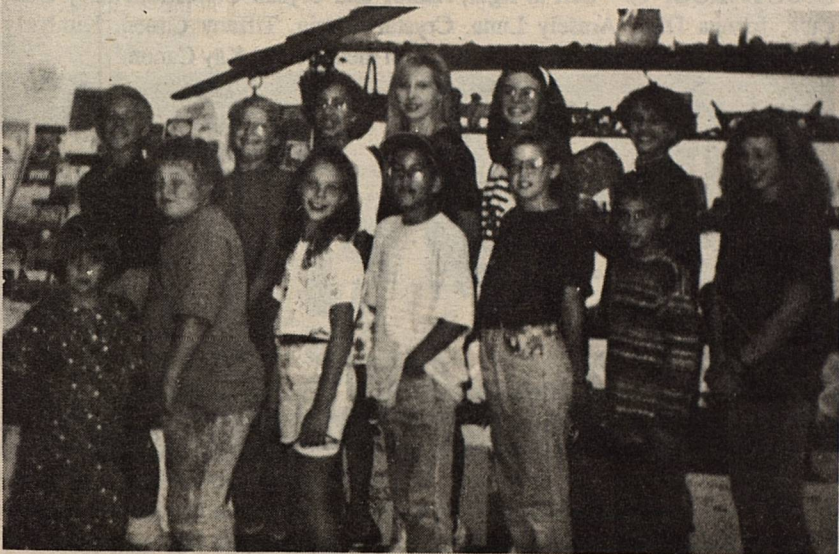

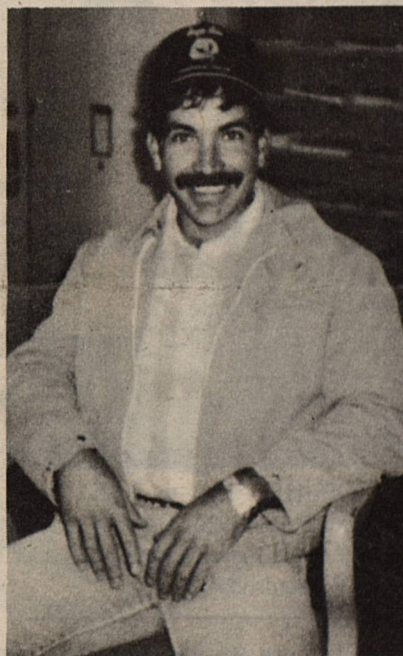
Voters To Decide Nov. 5 On Constitutional Amendments

Yoakum County voters will go to the polls November 5 in a special election to adopt or reject the constitutional amendments proposed by the 72nd Legislature.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Absentee voting by personal appearance may be conducted from Oct. 16 to Nov. 1 in the Clerk's office in Yoakum County Court House during regular office hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays.

Polling places for Plains residents include Precinct 303, Plains Library; Precinct 404, Corral Youth Center, 911 Avenue G. (A complete list of polling places is printed on page 5 of this issue.)

Sanders Re-Elected To SWCD Board

L.J. Sanders Jr. was recently re-elected as a director of Yoakum County Soil and Water Conservation District. As one of five individuals serving on the district board, Sanders will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of Texas Soil Conservation District law.

Purpose of Yoakum County SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

There are 211 soil and water conservation districts in Texas. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivision of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCDs' program.

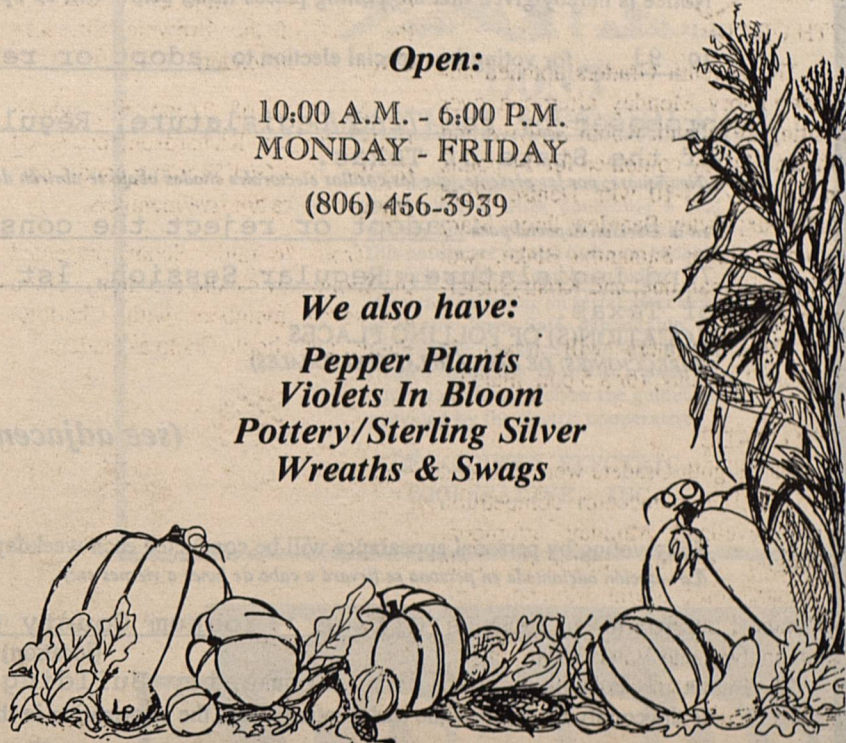

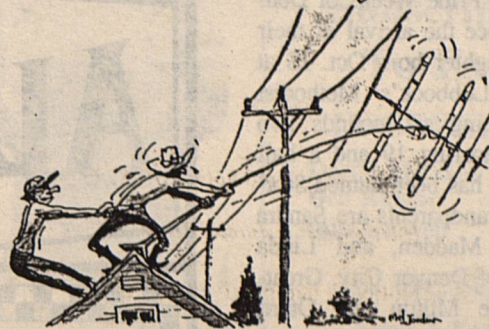

Hines Sentence Is Affirmed In Amarillo Court

Conviction of Billy Ray Hines for the offense of aggravated sexual assault and indecency with a child was affirmed Oct. 4 by the Court of Appeals in Amarillo.

Hines was tried by jury in District Court in Yoakum County in September 1990. He was sentenced to serve two 90-year prison terms and two 20-year prison terms.

The State was represented by Linda Shoemaker Lowrey. Warren New was the defendant's legal counsel.

The opinion, written by Justice John T. Boyd, concluded by saying, "In summary all of appellant Hines' points are overruled and, there being no reversible error, the judgment of the trial court is affirmed."

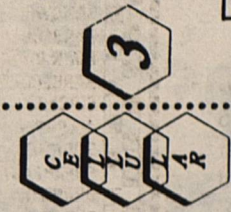

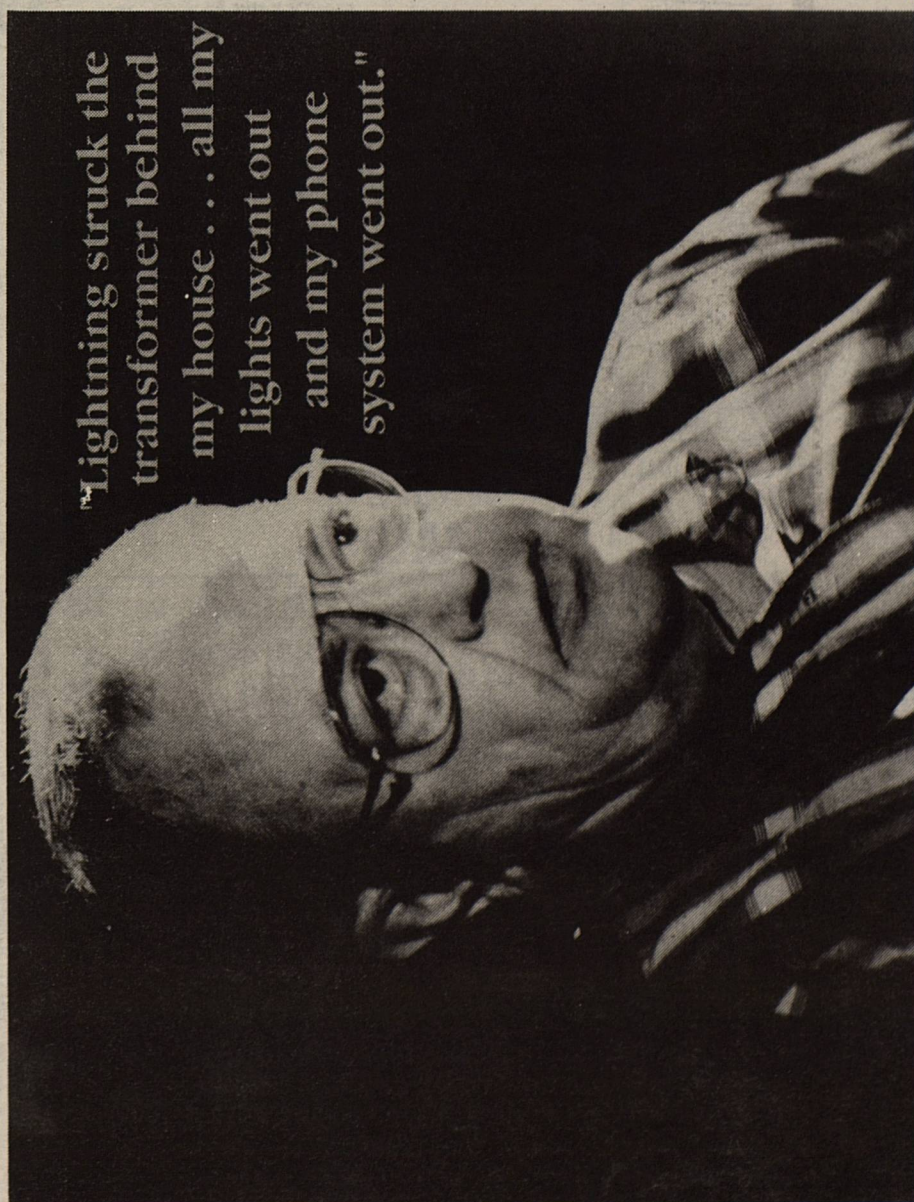
