

New program designed to triple student jobs

A new employment program is intended to triple the number of students Texas Tech places in off-campus jobs, according to the program's coordinator, Carole Kelly.

The program also is geared toward making Lubbock businesses aware that students are looking for jobs, she said.

The new program is being funded with \$25,000 that was transferred from Tech's federal work study program effective Sept. 1.

"The program is geared primarily toward off-campus jobs, to find jobs more suited to students' majors with better pay," Kelly said.

For example, accounting majors can try to find jobs with certified public accountants and pre-law majors can find jobs with law firms.

Tommie Beckwith, associate director of student loans and financial aid, said the program, named Job Location and Development, is an expansion of the current placement department in the financial aid office.

"We're trying to expand the jobs available to students and get more Lubbock businesses to place more jobs

with us," she said.

The program will be open to any student in search of a job, Kelly said.

"The program is for the student who doesn't fit into any of the financial aid parameters but is in need of a job and money. Everyone is hurting since tuition was tripled," she said.

The number of students seeking financial assistance has increased 40 percent since last year, Kelly said.

"Last year Tech placed 1,000 of 3,000 students who came to us for referrals, which is about 34 percent. We had 1,200 jobs listed," she said.

Ronny Barnes, director of financial aid, said the \$25,000 could directly fund about 20 students' salaries, but by directing the money to job development, several hundred jobs could become available to students.

Kelly said she hopes the program and shift of funds is a continuous effort.

"The service is available right now, and we hope more jobs will come in," she said. "We hope more and more funds can be transferred into the program as the years go by."

Kelly said Tech's program is patterned after a similar program at the University of Texas at Arlington, where more than \$5 million has been generated



for student referrals.

"It will be several years before our program is up to par with other programs. It will just take time," she said.

The program will officially begin with a mass mailing campaign and various speeches to Lubbock business organizations, Kelly said.

While the federal government approved the fund transfer, Kelly said Tech had to assure the government that more than \$25,000 would be generated in students' salaries through the development program.

Current legislation requires that a maximum of 15 percent of the school's work study allocation, up to \$25,000, can be used for job development.

Barnes said Tech also had to promise to put the same amount of institutional funding into the program as before and not substitute the transferred funds for any other purposes.

"We have to prove to the government there is a need for better quality, better paying jobs for students," Kelly said.

Jobs still ultimately may go to applicants outside Tech, but Kelly said at least the program will give more students an opportunity to try for jobs.

"Employers think students will still work for minimum wage, but students are leaning toward the higher paying jobs. Hopefully, increased wages will become a trend for student employees," Kelly said.

She said she sees no way the program can fail. "We haven't kicked off yet, but by the spring semester, we hope to be rolling," she said.

Students interested in working part-time should fill out a short application in the financial aid office. Available jobs are posted by number with short job descriptions, hours, wages and requirements, Kelly said.

Applicants list the jobs in which they are interested and then are pre-screened by staff counselors, she said.

Heavy rains and twisters strike Texas

Heavy rains soaked East Texas Monday and brought a small cluster of tornadoes to the southeastern section of the state, but no major damages or flooding was reported, authorities said.

A band of heavy thunderstorms pushed east through the state, spawning about five twisters that were sighted in Fort Bend and Wharton counties, weather experts said.

"This was all from the same general storm. Probably some small twisters touched down in that area," said Gary Beeler, a National Weather Service meteorologist in Houston.

A flash flood watch was posted for Southeast Texas from Corpus Christi to Temple, and flash flood warnings were in effect Monday afternoon for Fort Bend and Wharton counties.

The Wharton County sheriff's office reported two tornadoes sighted in the area Monday morning, one near Bonus and one near East Bernard. No damage was found except for a small metal building that overturned near East Bernard, a sheriff's dispatcher said.

In Fort Bend County, sheriff's office said they had an unconfirmed report of a tornado touchdown near FM 1952 in Tavener in the western part of the county. Two other sightings were reported in the same area, authorities said.

Fort Bend County Sheriff's dispatcher Denise Isenberg said no injuries were reported and the only damage was to a house.

"We've got several roads that are flooded; I don't know how many. But they're not major roads," Isenberg said.

Hardest hit by the showers was Eagle Lake, which recorded 7.8 inches, the weather service said. Huntsville had 3.98 inches of rain and Conroe had 2.25.

Several streets and highways were flooded between Rosenberg and Eagle Lake, the weather service reported. Highway 90 between Eagle Lake and Lissie was closed, and water on the highway west of East Bernard was eight inches deep and rising.

Walker County authorities reported heavy rains in the area, but no severe flooding.

"We've got a few county roads that were washed out but nothing major," said a sheriff's spokeswoman who declined to give her name.

In East Texas, heavy rains flooded some streets and prompted travel advisories, and residents of an apartment complex were evacuated.

Henderson police said about 75 residents of an eastside apartment building were evacuated about 4 a.m. Monday after a small creek nearby overflowed its banks.

"Water was up past the electrical outlets inside the apartments," said a police spokeswoman who declined to be identified. Police said the evacuated residents would probably be able to return to their homes by nightfall.

South Africa may oust workers

JOHANNESBURG — The government, declaring that "charity begins at home," said Monday it may have to send home thousands of foreign black workers if sanctions force more South Africans out of work.

Minister of Manpower Pietie du Plessis denied a report in an influential financial newspaper that the government already had approved the expulsion of some of the 1.5 million black foreign workers, many of whom work in the gold and diamond mines that supply much of South Africa's hard currency.

But du Plessis said "contingency plans" were being drafted to send home foreign blacks if necessary in the future. "This action has been forced on the South African government by those who favor sanctions and disinvestment without having regard for the detrimental effect on innocent people," he said.

"Since charity begins at home, the government has no option but to give preference to the needs of its own citizens as regards job opportunities," du Plessis said in a statement issued in Pretoria, the capital. **Business Day**, which closely

reflects the thinking of business leaders, reported that the expulsions had been endorsed by senior Cabinet and military officials. An accompanying front-page editorial said the "mad and provocative act" would ensure tougher foreign steps against South Africa.

Support for sanctions, even if they mean increased hardship, are viewed by many as a peaceful way of pressuring the white-led government to move away from apartheid and to share power with the black majority.

The government hinted two months ago at the possibility of expelling foreign workers if sanctions and divestment damage the economy and drive up unemployment. President P.W. Botha has said sanctions would hurt blacks within South Africa and in neighboring countries more than whites.

The tiny kingdom of Lesotho, for example, derives at least 50 percent of its gross national product from 139,000 of its workers who are employed in South African mines.

Zambia has endorsed sanctions, while other countries such as Zimbabwe and Mozambique agree in principle but say their economies

could not stand retaliatory South African pressure applied because of sanctions.

Mozambican leader Samora Machel called for international pressure during his recent trip to the United States but said his country would be hurt by expulsions because 60,000 Mozambicans legally work in South Africa.

The **Business Day** story sent shock waves through the mining industry, which employs about 210,000 foreign blacks. Many of South Africa's own blacks shun dangerous underground mining jobs, making the industry dependent on foreign migrant workers.

The government says 350,000 foreign blacks are legally employed in South Africa, while 1.2 million are illegally employed.

Police reported sporadic anti-apartheid rioting around the country but no new deaths in the 15-month-old violence that has left at least 800 dead. Several clashes occurred Sunday and early Monday in Mamelodi, one of Pretoria's black townships not previously involved in unrest.

Plane crash results in deaths of residents

CLIFFSIDE PARK, N.J. — Investigators inventoried wreckage strewn over 20 blocks Monday and impounded air traffic control recordings to determine why two planes collided and crashed into two New York City suburbs, killing at least five people.

A sixth person was missing and was believed to have been in his apartment when a burning corporate jet slammed into two buildings here late Sunday afternoon, igniting a fire that also engulfed three other buildings.

Fourteen people were in the two buildings, and "13 had time to escape," said state police Capt. Joseph Craparotta.

"I was listening to the stereo and the next thing I knew my windows blew in. In three seconds, I was out the door," said Joseph Gramuglia, 29, whose apartment was gutted. "Red flames .. all red flames. There were people all over the place."

Three bodies were found in the debris of a light propeller plane which struck the front porch of a two-story apartment building about five blocks away in Fairview. No bodies were recovered from the jet, which was owned by Nabisco Brands Inc., but the pilot and co-pilot were listed as dead.

Each piece of wreckage was to be "itemized and tagged" as part of the reconstruction of the crash, said Na-

tional Transportation Safety Board spokesman Ira J. Furman.

Tape-recordings of conversations between the pilots and the tower at Teterboro Airport about five miles away were impounded, Furman said.

The jet was equipped with a flight recorder but it had not been recovered, said Nabisco spokesman Melvin Greyson.

The jet's pilot said he saw the Piper Cherokee and the pilot of the smaller plane said he was clear of the area where the Falcon 50 was supposed to be as they flew over the densely populated suburbs across the Hudson River from Manhattan, said Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Peter Nelson.

The missing man was identified as Abdullah Taha, 34, an emigrant from the Middle East who was sleeping in a second-floor apartment he shared with his brother's family.

The jet's pilot, Capt. Gregory Miller, 36, of Danbury, Conn., had logged 9,000 flight hours in years of corporate flying, Nabisco spokeswoman Caroline Fee said. His co-pilot, Allen Stitt, 30, of Highlands, had 4,350 flight hours.

One victim from the smaller plane was identified as Lucia Nocha, 51, of Brooklyn, N.Y. A man's body was believed to be her husband, Henry Sr., based on an interview with their son, Craparotta said. The third victim in that plane was presumed to be the pilot.

Airlines to offer discount

FORT WORTH — Three of the biggest U.S. airlines announced Thanksgiving fare cuts of up to 85 percent Monday to lure impulse travelers who otherwise would stay home during the four-day holiday.

American Airlines was the first to offer the sharply reduced fares, and was quickly followed by United and Delta.

Mike W. Gunn, American's senior vice president for passenger marketing, said a "48-hour Thanksgiving special" on the nation's second largest carrier applies on flights from Thanksgiving day, Nov. 28, through noon Saturday Nov. 30. One-way coach fares will cost \$29 for trips of 500 miles or less, \$49 for flights of 501 to 1,500 miles, and \$79 for flights of more than 1,500 miles.

Chuck Novak, a spokesman for No. 1 United Airlines, said in response that United will "match American in

the markets in which it competes with American."

Delta Air Lines announced later in a press statement that it would cut fares on flights to 100 U.S. cities by 70 percent in the Thanksgiving period, and then added that the same fares would be offered for the three days after Christmas.

Northwest, Continental and Braniff airlines said they had no immediate comment on the fare reductions. But Russell Marchetta, spokesman for People Express Airlines Inc., said the fast-growing, no-frills carrier had no plans to match the offers.

"Most Thanksgiving travelers already have made plans for Wednesday-Sunday," Marchetta said. "We don't see this as hurting our flights."

Some airline-industry analysts saw the fare reduction as part of a pricing strategy in which carriers offer discounts during specific dates when they know passenger traffic will be light.

Dr. William Glasser, author of Reality Therapy, will conduct a workshop on Control Theory Thursday in cooperation with the Texas Tech Division of Continuing Education.

Sometimes called common sense therapy, reality therapy involves "helping people figure out what they want, which is the key to helping people solve their problems," according to Barbara Garner, regional director of Sunbelt Association for Reality Therapy.

Control therapy is a method of understanding what an individual needs and directing that individual toward the correct behavior that will satisfy those needs, Garner said.

Unhappy or irresponsible people blame their difficulties on others and see themselves as victims, according

to Garner. The workshop will give guidelines to help individuals recognize their irresponsible behavior and correct it.

The workshop is directed toward "those whose job it is to help others solve their problems," Garner said. "Those specifically interested might be teachers, parents, counselors, ministers, doctors, anyone in the mental health field or corrections and social workers."

The workshop will be at Lubbock Plaza at 3201 South Loop 289 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Thursday. Pre-registration, through the Tech Division of Continuing Education, costs \$40 and includes lunch, breaks and a copy of Glasser's color chart. On-site registration will cost \$45. Local lawyer announces county GOP candidacy

A Lubbock lawyer entered the race for chairman of the Lubbock County Republican Party Monday, promising to bring Democrats and independents into the party through a new political action committee (PAC).

Mark Griffin, 31, said the formation of the PAC, dubbed "Republicans Reaching Out," will help the county GOP broaden its base and raise money.

"I see some real opportunity out there to broaden the base, to raise some money and, most importantly, to have a pool of qualified candidates to run for office," Griffin said.

Griffin said the PAC will employ a direct-mailing campaign to reach all of Lubbock's 105,362 registered voters. Griffin estimated that a direct-mail campaign will cost the PAC between \$5,000 and \$6,000.

"Our desire is more people than dollars in this particular campaign," Griffin said, "and we're not going to be asking for contributions in the mailing campaign."

Voters who respond to the mailings will be given more information about the Lubbock County GOP, Griffin said.

"Once those desires or requests are made known, we will continue to furnish information regarding the party and place these people in positions of

service as they desire," he said. Griffin said the PAC will be funded by individual contributions and by appeals to other conservative PACs in the state.

The mailing campaign probably will begin in January, Griffin said. Griffin spoke about the important role of independent "crossover" votes in recent elections.

"They've (independents) been dating this party for some time now, and I think it's time we started talking marriage," Griffin said. "It's time these people became a part of the Republican Party in Lubbock County."

Griffin said the Republican Party in Lubbock is stronger than ever and should benefit from Kent Hance's bid for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

"I'm convinced that today, the Republican Party in Lubbock County is stronger than it's ever been before," he said. "I think Kent Hance's candidacy is going to have an impact on Lubbock County."

Griffin said he is hoping for a record number of voters in the May Republican primary.

He estimated that the total number of Republican voters could exceed 15,000, as opposed to the approximately 6,000 Republican votes cast during the last primary in May 1984.

Griffin said he does not think his candidacy for the GOP slot will be divisive. He is the only candidate for the position to date.

"There's no better way to unify a group than to have a common goal, and I think the 'Republicans Reaching Out' can help," he said.

"I'm not basing my candidacy on what anybody in the past has or has not done."

The incumbent GOP county chairwoman, Jane Cansino, has not declared for re-election.

dinner at the British Embassy.

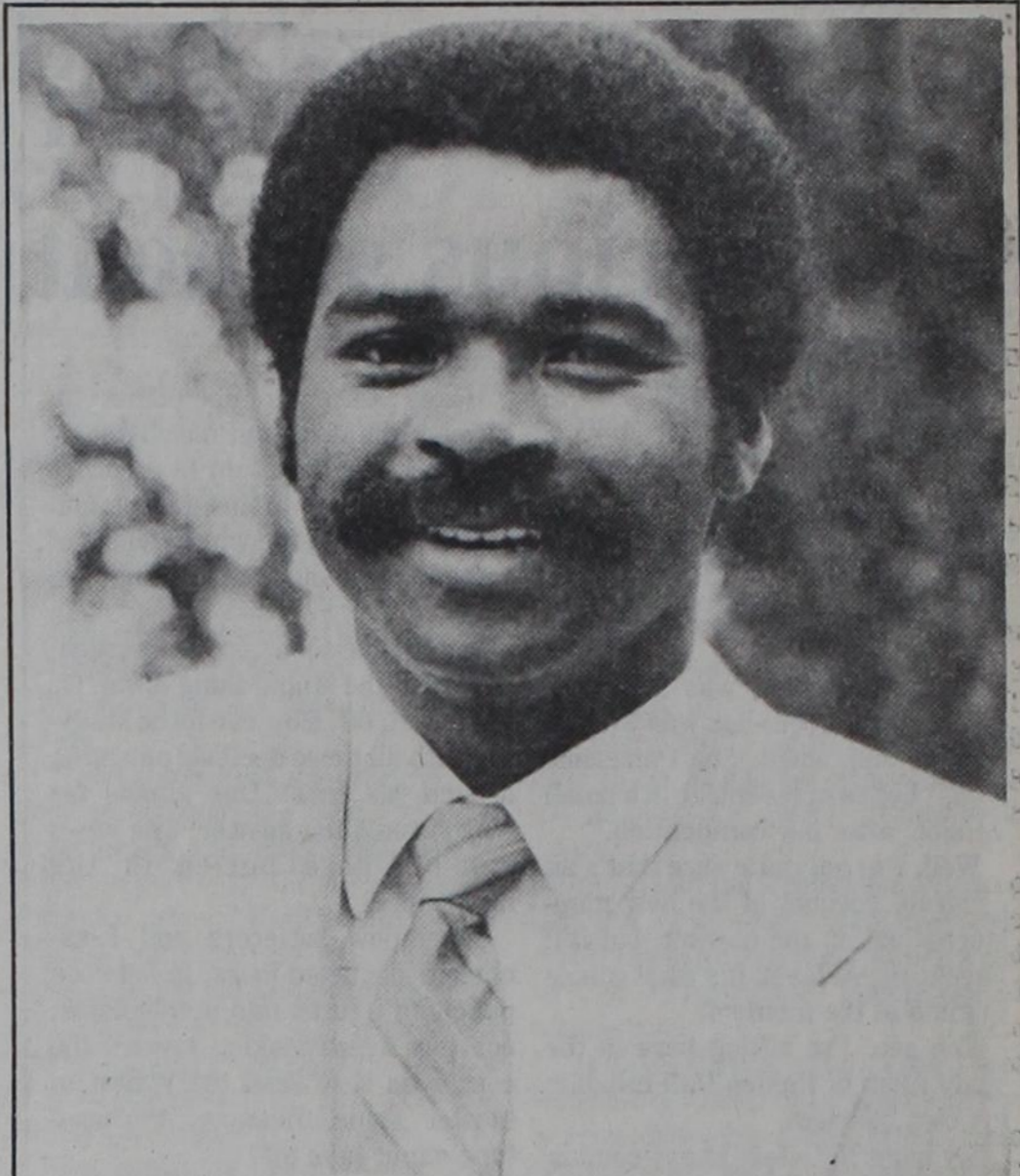

Sting brings on the bore with new movie

Sting is fond of calling his new movie, "Bring on the Night," a documentary. He'll tell you this documentary deals with the formation of his new jazz/rock band, a film about how a group of unorganized musicians eventually come together to give a rousing opening night performance.

Now that would be a documentary. Unfortunately, "Bring on the Night" almost completely ignores the potentially interesting story of a band's formation and instead concentrates on Sting's philosophical ramblings. You walk out of the theater knowing, without question, that Sting

is highly impressed with himself.

This could have been a fine film had it lived up to its billing as a documentary. Watching would-be members audition for a place in the band could have made for an excellent scene, but those decisions already had been made by the time the film opened.

Brief interviews with members of the band prove to be some of the more interesting footage in the movie. Although it probably wasn't the intention of the director, the band members come across as being far more human and believable than Sting. The bass player wonders how much power other members had in making decisions concerning the band.

Manager Miles Copeland spoke frankly on that subject. "Members want to know how much they are going to be paid for performing, how

much money is on the table... Man, that's Sting's table. He owns it."

It's a copout that Copeland never was filmed telling that to the members of the band. Producers filled the screen with a bunch of forced fun-loving scenes with Sting and the band (they were all too aware of the camera) but backed off from more challenging scenes that might have featured the band discussing money, authority and power.

Seeing the band rehearse and play together in a casual atmosphere provides some of the film's better moments. One gets a fair idea of what a group of musicians goes through before the opening night of a major concert. Some of the effect is tarnished by an overt consciousness of the camera, but overall it probably gives an accurate glimpse into the processes of preparing for a major tour.

Sting fans undoubtedly will enjoy the occasional close, personal conversations with the former lead singer of the Police. There he is, sitting in a comfortable den wearing this homely sweater, striking several serious poses.

When asked if he gets what he dreams about, Sting answers "yes" and begins reminiscing about lying on a hotel bed after a tough concert. He says he heard a window cleaner whistling "Roxanne" and "that was it. I almost wept."

That type of heavy-handed remark is common with Sting.

The final scene has the band come together for the opening night of the tour. They are sharp, producing an energetic jazz sound that is clear and consistent. But there's no saving this self-serving "documentary."

Jeffcoat living up to potential

IRVING — Jim Jeffcoat is fast making Dallas Cowboys' fans forget Harvey Martin.

Jeffcoat, a No. 1 draft choice from Arizona State in 1983, sacked Washington quarterback Joe Theismann five times Sunday in Dallas' 13-7 National Football League victory.

It was a club record for sacks in one game.

The quiet-spoken Jeffcoat, who plays right defensive end alongside tackle Randy White, said, "I'm speechless."

As a starter, the 6-foot-5, 263-pound Jeffcoat took over from Martin, who was a co-MVP of Super Bowl XII with White.

"It took me a year to start feeling

comfortable in our defense," said Jeffcoat. "Theismann has always given me a lot of trouble in the past. The guy is an All-Pro, and it felt great to have a game like I did against him."

Jeffcoat said "teams keep double-teaming and triple-teaming Randy and that just leaves me one-on-one with my man."

The biggest sack came with 33 seconds to go when Jeffcoat nailed Theismann with a 13-yard sack just after the Redskins had moved into Dallas' territory.

Dallas Coach Tom Landry said Jeffcoat was the team's most improved player in 1984 and that he keeps getting better.

"We thought he had that kind of potential when we drafted him No. 1 in 1983 and once he took over the position he seemed to get better as the season went on," said Landry. "By

the end of the year he was making a lot of big plays. I can see a bright future for him."

Landry said what he likes about Jeffcoat is that he gives 100 per cent on every play.

"He's a hustler, a competitor, and he keeps after the man with the ball," said Landry.

Jeffcoat had 11 traps last season and recovered a fumble in the New Orleans' end zone for a touchdown.

"He's tough," said defensive coordinator Ernie Stautner. "He uses a lot of power to reach the quarterback."

Jeffcoat said since he was a rookie he had been aware of the Cowboys' tradition of excellent defensive line play.

"There have been some great defensive ends like Martin and George Andrie," said Jeffcoat. "I want to keep that tradition alive."

Campbell: Oilers will rise again

HOUSTON — Houston Oilers Coach Hugh Campbell had two points to make Monday about the weekend's 20-0 loss to Buffalo: The weather didn't cause the defeat and the Oilers will play well again.

"I'm not sure we had that big of a letdown," Campbell said. "We had some individual breakdowns, but in spite of that, this team will bounce back and play well again."

The Oilers, 4-6, ended a three-game winning streak Sunday on a cold, rainy day in Orchard Park, N.Y.

They'll try to rebound Sunday in the

constant 72-degree temperatures of the Astrodome against Pittsburgh, which also has blanked the Oilers 20-0 this season.

Houston quarterback Warren Moon completed only three of 14 passes and was intercepted three times before leaving the game early in the fourth quarter.

"I wouldn't want anyone to get out of here with the false feeling that the weather is what did us in," Campbell said. "The weather had an equal effect on both teams."

Campbell said the Oilers lost the game because they didn't take advantage of their chances.

"Maybe I'm trying to make it too

simple, but it seems we didn't take advantage of our turnovers and they took advantage of theirs," Campbell said.

The Oilers suffered six turnovers in the game and bare-footed punter Lee Johnson averaged only 30.2 yards on six punts. Campbell thinks Johnson, a rookie from Brigham Young, might have been affected by the weather.

"He says he kicks better like that in those conditions," Campbell said. "I don't have the experience to question it, but I do have the common sense to wonder. We'll have to talk some more about it."

Tech went ahead 6-1 and coasted the rest of the way, the last points coming on an ace by Becky Boxwell and another block by Blasingame, this time with aid from Debbie Crown.

"Angelo State doesn't bring out the best in us," Tech coach Donna Martin said. "We didn't want to go five games with them."

After a poor first game, the Tech spikers may have wondered if the match would last more than three. The Rambelles set the tone from the very beginning with a block to take a 1-0 lead. ASU was out to a 4-0 score before Mary Loescher got the Raiders' lone point for the game. Four Tech errors quickly ran the count to 3-1, and it was off to the races.

Tech soon found itself and jumped out to a 9-0 lead on the blocking of Blasingame and Sweeten. Crown helped an early rally in the third game with two scores to grab a 6-2 advantage. Blasingame and Boxwell combined for four points to close the game at 15-7.

The fourth game saw ASU crawl back from a 7-2 deficit to get within one at 10-9. Again, Raider miscues put the Rambelles ahead to stay, this time at 12-11.

"I played up and down," Blasingame said. "We blocked pretty well; we were strong at the net. We knew they had a scrappy defense but we got off to a slow start and finally got going during the second game."

Setters Sweeten and Loescher each drew praise from Martin for their performance, which included 14 kills, 15 digs and 32 assists by Sweeten and a .417 hitting percentage by Loescher.
