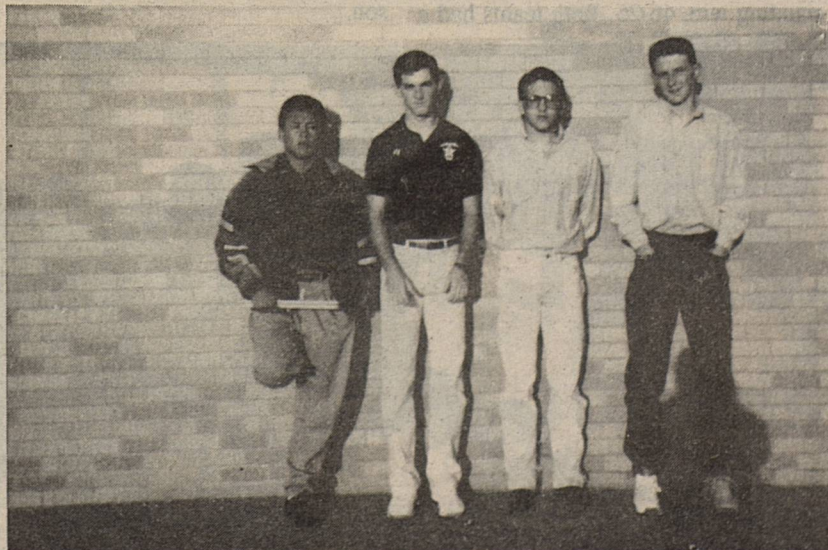

CURRICULUM AND THE ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS

A curriculum can be defined as a plan for action, or a written document, which includes strategies for achieving desired goals or ends. Curriculum can be defined broadly - as dealing with the experiences of the learner. Finally, curriculum can be considered in terms of subject matter (mathematics, science, English, history, etc.) or content (the way we organize and assimilate information). We can also talk about subject matter or content in terms of different grade levels.

Our curriculum today in Plains ISD is governed by the Essential Elements that the State has designated for each subject area. In the next few weeks, our staff will be setting goals in the subject areas of Math, Language Arts, and Science for each campus in the district and for each grade level.

I thought you would be interested in knowing what some of the essential elements are in three of our courses. The lists below only cover a very small number of essential elements that are contained in a two inch notebook entitled "State Board of Education Rules for Curriculum".

Fourth grade math has seven essential elements. Listed below are three:

1. Concepts and skills associated with the understanding of numbers. The student should be able to round numbers, use place value, use decimals, use fractions, and read and write whole numbers and decimals.

2. The basic operations on numbers (addition, multiplication, division), their properties and their uses.

3. Measurement concepts and skills using metric and customary units.

The essential elements for Language Arts in the twelfth grade are:

1. Writing concepts and skills.

2. Language concepts and skills.

3. General literary skills.

4. Cultural background and literary development of British literature.

5. Analysis, classification and evaluation of literature.

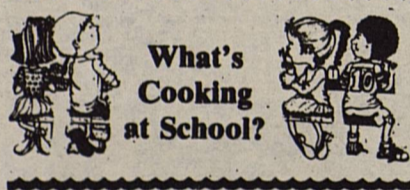
Three of the nine Science essential elements in the 6th grade are:

1. Manipulative laboratory skills.

2. The use of skills in acquiring data through the senses.

3. The use of classification skills in ordering and sequencing data.

These are just a few of the essential elements out of many that are being taught. Plains Independent School District is dedicated to meeting each of these essential elements with the best possible education for our students.

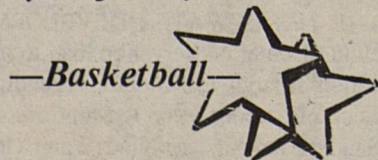

The Varsity Cowboys played O'Donnell Friday, Feb. 7 whipping the Eagles 92 to 54. Brian Wilson was high scorer with 31 points, followed by Jason Smith with 18; Ladd Winn, 11; Brad McMinn, 10; Lenny Morrow, 8; Brad Ashburn, 7; Lacy McAdams, 6; and Stoney Garland, 1.

Cowboys met up against the Anton Bulldogs Tuesday, Feb. 11 and beat the dogs 60 to 47. Jason Smith

The Cowboys record for the year was 20 wins and seven losses. District record was five wins and three losses.

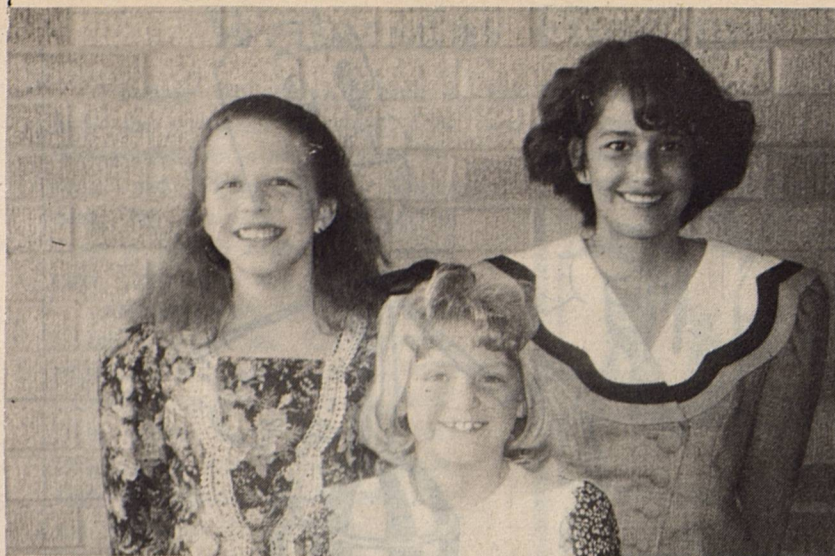
