## Home Health Week declared nationally

President Clinton has determined that Nov. 29 to Dec. 3 be declared National Home Health Week. Medical Arts Home Care and Generations Home Health Care, both of Denver City, are among those organizations making it possible for the elderly, as well as others of the community to remain in the home setting during their time of illness.

McDaniel died Wednesday, Nov. 24, 1993 in Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

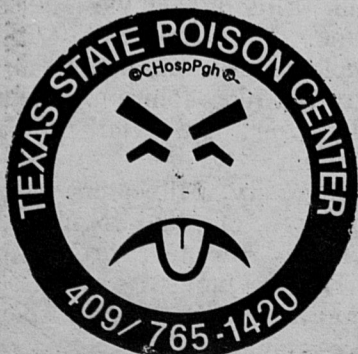
He was born Oct. 26, 1924 in Sudan and attended Sudan Schools, moved to Whitharral in 1937 and graduated from there in 1943.

The site consists of an oil filter drain rack and a container for collection of used oil. This site is designed for use by do it yourselfers as well as business and governmental agencies. Also on site is a dumpster for disposal of drained oil cans and other containers.


Used oil is classified as hazardous waste and is a contributing factor to underground water contamination. One gallon of used oil has the potential of contami-

nating one million gallons of water. Proper disposal and recycling of used oil will assist in protecting underground water as well as preserve oil as a natural resource.

Proper disposal of used oil and oil filters, recycling (plastics, aluminum, and steel containers), and composting and/or mulching of yard waste are waste reduction practices that will protect the environment and extend the life of our landfills.

### WHAT THE LAW SAYS:

According to the Texas Litter Abatement Act, it is illegal to dump garbage in places that are not licensed landfills. It is also against the law to collect or receive litter in a place that is not a legal landfill, even if that place is on private property. For example, you could be subject to prosecution if you allow a friend or relative to abandon a car or discard old appliances on your land. Other common violations include throwing litter or allowing it to fly out of a vehicle, letting someone dump tires or trash on your property, improperly disposing of motor oil, and junking old cars in rivers or lakes.

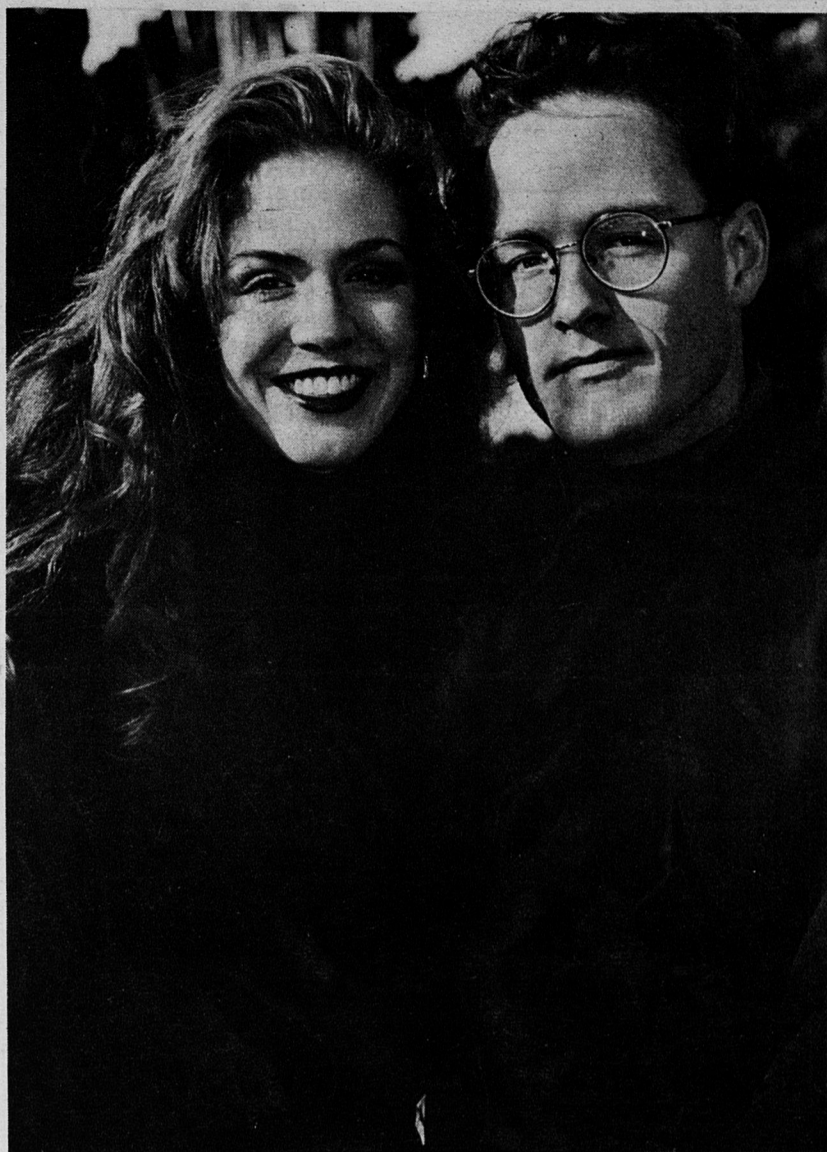

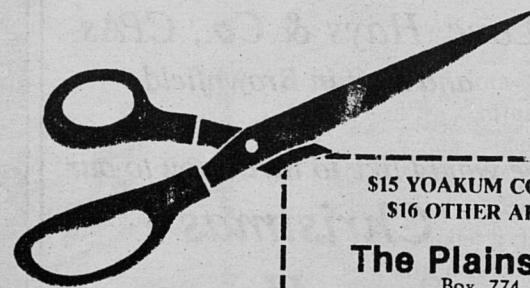

## Scholarship contest being offered by Duracell/NSTA

All 9th through 12th grade students with an interest in technology, electronics or mechanics are invited to power their imaginations and enter the new and expanded twelfth annual Duracell/NSTA Scholarship Competition to be eligible for a number of awards totalling over \$90,000 in U.S. Savings Bonds.

For the first time this national competition is awarding prizes in the form of savings bonds and is giving them to each of the 100 finalists. The competition now grants a first place savings bond of \$20,000, five second place \$10,000 bonds, ten third place \$1,000 bonds, 25 fourth place bonds of \$200 each, and savings bonds of \$100 each for 59 fifth place winners.

Jim Donahue, Duracell Vice President for Corporate Communications said, "We've had so many creative entries over the years, we wanted to give more students this higher level of recognition and reward."

In addition to the savings bonds every student who submits a complete entry to this competition is given a wallet and the teachers of the top 100 finalists also receive gifts. She shares three of her favorite recipes, one for quick and easy chicken and dumplings that was given to her by a daughter-in-law, Tink. The cocoa cookies are a favorite of son, Randy and the roast salad is great to have for sandwiches, Louise says.

### CHICKEN AND DUMPLINGS

1 chicken seasoned with salt and pepper

1 small package of flour tortillas

Cover the chicken with water in a large pan. Leave the skin on and boil until the chicken is tender. Remove the chicken from the pan. Remove the skin and bones. Cut the chicken into chunks and put it back into the broth and bring to a boil. Cut the tortillas into strips. Drop the strips into the boiling broth a few at a time until all have been added. Stir gently as you drop the strips in. When all have been added, cover the pan and turn off the heat. If juice is too thick, add a little milk.

### COCOA COOKIES

(Randy's favorites!)

Combine and boil 2 c sugar, 1/2 c cocoa and 1/2 c milk. While hot add:

1 stick oleo  
3 c quick oats (uncooked)  
1 t vanilla  
1/2 c peanut butter (optional)  
1 c coconut (optional)  
1 c pecans (optional)

Drop by spoonful on waxed paper.

### ROAST SALAD

1 Pike's Peak roast  
3 large onions  
10 boiled eggs  
1 pint sweet pickles  
3 jalapenos, deveined (optional)  
1 1/2 qts. mayonnaise or salad dressing

Cook roast, remove any fat. Grind roast, onions, eggs, pickles and jalapenos. Add mayonnaise to spreading consistency. Keep up to two weeks in refrigerator. This makes a lot of sandwiches. (I use my food processor, instead of a grinder.)

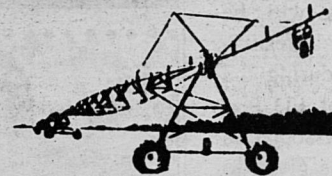
Hostesses presented the honoree and grandmother with corsages designed of infant socks and the baby-to-be with a stroller and comforter.

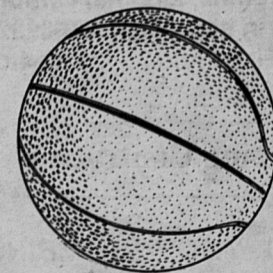
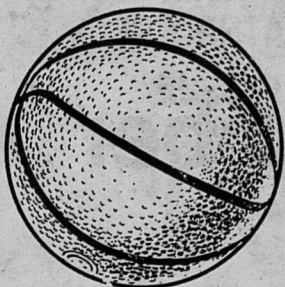

**Give your child a legal father**

Under Texas law, a child born to unmarried parents has no legal father until paternity is established. If you are not married to your child's mother, you have no legal relationship with the child. You have no right to visitation, and no right to participate in decision making about your child's future. Your child won't be legally entitled to your Social Security benefits and may not be able to inherit from your estate. Last, but certainly not least, you and your child deserve to know each other and to develop a warm and loving relationship -- legally establishing paternity will help to ensure that happens.

If you choose to establish paternity, your first step is to sign a form called a Statement of Paternity. These forms are available through the Office of the Attorney General's (OAG) Regional Child Support Offices (addresses and phone numbers are provided below). Based on this document, an order of paternity can be entered and signed by a judge. Volunteering to work with my office to establish paternity will save you money. By avoiding a lawsuit, you escape court costs, attorneys' fees, and the cost of paternity testing.
