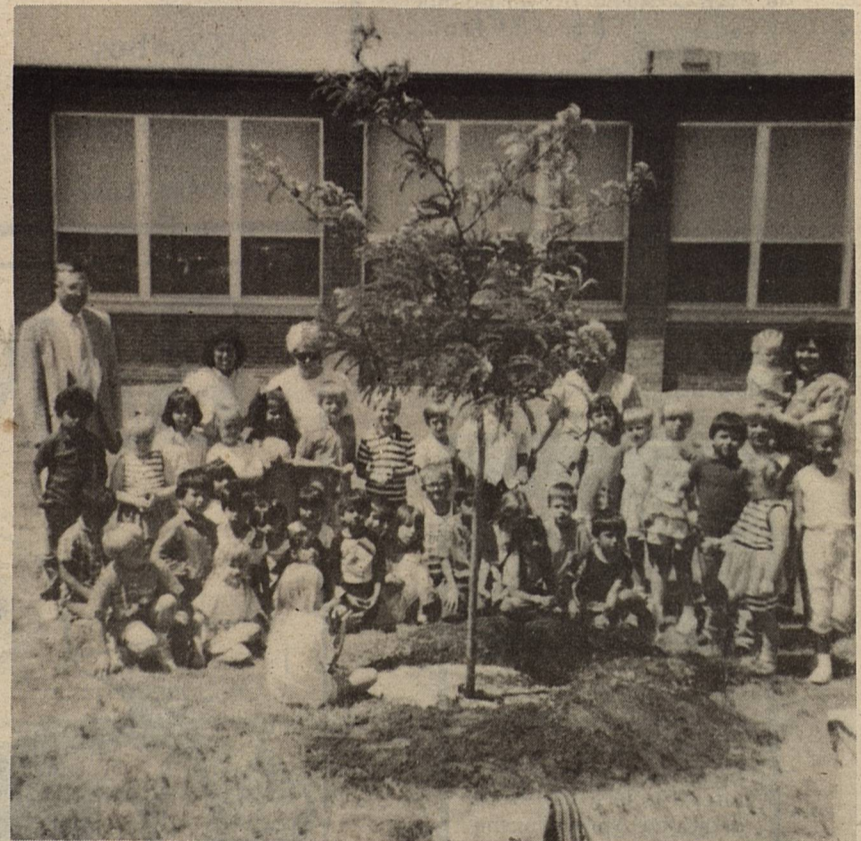
Principal John Nance gave a brief address, comparing the planting to parents' "planting" their children in kindergarten.

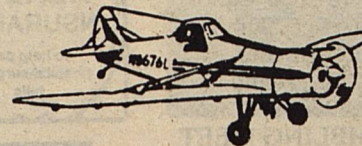

This project is being financed with \$ 137,000.00 of Federal funds equal to 65% of the total construction cost of the project from a grant received from the Texas Department of Commerce, Community Development Program. Approximately 17,000 L.F. of 6" C-900, SDR - 18 water lines with all necessary valves, fittings, and fire hydrants, and other necessary appurtenances.

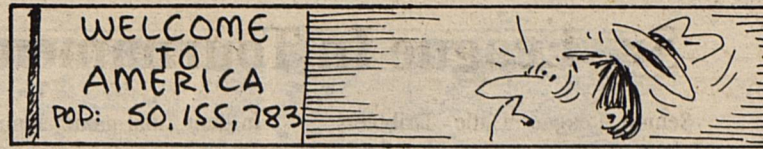
Teresa Hinson Receives Superior Rating In Solo

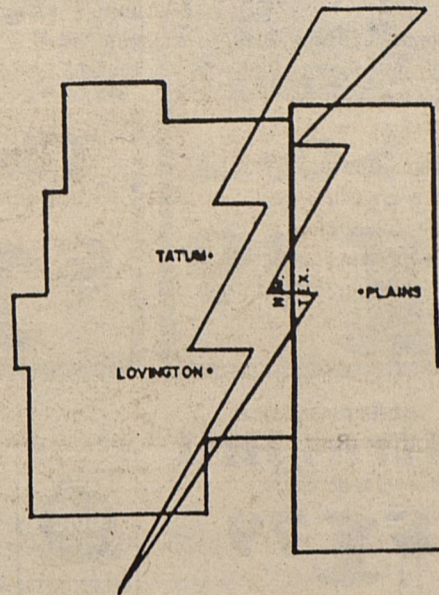
