Cross Country Team, Second In State Competition Meet

Cowboy Cross Country team members came up three places short of the championship last week in the State Cross Country Meet in Georgetown. Sabinal took the title with 70 points, leaving the Cowboys as runners-up with 73 points.

Armando Ramirez was leader for the PHS team, clocking 5th place with 17:51. Michael Sainz was close back at 7th place with 18:00. David Corrales was 26th; Junior Lira, 37th and Jason Smith, 46th. Also running in the meet but not counted for points were Lenny Morrow and Lacy McAdams.

The Cowboys finished a great season with the top win in the Odessa Meet and a claim of the District Title for the fourth consecutive year. Wrapping up the season, they nailed down the Regional Championship and took

second place in state competition.

Many hours of running, getting up at 5:30 every morning and the competition of three mile races paid off for the team. Ramirez will be missed next year but all others will be back for another shot at state.

Cowgirls To Compete In State Tournament

The Cowgirls earned a fourth consecutive trip to Austin and the right to defend their two consecutive Class A State Volleyball crowns by capturing the Region 1-A Championship.

They opened the 24th Annual U.I.L. State Volleyball tournament Friday, Nov. 16, with a 9 a.m. match against Windthorst (26-10) in Tony Burger Center. Round Top Carmine (32-4) squared off against Yantis (19-6) at 10:15 a.m. The winners advanced to the Class A Championship match scheduled for 10 a.m. Saturday.

The Cowgirls advanced to the state finals by topping Fort Hancock and Bronte in regional competition held at the Texas Tech Student Recreation Center in Lubbock last Saturday.

Rena McElroy paced the Cowgirls with 14 kills in their 15-9 16-14 victory over the Bronte Lady Longhorns in the championship match. The teams traded points in game one until the Cowgirls pulled ahead with Michelle Lowe's four consecutive service points reaching game point on a Jo Lena Powell kill. Bronte held the Cowgirls at game point through four rotations before a McElroy kill netted the winning point for a one game advantage.

The Cowgirls charged ahead 11-2 in game two, but a Cowgirl hitting er-

ror and a couple of Bronte dinks narrowed the lead. They picked up two more points before the Lady Longhorns rallied to tie the game 14-14. After a time out, the Cowgirls forced side out with a kill, setting up a pair of Leslie Patton serves that clinched the match.
