## Federal Credit Union Slates Annual Meeting

## Low-Flow Showerheads To Be Distributed

The Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District in an effort to encourage the conservation of water within the household has purchased a large quantity of low-flow showerheads to be distributed to any household within the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District free of charge.

These showerheads are designed with a built-in volume control capable of maintaining a minimum flow rate of 1.0 gpm. and not to exceed 2.45 gpm. (regular shower-heads use 6.8 gpm.) while still maintaining the hot-cold ration and providing a superior spray capability. Showerheads fit all standard 1/2 inch threaded shower arms. A V-groove in the pin allows positive flow in off position.

The low-flow characteristics of the showerheads are the results of an integrated engineering design and not the result of a low cost add on part such as flow restrictors.

Hot showers cost you money, both for the water and the energy you use to heat it. This modern, efficient showerhead will help you enjoy a full force shower while you save water, cut your energy bill, and reduce sewer flows. A family of four averages a total 125 gallons a day in water while showering before using the new low-flow showerheads. 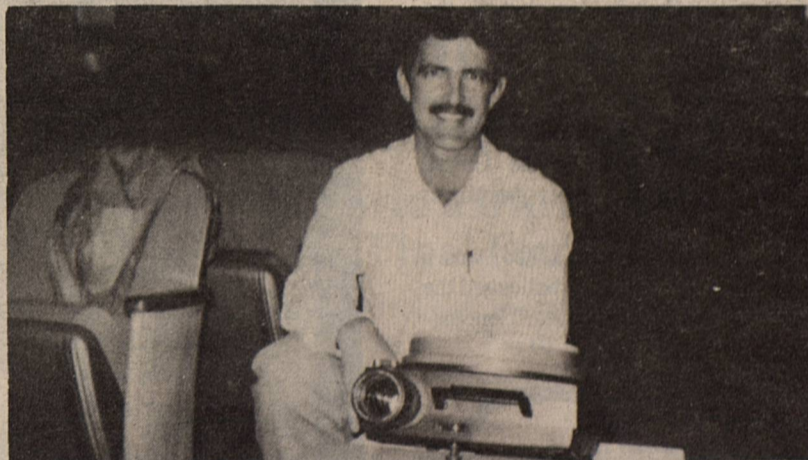

A granddaughter of L.P. and Ruth Bennett (1874-1956) of Denver City, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Bennett of Denver City, explores the lives of her great-grandparents, grandparents, parents and siblings. Becki Schwarz projects an affectionate, nostalgic view of her family in Texas history.

Included are the settler years, the quest for an education for the Bennett children, involving the early years of Abilene Christian University to the depression era, and the discovery of the wildcat oil well

Through interwoven childhood ranch memories, partial biographies, and insights from interviews, readers follow the historical account of this memorable family to the present era of quick depletion of the once so mighty oil fields.

## Graduating Seniors Honored With Lasagna Dinner Jan. 27

Members of the 1992 graduating class of Plains High School were guests of Tsa Mo Ga Study Club for a lasagna dinner Jan. 27. Hosted by the social committee, the event was held in the clubhouse.

Brandy Lester shared highlights of her attendance of the Hugh O'Brien Youth Conference last summer in Amarillo. Jo Lena Powell related her experiences as a representative of Lea County Electric Cooperative to Washington, D.C. Jimmy McGinty spoke of his participation in Texas Boy's State last summer.

Jerry Parrish, president of the school board, spoke to the group about commitments made by the board for the benefit of Plains students. He stated that Josten's Computer Labs had recently been installed in the school and two new activity buses had been purchased. He stressed safety factor as well as school and community pride that the buses represent.

Parrish also talked about the financial situations facing schools in Texas with emphasis on the local school, stating that the board, as members of the Robin Hood Forum, does not believe school finance is the major responsibility of tax payers.

He expressed thanks to the club and to the seniors for letters sent to the State Legislature on behalf of the tax issue during 1991 and asked that letters be again written if and when the need arises.

Brenda Canada concluded the program with an article, "Twelve to the Bar", concerning 12 distinguished attorneys who practiced law, served as Supreme Court Justices, Senators, Legislators, President of the United States, Governor and other prominent careers.

One of the 12, she stated, was a law school drop-out and challenged the group to decide his identity. Conclud-

ing her presentation, she said, "The other eleven never went to law school".

Other guests included Carol and Byron Morgan, class sponsor; Principal and Mrs. J.B. Wilson, Jan Parrish and Linda and Ty Powell.

In the business session, Sit Jones read a thank you letter from the American Legion Auxiliary for items sent to the veterans in the VA Hospital in Big Spring for Christmas.

Nominating and awards committee reports were given. Members were encouraged to attend a convention planning meeting in Lubbock to prepare for the District Convention in March. Tsa Mo Ga will be one of the hostess chapters.

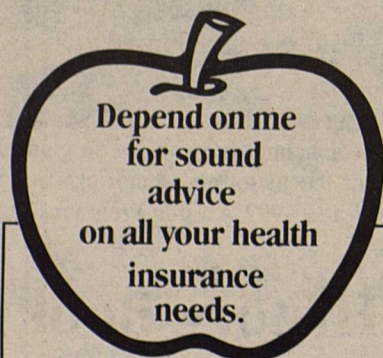

## Engagement Is Announced

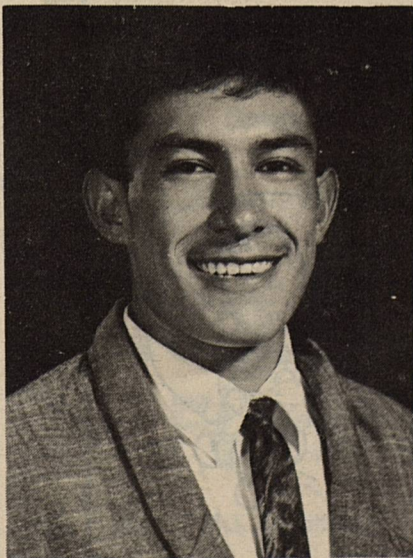

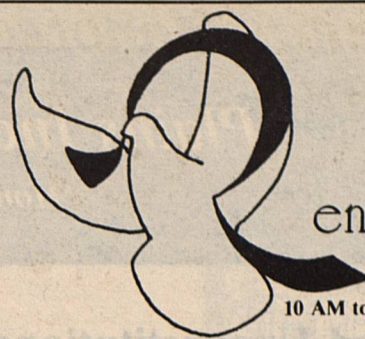

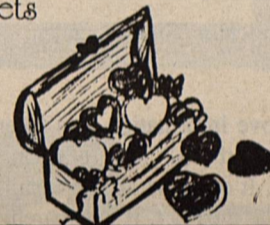

### New System Declared Unconstitutional

THE TEXAS SUPREME COURT TODAY THREW OUT THE CONTROVERSIAL NEW PUBLIC TAX SYSTEM. BUT THE DIVIDED COURT DEFERRED THE EFFECT OF THE RULING TO ALLOW COLLECTION OF PROPERTY TAXES BY THE 188 NEW COUNTY EDUCATION DISTRICTS FOR 1991 AND 1992. THE JUSTICES ARE GIVING TEXAS LAWMAKERS UNTIL JUNE 1, 1993 TO WRITE A PLAN THAT CORRECTS THE PROBLEMS THEY FOUND.

JUSTICES SAY THE NEW SYSTEM IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL BECAUSE IT LEVIES A STATEWIDE PROPERTY TAX. THE COURT ALSO NOTES THE SO-CALLED "ROBIN HOOD" PLAN LEVIES A PROPERTY TAX WITHOUT PROVIDING VOTER APPROVAL.

JANUARY 31 WAS THE DEADLINE FOR PAYING THE 1991 TAXES WITHOUT PENALTY. THE COURT'S OPINION SAYS THAT TODAY'S RULING "IS NOT TO BE USED AS A DEFENSE TO THE PAYMENT OF ANY SUCH TAXES."

UNLESS THE GOVERNOR CALLS A SPECIAL SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE, TEXAS LAWMAKERS WILL NOT MEET FOR THEIR NEXT REGULAR SESSION UNTIL NEXT JANUARY.

According to Superintendent Pete Simmons:

"The above information was taken directly from the AP wire (at noon, January 30). It contains all the details we have at the moment. It is apparent that taxes must be paid for by tomorrow, January 31st to avoid penalty and interest. It also appears that the same system will be in place for next year. I will share more details as they are available."

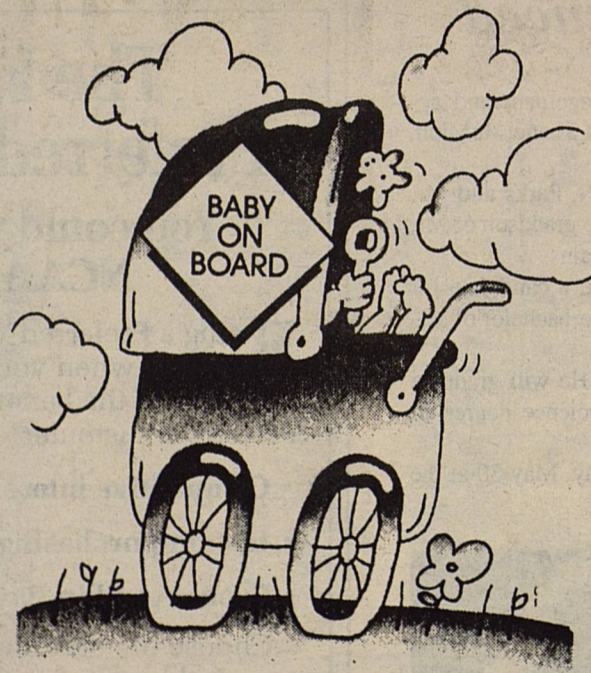

## 'Cancer Facts For Women' Given For Homemakers

A program on "Cancer Facts for Women" was presented to members of Turner Extension Homemakers Tuesday afternoon in the clubroom.

Breast cancer, she explained, is the leading killer of women. One of every four women in the U.S. will have breast cancer and more than 44,000 women die each year of the dreaded disease.

She stated that women most susceptible to having breast cancer are those over 50 years of age, women who have had other family members with breast cancer, women who have never had children and those who were older than 30 years of age when their first child was born.

Colon and rectal cancer, she explained, is the second highest killer of women. Striking most often in women older than 50, it attacks some 79,000 new cases per year.

Third leading killer of women is lung cancer, claiming some 50,000 victims each year. Women who smoke are more likely to have lung cancer, statistics show.

FIVE STEPS TO SURGE PROTECTION

Lightning strikes and other natural faults on power lines can create a high-voltage surge called a voltage "spike". When this short duration surge finds its way into your home, it may severely damage unprotected electrical equipment and electronic devices (computers, etc.). Lea County Electric Cooperative, Inc. builds maximum surge protection into its lines, but no system can completely block all voltage surges.

The following five steps should be followed to protect your household appliances:

1. When possible, purchase appliances and equipment with built in surge suppressors, interruptible power inputs and reset capability.
2. Install external surge protection devices and interruptible power supply systems at crucial outlets in your home or shop.
3. Unplug and discontinue operation of unprotected equipment during an electrical storm or severe windstorm.
4. Unplug all non-essential equipment when not in use or when you leave for a vacation.
5. Use backup power systems with computers and other essential electronics to prevent outages.

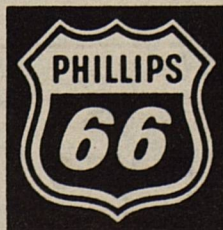

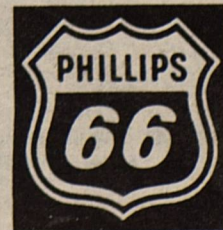
