

County librarians report on new confidentiality act

(Editor's Note: Latrell McDonnell and Ann Greer, County Librarians, attended a meeting for librarians Nov. 12 in Midland Junior College to explain the new Confidentiality Act, effective Sept. 1, 1993. Printed here is their report.)

"Confidentiality of Library Records: Implications for Texas Libraries" given by Herman L. Totten for the Texas State Library. The Governor signed an amendment to Article 6252-17a concerning libraries. This Amendment came into effect on Sept. 1, 1993. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Section 3, Chapter 424, Acts of the 63rd Legis-

lature, Regular Session, 1973 (Article 6252-17a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), is amended by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (g) to read as follows: An Act is filed in the Yoakum County Library and will be made available for people to

read or a copy can be obtained from the library.

The First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States protects free speech and a free press. The Constitution of the State of Texas provides that "no law shall ever be passed curtailing the liberty of speech or of the press". A corollary of those constitutional guarantees is the corresponding freedom to read what is written, hear

what is spoken, and view other forms of expression without fear of intrusion, intimidation or reprisal. The guarantee of privacy for readers, hearers and viewers will ensure this freedom.

The library is a central resource where information and differing points of view are available. Library users will be free to use the library and its materials and services without government, community, or individual interference.

More than 200 people attended the Nov. 15 school board meeting in the continuing concern over school and community relations. Unrest has plagued the community since the resignation last month of J.B. Wilson as high school principal and his wife, Dianne, a teacher.

A group of citizens banded together and hired Lubbock attorney Sam Ogan to represent them in demanding to know why the Wilsons were "forced to resign" and why "taxpayers dollars were used to buy out the Wilsons' contracts."

During the meeting, Superintendent Pete Simmons and school attorney Laura Grocer denied that coercive methods were used to secure the resignations. In response to a number of questions, Ms. Groce pointed out the privacy laws prevented a response.

Debra and Joel grew up in Plains and love their hometown. They attend First Baptist Church.

"I really enjoy my job, too," she says. She has worked in the USDA-ASCS office for the past ten years.

Debra shares some of her favorite recipes with the Kitchen Korner cooks this week, including two festive works, the spicy pumpkin cake and the pineapple cheese ball, which should come in handy for the holidays ahead.

SPICY PUMPKIN CAKE

1 pkg 2 layer-size spice cake mix

1/2 t soda 1 c milk

1 c canned pumpkin

1/2 c chopped walnuts

1/2 c dates, finely cut

Combine cake mix and soda; proceed according to package directions substituting milk for the first addition of liquid and pumpkin for the second addition. Fold in nuts and dates. Bake in two greased and lightly floured 9x1 1/2 inch round pans according to package directions. Cool; remove from pans. Cool completely.

FROSTING/FILLING

Whip one cup whipping cream with two tablespoons honey and 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon.

Fill and frost top of cake. Chill.

PINEAPPLE CHEESE BALL

2 pkg (8 oz size) cream cheese, soft-

1 can (8 1/2 oz) crushed pineapple,

1/4 c finely chopped green pepper

2 T finely chopped onion

1 T seasoned salt canned pineapple slices maraschino cherries parsley sprigs assorted crackers

1. In medium bowl, with fork, beat cream cheese until smooth. Gradually stir in crushed pineapple, 1 cup pecans, the green pepper, onion and salt.

2. Shape into a ball. Roll in remaining nuts. Wrap in plastic film or foil.

3. Refrigerate until well chilled overnight.

4. To serve: Place cheese ball on serving board. If desired, garnish with pineapple slices, cherries and parsley. Surround with crackers. Let guests help themselves.

Makes about 40 appetizer serv-

NOTE: Any leftover cheese mixture can be reshaped and refrigerated, for use another day.

LASAGNE

1 lb Italian sausage

1 clove garlic, minced

1 T whole basil

1 1/2 t salt

1 1-lb can tomatoes

2 6-oz cans tomato paste

10 oz lasagne noodles

3 c fresh Ricotta or cream-style cottage cheese

1/2 c grated Parmesan or Romano cheese

2 T parsley flakes

1 t salt

1/2 t pepper

1 lb mozzarella cheese, sliced very thin PREHEAT OVEN: 375 degrees

Brown meat slowly; spoon off excess fat. Add next five ingredients. Simmer uncovered 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cook noodles in large

amount boiling salted water till tender; drain, rinse. Beat eggs; add remaining ingredients, except mozzarella.


Layer half the noodles in 13x9x2 inch baking dish; spread with half the Ricotta filling; add halt the mozzarella cheese and half the meat sauce. Repeat. Bake at 375 degrees about 30 minutes (or assemble early and refrigerate; bake 45 minutes). Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Serves 8 to 10.





This library policy is pursuant to Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes, Article 6252-17a, referred herein as the Texas Open Records Act, relating to making confidential a record that would identify a person who uses library services or materials.

SOME OF THE QUESTIONS ASKED BY LIBRARIANS:

What kinds of steps can libraries that have been checking materials out manually take to erase those records? (E.g., writing patrons' card numbers and names on the checkout cards; sending overdue notices on postcards; calling patrons and leaving messages about reserved books.) - (Black widetip markers can be used to obliterate records and names of patrons cannot be used publicly.)

Professor Totten stated that library staff cannot discuss patrons, such as to say - call Mrs. Upjohn and tell her a certain book is in. No one has the right to know other than Mrs. Upjohn what kind of reading subjects she enjoys or reads.

Some of the records that are to be kept confidential are circulation records, including overdues; reference requests; reserve materials; interlibrary loan. Privacy for each patron and their requests is a law.

Librarians asked: "Is it still legal to post kids' names on the wall during the summer reading program or display nametags in the library?" Professor Totten said we must have a parent's written consent to place their child's name for public to see, plus we cannot post books they have read, but can place stars by names for books read.
