Roberson has written and published other songs, too... country, patriotic and religious.

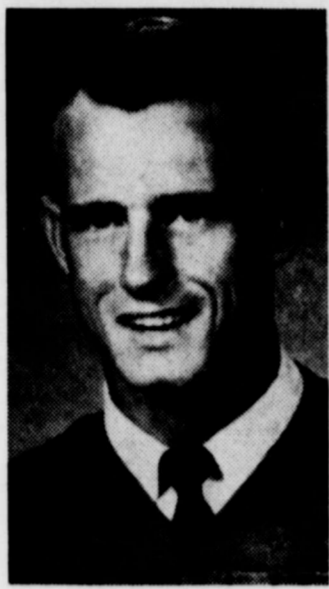

## Runnels Association For Retarded Children Organized In Ballinger

Runnels County association for Retarded children was organized May 7th in Ballinger with Mr. Wade Whitley, Vice-president of The Texas Association for Retarded Children, and Mr. Emory Parrot, past president of the Midland Council, to explain the purposes and aim of the organization.

A county survey is being made to determine the needs of the county. Parents of handicapped children are asked to fill out the questionnaire and send it to the association. All correspondence will be held in strict confidence. The object is to help the child and his family, for the handicapped can be helped.

The association will aid all people of all ages be they retarded mentally or physically, also any child needing additional help in speech, reading or math will be helped.

People living in surrounding counties will be aided by the Runnels association to solve their problems.

Mr. Whitley stated that there are 200 known causes for mental retardation. Research is being conducted to help prevent many of these causes. Of the estimated 8,000 retarded children born each year in Texas, the cost of institutional care is said to cost from \$75,000 to \$100,000 during the child's life time.

Ballinger and Winters school now have special education classes for handicapped children. The association said it hopes to have special education work expanded in the county.

Mr. Parrot and Mr. Whitley expressed satisfaction in the 60 assembled people. Mr. Parrot said that when Midland organized in 1959 only 50 people attended. Within five years their membership has increased 25 per cent.

The first project, he said, was preschool instruction. Then an opportunity center was begun to teach children to play and work together. Starting with

## Thormeyer Will Demonstrate New 4-Wheel Drive Tractor Monday

E. E. Thormeyer of Farm Equipment Co. has scheduled a public field demonstration of the new 4-wheel drive Case 1200 Traction King tractor. The date has been set for May 18, one mile west of town near the Commercial Feeders lot.

Designed to trim production on large-acreage tillage operations, the new Case 1200 with an 8-bottom plow will handle 40 to 65 acres a day.

The press box which is located at the top of the east bleacher section, has been rebuilt and enlarged. The platform on the south of the old press box which has been used by cameramen in the past has been enclosed, and a new door made at the head of the center aisle of the bleachers. The new entrance to the press box will make the press box more accessible. Also, a booth will be available for radio announcers. Cameramen will be in the south section of the press box, with the public address system in the center. Considerably more room will be available for the working reporters.

Smith also said that the old radio pens, which have been located on the north end of the football field, have been removed, and the area has been leveled and grass started. This area will be used for workouts, it was understood.

Other construction work in the school area includes a new sidewalk on the west side of the high school building. Heights Street, adjoining the school plant on the west, was recently paved.

## Steve Grissom, Winters High Athlete, Gets Scholarship At McMurry College

McMurry College, Abilene, announced this week the recent signing of one of the best known football and track stars in the schoolboy ranks, Steve Grissom of Winters. Grissom was signed to a full football and track scholarship.

Present during the signing were McMurry coaches Grant Teaff and Buddy Fornes.

"Lots of other colleges wanted Grissom," Teaff said, "and we are real happy to get him. We feel that he will fit into our program real well, and he is the kind of boy we want at McMurry."

During the past season, the 5-11, 170-pound halfback of the Winters High School Blizzards was named to the all-district, all-area, and second team all-state football teams.

Last year he won district in both the 120-yard high hurdles and the 180-yard low hurdles. His career best times are 14.4 in the highs and 19.9 in the lows.

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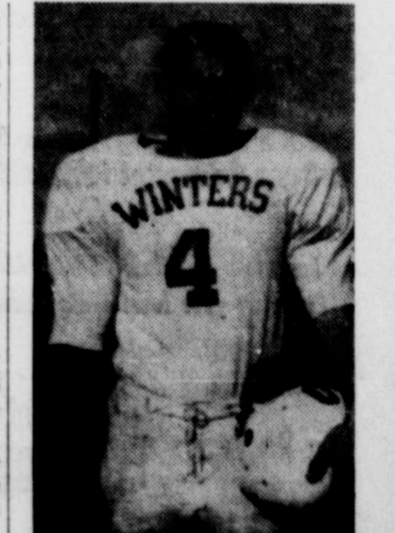

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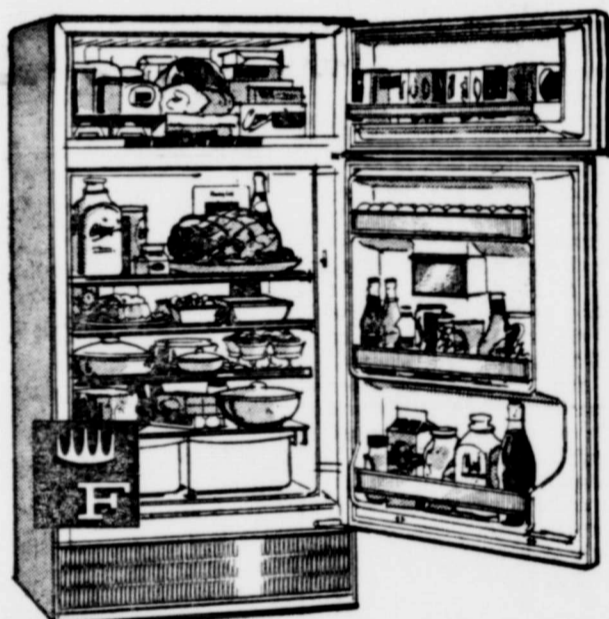

The subcommittee has instructions "to study and make recommendations — concerning proposed standards of conduct or pending litigation, civil and criminal."

**HIGHER EDUCATION BOOSTED**  
The Committee of Governing Boards of State Colleges and Universities called for "a giant step" to upgrade higher education in Texas next year.

In a new brochure, the voluntary group of regents from different institutions terms 1965 a "year of destiny" for education. Meanwhile, Gov. John Connally's Committee on Education Beyond the High School got together to edit its preliminary draft of a report on how to achieve that "giant step" necessary to make Texas colleges and universities best in the U. S.

**MISSING PERSONS SEARCH**  
The State of Texas is looking for hundreds of "missing persons" who have left possessions ranging from a 50-cent piece to a \$239.62 unclaimed payroll check in various depositories for seven years or more, and failed to provide forwarding addresses.

In a final effort to find these people, before their property is escheated by the State, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has filed a lawsuit in the 53rd District Court of Travis County, entitled: The State of Texas vs. R. E. James Gravel Co. and others. Names of the "missing persons" filled three and one-half newspaper columns in the May 1, 1964, Austin American, to fulfill the requirement for advertising for missing owners of property subject to escheat. Persons with any claim to the property listed should file their answers to the suit in the 53rd District Court before June 8.

**OPINIONS**  
The "Calcutta Pool," a betting system used in some sporting events, such as horse races, golf tournaments, tennis matches, skeet and trap shooting, is illegal, according to Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr. He says the Calcutta Pool system constitutes a lottery. State Highway Commission announced "a sweeping program" to build more than 1,000 miles of new farm-to-market roads in 166 Texas counties.

With 37,143 miles of FM roads now in the state, the estimated \$23,000,000 project would bring the total to more than 38,075 miles.

The sprawling Farm-to-Market system began with a 6-mile stretch built in 1936 between Mount Enterprise and Shiloh in Rusk County. Commission's

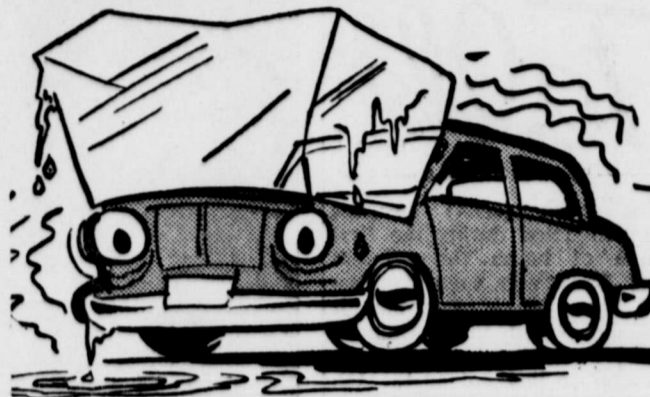

### Congress Slows Down As Summer Weather Nears

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

Like a road block, stalled by an accident up front, the Congress is dragging its feet as the Summer months arrive. The House started out in a blaze of speed. Six of the annual appropriation bills were promptly approved, and others are moving ahead of schedule. The tax bill sailed through, and the House also okayed the so-called civil rights measure.

Early this year the leadership talked of an early recess, probably by mid-July. But this is election year, and the answer to the dreams of the top politicians has in recent years been those Negro bloc votes, come November. Hence the civil rights bill, the "accident" ahead which has caused the road block.

Indeed the politicians are so anxious to capture those colored votes that they have virtually shut down the entire machinery of government, so far as the Congress is concerned, in a bid for kind words from such prominent agitators as Martin Luther King, Roy Wilkins, CORE leaders, the Urban League and others. By putting the civil rights bill first, to the exclusion of all other legislation, the Senate leaders invited the filibuster which may continue for weeks.

By a one-vote margin the Senate last week refused to allow defendants the right of trial by jury in criminal contempt cases arising out of racial issues. It was the Senate's first attempt to modify the civil rights measure.

The Senate has not considered a single appropriation bill, and very little of anything this year except the tax bill—so intent is the leadership, both Democratic and Republican—on corralling those Negro votes in November.

Negroes now represent 10.5 per cent of the total population. That makes them the biggest single minority bloc. One astute politician observed: "Every one knows the civil rights bill is bad legislation, but the political party that dominates in the future simply must be able to count on those bloc votes when the going is rough. It is like finding a pot of gold at the end of the rainbow!"

The American Cancer Society reports that legacies and bequests have become a major factor in financing the fight against cancer through research, education and service programs. In 1952 the Society received \$590,123 in bequests and legacies, and in 1963 more than \$7,000,000.

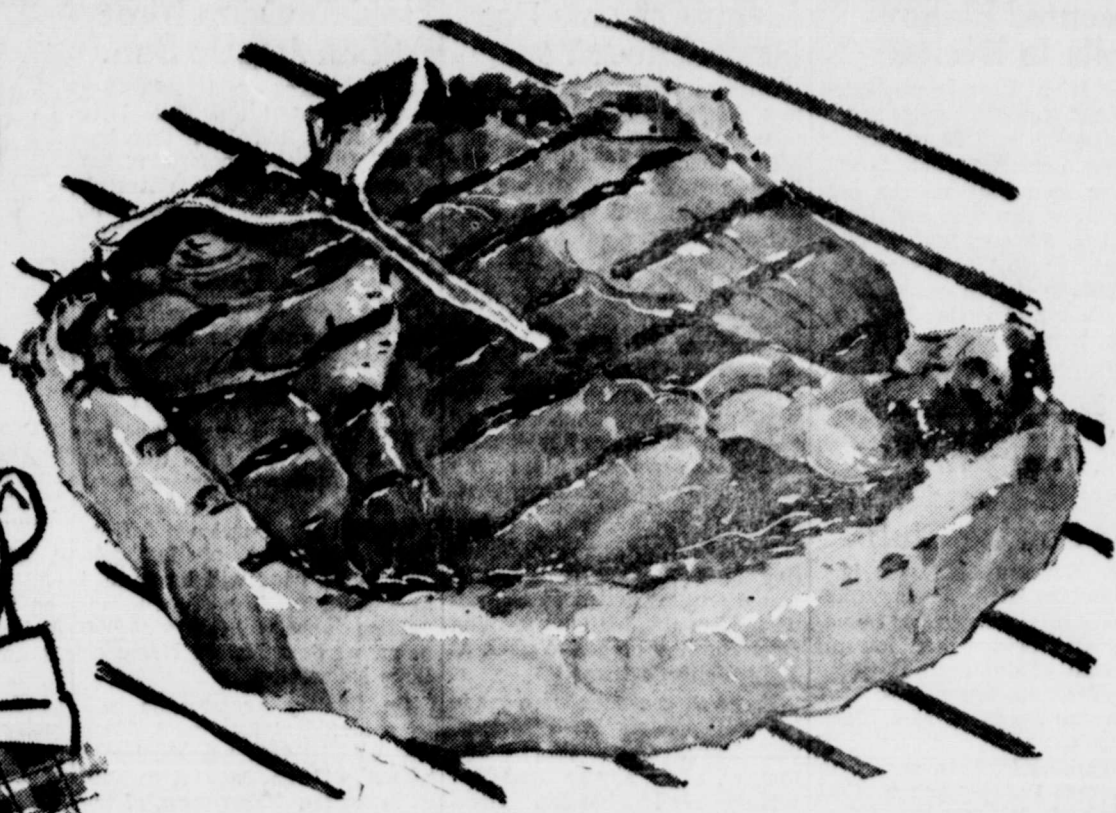
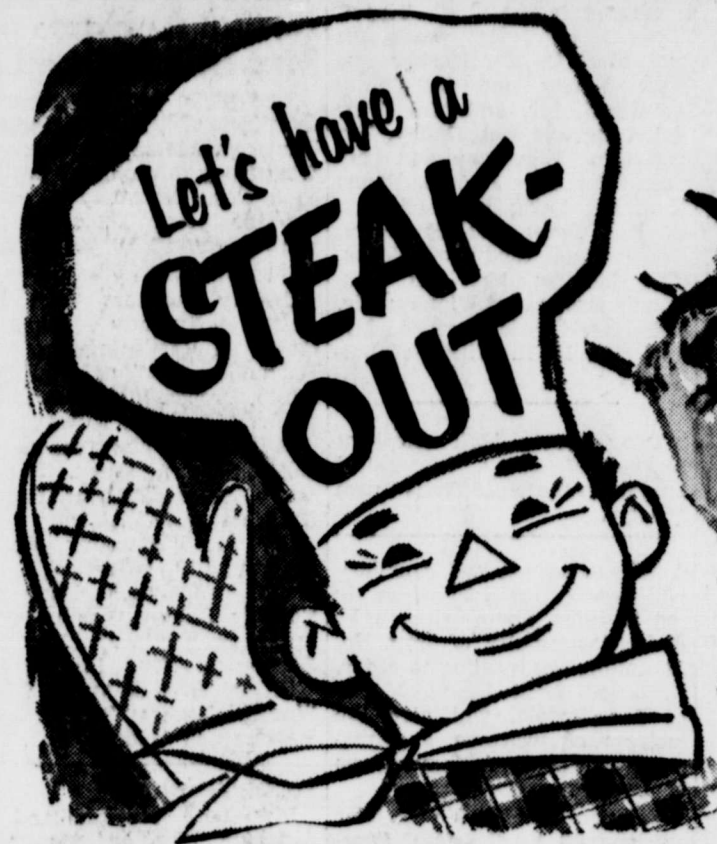
