

Sandy Land receives state recognition

The Texas Water Development Board would like to recognize the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District for conserving the water resources of Texas. As the state agency mandated by the Legislature to help water managers incorporate water conservation into their water management policies and practices, the Board expresses appreciation for such efforts in this regard.

Although the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District was just created in 1989, the District has already instituted a very active agricultural water conservation program. Using \$47,000 in grant funds from the Board's Agricultural Water Conservation Grants to Districts Programs, the District has purchased electronic flow meters to measure irrigations wells and evaluate irrigation systems, water quality testing equipment and LEPA sprinkler system for demonstrations to show its water use and yield versus that of conventional sprinkler irrigation systems. District reports since 1990 indicate that the flow meters have been used 200 to 250 times each year and 300 to 400 water quality analysis have been conducted each year as well. The District has also participated in the Board's technical assistance program which provides irrigation system evaluations for farmers

The District has closed one Agricultural Water Conservation Loan from the Board for \$490,000, and currently has an active loan commitment for an additional \$600,000.

The Board particularly applauded the District's willingness to apply for and administer these loan funds so that area farmers have this funding source for the purchase and installation of more efficient irrigation systems.

The staff associated with these successful efforts are to be commended, says a board member. "The Board is grateful for your District's attention to the preservation and wise use of the state's water resources."

Bird feeding, topic of garden meeting

Bea Pippin presented a program, "Birds of the Back Yard" for members of Plains Dirt Gardeners Club Monday.

Citing ways to attract birds, Mrs. Pippin explained that water must be kept available for birds at all times. Shelter and safe nesting places should also be provided and may be as simple as using an empty milk carton with an opening cut to allow the bird to enter and build a nest. The top should be kept closed and the carton hung high enough to prevent cats from getting to the nest.

Showing pictures of various birds, she explained how certain types may be identified.

Working on the educational awards program were SWCD directors Neal Newsom, Linda Powell, L.J. anders, Chris Winn and secretary everly Lowrey.




