## Voters Will Elect Governor In Nov. 6 General Election

Voters across the state will go to the polls Tuesday to elect a governor and other state and national officials. In the governor's race, Republican Clayton Williams and Democratic Ann W. Richards are joined by Libertarian Jeff Daiell.

Lieutenant Governor candidates are Rob Mosbacher, Republican; Bob Bullock, Democratic and Tom Owens, Libertarian.

Phil Gramm, Republican, is seeking re-election as United States Senator. Opposing him are Hugh Parmer, Democratic; and Gary Johnson, Libertarian. Republican Larry Combest is unopposed on the ballot for United States Representative, District 19.

On the county level, County Judge Dallas Brewer, Criminal District Attorney Linda Lowrey, District Clerk Mae Barnett, County Clerk Ruby Bruton and County Treasurer Toni Jones, all Democratic candidates, are unopposed on the ballot. Precinct 2 County Commissioner R.W. "Bob" Thurston is unopposed while Demo-

cratic Jack Cobb is opposed by Macky McWhirter, Republican and Write-In Candidate Larry Murphree, in the post of Precinct 4, county commissioner. Melba Crutcher and Esther Holland are unopposed in their respective races for justice of the peace in precincts one and two.

In other state races, Attorney General candidates are J.E. "Buster" Brown, Republican, Dan Morales, Democratic, and Ray E. Dittmar, Libertarian; Comptroller of Public Accounts candidates are Warren G. Harding Jr., Republican; John Sharp, Democratic; and William E. "Bill" Grisham, Libertarian.

Seeking the State Treasurer's post are Kay Bailey Hutchison, Republican; Nikki Van Hightower, Democratic; and Suzanne Love, Libertarian. Candidates for Commissioner, General Land Office, are Wes Gilbreath, Republican; Garry Mauro, Democratic; and Richard C. Donaldson, Libertarian.

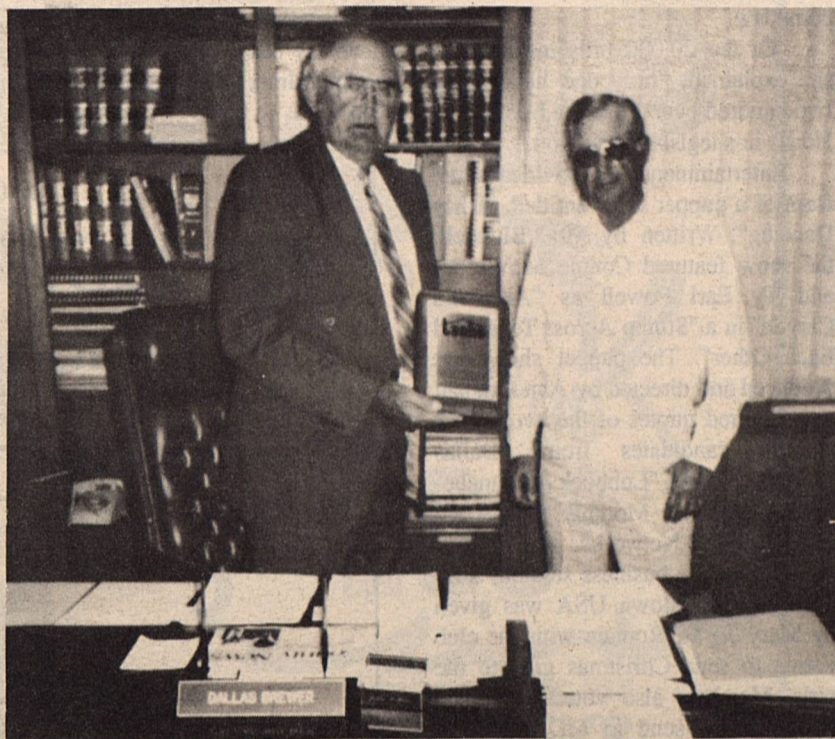
Voted "Best Groomed" for 1989-90, she is secretary of the FHA Chapter.

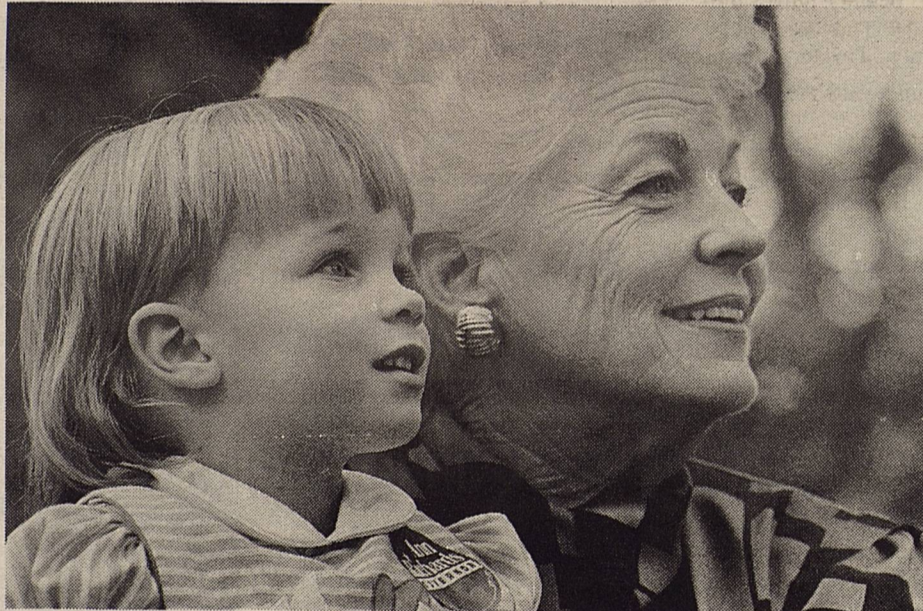

# Whiteface Spoils Evening For Cowboys & Fans Friday

Whiteface was the "spoiler" Friday night on the Cowboys' visit to Antelope land. It was the second straight year Whiteface has thrown the Cowboys.

Kicking off to the Antelopes, Cowboy defense held and the 'Lopes were forced to punt. From their own 27, Mario Medina ran for seven yards, Wade Redman carried for two and Medina picked up the first down on a three yard run. Medina had runs of two, nine, one and seven and Monte Pierce completed a pass to Jason Smith for five yards and carried for four in three more first down efforts before the Antelopes stopped them on the 38 yard line. Dain Guetersloh's punt carried into the end zone.

Once more in possession, Whiteface moved the ball to their 11 yard line but could go no farther. A field goal put the Antelopes on the scoreboard.

In their next drive, the Cowboys were only able to get the ball to their own 40 yard line.

A Whiteface touchdown just before the half was called back because the Cowboys were in motion. An attempted field goal went wide and the half ended with the Antelopes leading 3-0.

The Cowboys opened the third quarter, moving the ball to the 50 yard line. A five yard penalty gave the Cowboys first and 15. They were able to pick up two yards but a fake punt on fourth down came up a yard short.

Whiteface moved the ball from their 36 to a TD with Chris Chambers carrying the ball in from the one yard line. PAT was no good.

Plains had possession two more times but were unable to score.

Medina carried 12 for 40; Pierce, 12 for 27; Jose Ramirez, one for five; Smith, one for four; and Redman, one for two. Pierce threw 10 times with four completions and 32 yards. Shane Lowrey had two receptions for 21 yards; Smith, one for five; and Guetersloh, one for six.

Defensively, Ramirez had 12 tackles; Guetersloh and Brandon McGinty, 11 each; Dusty Rafferty and

Dwane Talley, nine each.



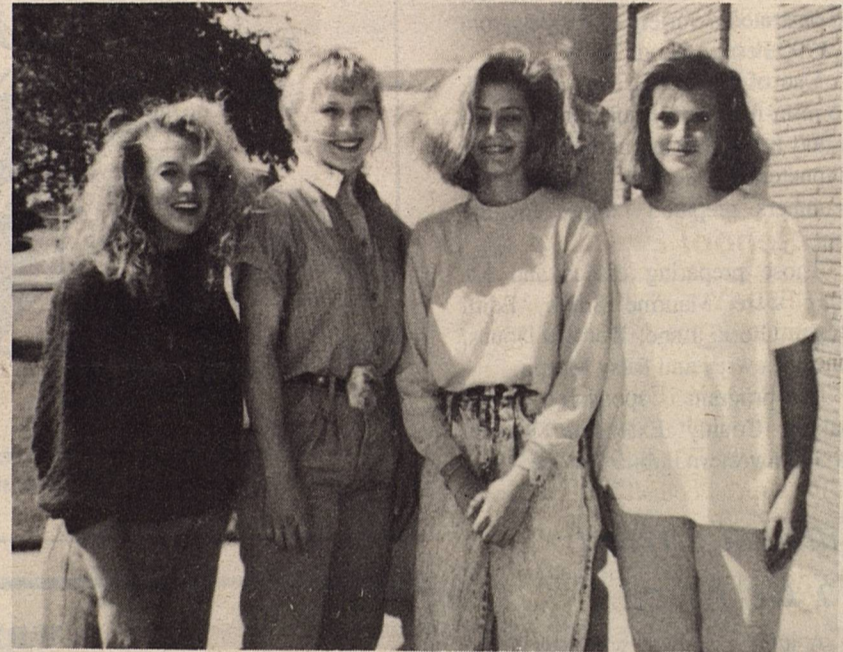
Designed to show youth how to get into the business world and how to

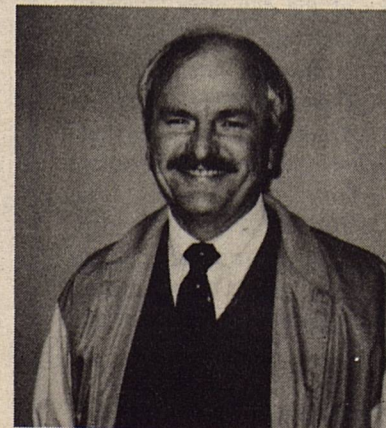


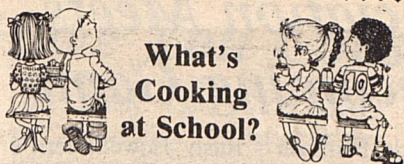
COWBOY SUPPORTERS PARADE THROUGH TOWN - These fans were out in support of the Cowboys in the Friday night clash with Whiteface.

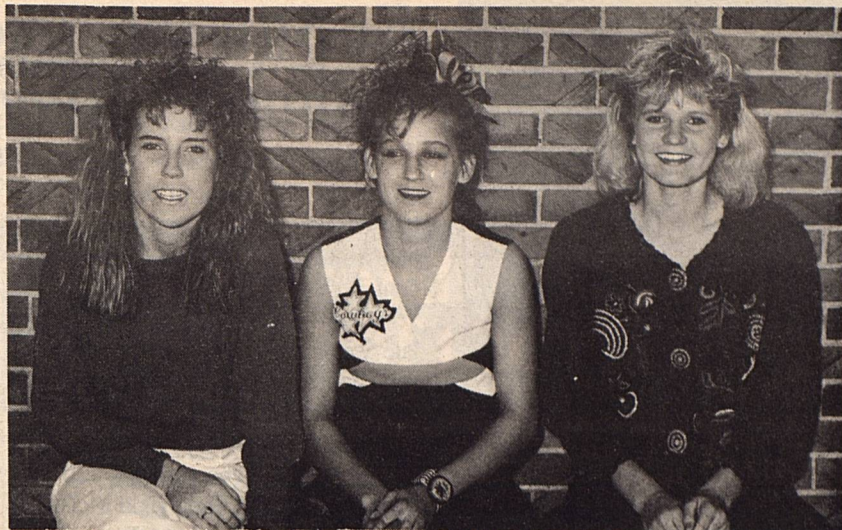

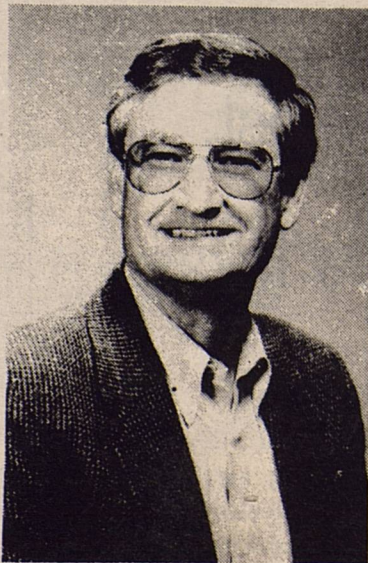

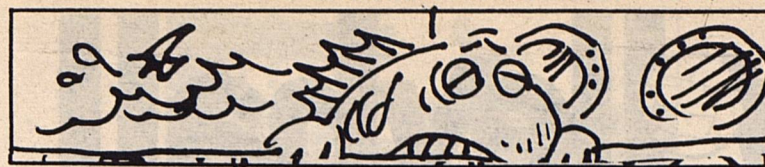
## Have You Considered LEPA?

The Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District is in the process of completing a grant proposal to the Texas Water Development Board for assistance in purchasing equipment to demonstrate the effectiveness and efficiency that LEPA systems have demonstrated. Anyone planning to purchase a new center pivot before next spring who is interested in participating with SLUWCD should contact this office soon.

Basically, the District would pay for most of the system from the goose-necks down. It is anticipated that a flow meter would be installed in the new system and would probably also require that a flow meter be installed in another system with conventional spray heads operated by the farmer to allow a conclusive test of the amount of water used with each system.

Remember, anyone considering a new system wishing to use the latest

technologies that reduce water and energy use should contact the district office soon.

O'Donnell scored on a 59 yard run on the second play of the third quarter. The two point conversion was good.

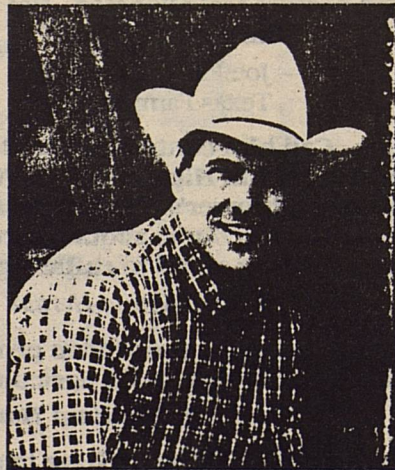

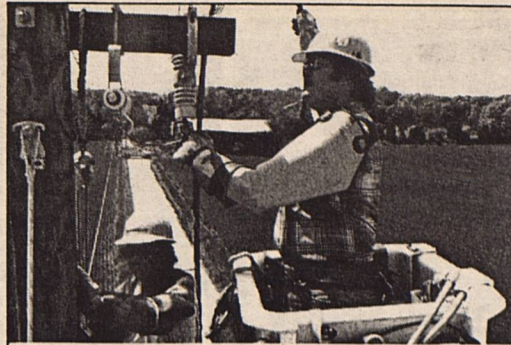
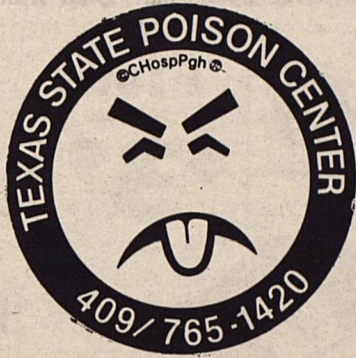
