New evidence may clear Lucas of local murders

A defense attorney says new evidence that might prove the innocence of Henry Lee Lucas in the decade-old slaying of a Lubbock woman prompted the attorney to file a motion Monday requesting a speedier trial.

Lucas was indicted June 6, 1984, on capital murder charges in the stabbing deaths of Deborah Sue Williamson and Elizabeth Ann

Williamson was killed Aug. 24, 1975. Price was slain April 10, 1976.

Dallas lawyer Gary Richardson said he filed the motion in state district court in the Williamson case because of evidence gathered by the victim's stepfather allegedly refuting Lucas' guilt.

Richardson said Lucas passed polygraph examinations confirming that he falsely confessed to the murders and others.

Lucas gained national attention after confessing to hundreds of murders in various states. But earlier this year, he changed his story and said he was fed information by authorities.


Elias said putting on a seat belt requires only three seconds of the traveler's time but that mental barriers prevent many from doing it.

Frustrated Coca-Cola drinkers pine for soft drink's old flavor

NEW YORK — Eight weeks after the Coca-Cola Co. changed its longtime recipe, many frustrated Coke drinkers are complaining that

the new taste is just not the real thing. "It's a taste tragedy," said Robert Hester, a writer in Jacksonville, Fla.

"It's flat and too sweet," said Kathy Kapture, a Detroit waitress. 'It doesn't have the same fizz, it doesn't quench your thirst and I'm not buying it."

"Completely devoid of any in the company's 87-year history. character at all," declared the Jeffrey Weingarten, an analyst been lacing his one-man shows with Coca-Cola jokes.

All this may sound like a tempest in a cola can, but from Montreal to Monterey, Calif., diehard fans of old Coke are angrily denouncing the idea of tampering with their favorite, hoarding whole cases and paving up to \$1.25 for a 61/2-ounce bottle.

And the company that makes Coke says it has been getting 1,500 phone calls a day, mostly from people who dislike the new taste.

"Obviously, it is an area of concern," said Brian Dyson, the president of Coca-Cola USA. "We want everybody to be absolutely pleased."

If longtime Coke drinkers are not, Pepsi is. "It's a tremendous opportunity for us," said Kenneth Ross, spokeman for Pepsi-Cola USA. "They're trying to move closer in taste to us, and I don't think they've succeeded. Obviously, the real thingwas in real trouble.

But Coca-Cola maintains that the reformulated drink is catching on. The company says sales have doubled since last year and that 110 million consumers have tried the new drink since its debut April 23.

Of those, Coke says, 75 percent would buy it again, which works out to roughly twice the 40 million conunderestimated Reagan in the past sumers who bought old Coke on a

Pepsi, which has been chipping away at Coke's lead in the market, counters that almost half those who tried the new Coke prefer the sweeter taste of Pepsi. And it says its sales rose 14 percent in May to their highest

He estimated that the Pepsi brand's gain probably was in cans, while Dan Lauck, a reporter the 5 percent range and said that with KMOL-TV in San Antonio, spent Coke's decision to introduce the new \$972 for 110 cases of 61/2-ounce bottles. flavor was "a smart gamble."

"I don't think a significant number of Coke drinkers will cease buying Coca-Cola," he said, "and the real opportunity is outside the United States. where Coke outsells Pepsi in those markets 3 to 1. There, the appearance of less carbonation and a sweeter taste probably works to Coke's

But in Seattle, Gay Mullins, a retired businessman, says he cannot see how any change would work to Coke's favor. He switched to beer after tasting the new Coke and has set up a group called Old Cola Drinkers of America. Mullins says he has received 60,000 calls from people who think the new version is "the real bad thing."

He is considering taking Coke to court to try to force it to go back to the old recipe or license its secret formula to someone else, possibilities the company says it will not consider.

Mullins is preparing a mass mailing offering memberships in Old Cola Drinkers at \$5 apiece and says he expects to spend \$30,000 of his own money on the group's telephone bills

and printing expenses. He has received less than \$1,500 in donations.

Do things go better with the new Coke? Not to Duane Larson, who owns Nick's Hamburger Shoppe in Brookings, N.D. "I don't think it's very compatible with food," he said.

Nick's has sold Coca-Cola ever since it opened in 1929, but last week Larson switched to Pepsi.

"We let people sample the new Coke," he said. "Everyone preferred the old Coke."

In Beverly Hills, Calif., a wine shop began selling old Coke by the case for \$30, triple the usual price.

The shop's owner, Dennis Overstreet, said a Coke salesman visited the shop last week, offering to trade the remaining cases of old Coke for the new. Overstreet refused the offer, saying his customers wanted the old flavor. Coke spokesmen in Atlanta said they knew nothing about the offer Overstreet mentioned.

One customer wanted old Coke so much that he bought 100 cases and rented a storage locker. Another man offered \$1,000 for 10 cases and asked that it be delivered to his home in Florida by Federal Express.

Goryunov said the American film industry "only wants to show American movies" compared to the Soviet Union, which presents European, Soviet and American films for Russian viewers.

He was hesitant to give personal views about the American government but said the Soviet people receive much information about the United States during the 40-minute Soviet newscast, "Time."

"Time' is divided into two parts; The first part is Russian and the second part is international news. Practically every evening we see something about the United States," Gorvunov said.



The release of the last 39 passengers and crew members from TWA Flight 847 ended one of the worst hijackings in aviation history. Here are the key events in the 16-day ordeal.

June 14 - Two Shiite gunmen hijack the Boeing 727 shortly after it takes off from Athens, Greece, bound for Rome with 145 passengers and eight crew members aboard.

The plane is allowed to land in Beirut, Lebanon, after the pilot says one hijacker has pulled the pin on a grenade. The hijackers free 19 American women and children, then fly to Algeria where 19 American women, one American child and three people of other nationalities are released. June 15 - The aircraft returns to Beirut, where some passengers are taken off. The hijackers

beat and shoot to death Navy diver Robert Dean Stethem, 23. After ordering the plane back to Algiers, the hijackers release 53 passengers and flight attendants. The hijackers win the release of a comrade arrested at the Athens airport.

June 16 - A letter signed by 29 passengers appeals to President Reagan to refrain from "any direct military action on our behalf."

The Shiite Amal militia moves into the crisis, demanding freedom for more than 700 Lebanese

prisoners held by Israel. The remaining passengers are taken off the aircraft.

June 17 - Amal leader Nabih Berri says the hostages have been split up to thwart a rescue mission. National Security Adviser Robert C. McFarlane says Berri "has in his hands the ability to end

Ailing hostage Robert Peel Sr. of Hutchinson, Kan., is released June 18 — The hijackers release Greek singer Demis Roussos, his American companion Pamela

Smith, and Greek-American Arthur Targon Tsidis. At a news conference, President Reagan says that any retaliation "would probably be sentencing a number of Americans to death." Reagan accuses the Greek government of lax airport security.

June 20 - Five hostages appear at a chaotic news conference and appeal to Reagan "at all costs" to refrain from a rescue mission. Allyn Conwell, 39, of Houston, Texas, says he wants Israel to free the Lebanese prisoners. Stethem is buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

June 24 - Israel releases 31 Shiite prisoners, insisting there is no linkage to the hostages in Lebanon. Arnal leaders dismiss the gesture as insufficient to bring about the release of the Americans, and Berri demands that U.S. ships pull back.

June 25 - The British and Italian ambassadors meet Berri, and Syria takes a public role in

White House spokesman Larry Speakes says Reagan is considering forcing Beirut airport to close and blockading Lebanon. Amal gathers all 37 hostage passengers together to meet two International Red Cross officials,

and the three crew members are visited separately

June 26 — Berri releases hostage Jimmy Dell Palmer, 48, who suffers from a heart condition. He also suggests putting the hostages in a Western embassy in Beirut or moving them to Syria, in exchange for the release of Israel's Shiite detainees.

June 28 - Berri holds a farewell banquet for most of the hostages at a luxury hotel amid signs that behind-the-scenes diplomacy and Syrian influence have led to an agreement to free them. June 29 - The hostages' release is delayed by a demand from Shiite Moslem leaders for U.S. and Israeli guarantees that they won't be any retaliation.

June 30 - The Americans leave for Damascus in a Red Cross convoy.



Hurricane star signs with favorite team

CLEVELAND - Former University of Miami quarterback Bernie Kosar, owner of a huge contract to play in 1985 with the Cleveland Browns of the National Football League, said Tuesday he is glad to be able to get his thinking back to football.

The Browns followed through on their game plan and selected Kosar Tuesday as the first pick in the NFL's supplemental draft.

Kosar, who grew up in the northeastern Ohio community of Boardman, had said he wanted to play for the Browns and reportedly wound up with a signing bonus and five, one-year contracts believed to be worth about \$6 million.

Cleveland majority ownert Art Modell and other officials of the team refused to detail terms. Modell said only that the deal is either the largest or among the largest contracts in the history of the Cleveland team.

"It's a real pleasure to be here and to finally put an end to this whole ordeal, and I'm looking for-

ward to a long career here," Kosar said at a news conference. "I'm not looking at this in terms of what string I'll be on."

Modell had his staff notify the NFL headquarters in New York on Monday that Kosar would be the No. 1 choice in the Tuesday draft, which took only about 10 minutes and was conducted via telephone and telex at the league's New York

Kosar had two years of eligibilty left at Miami, but became eligible for the supplemental draft last week by graduating one year early with a major in business and finance.

Kosar was red-shirted his first year at Miami. He led the Hurricanes to a national championship in 1983. In two seasons, he passed for 40 touchdowns and 5,971 yards.

Cleveland got the supplemental first pick from the Buffalo Bills prior to the regular draft in a complicated and controversial deal that sent four Cleveland draft choices, including Cleveland's first in 1985 and 1986, to Buffalo. In making the deal, Buffalo forfeited its own first pick in 1986.
