

Andrews attorney desires State Representative title

Kevin Jackson of Andrews has announced his plans to seek the office of state representative, a position held by Rep. Jim Rudd for nine terms. Rudd has said he will not seek re-election.

The 33-year-old attorney pledges to continue in the footsteps of Rudd who "vigorously represented his West Texas district." Rudd served on several powerful house committees over the years, including chairing the House Appropriations Committee four terms.

Jackson, a 1978 graduate of Andrews High School and 1982 graduate of Texas Tech, received his law degree in 1990 from South Texas College of Law in Houston. Prior to attending law school, he worked for Inter-first Bank in Austin in 1982 and then returned to Andrews to work in the oilfields.

The Jacksons returned to Andrews in 1990 after receiving their law degrees and opened a law office for both practices. He is vice-president of Andrews County Bar Association, a member of Calvary Baptist Church, Andrews Chamber of Commerce, American Bar Association, the United States District Court for the Northern, Eastern and Western Districts, the National Order of Barristers and Delta Theta Phi Law Fraternity.

Jackson was appointed city attorney in Andrews in April.

Jackson said if elected, it would benefit Andrews County and the entire area in the future regarding state issues. He added that, hopefully, he would serve as long as Rudd and be a deciding part of the legislature.





Texas ALLTEL, Inc. has filed a report with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") describing the merger of ALLTEL Texas, Inc. with Texas ALLTEL, Inc. The matter has been assigned Docket No. 12441. The Commission intends to investigate the merger and its impact on the operations of these companies pursuant to Section 63 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act ("PURA"), TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. art. 1446c (Vernon's Supp. 1993).

In reaching its decision of whether the merger serves the public interest, the Commission will take into consideration the reasonable value of the property, facilities, or securities to be merged. If the Commission finds that such transaction is not in the public interest, the Commission shall take the effect of the transaction into consideration in ratemaking proceedings and disallow the effect of such transaction if it will unreasonably affect rates or service.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. 


