The only defense against this threat are constant awareness and redoubled efforts toward safety. An automobile will travel a given number of feet, according to the speed it is moving, during a thousandth-of-a-second flick of the eyelids; this moment is exactly what this spectre is waiting for—he plays a fast game once it is started. The chances for the game to be won by this deadly challenger increase many times during the spring and summer months, when school is out and children are moving about more frequently and in greater numbers. This fact should be engraved on the mind of every driver.

Plumbing has been installed for offices and rest rooms which will be built in the building at a later date. The building will serve all departments of the city, with room for rolling equipment to be moved in for maintenance and repair, and also furnish room for small-stock storage.

"Head Start" Program To Begin Here Next Monday, U. S. Money In Project

The summer "Head Start" program for pre-school children will begin at the Winters school Monday, June 13, George M. Beard, principal of the elementary school, has announced.

Beard will be director of the program again this summer.

The program is being financed again by a Federal grant, with a total of \$10,107.00 received for this year.

All parents of children who have been authorized for enrollment in the summer program have been asked to bring their children to the school on the opening day. A reception will be held in the school cafeteria at which time the program will be fully explained to parents.

Project Director Beard said the program, which will last for eight weeks, will be completely integrated.

The "Head Start" program is designed primarily to give underprivileged children who will enter the public schools for the first time in September an opportunity to become familiar with school and class procedure.

Swim Lessons Begin June 27 At City Pool

Swimming lessons will be offered again this summer at the Winters Municipal Pool, Wayne Roberts, pool operator, has announced.

Lessons will begin June 27 and continue through July 8, for swimmers from age 4 years through 72 years. There will be two 45-minute sessions daily, one beginning at 10 a. m., and another at 11 a. m.

Cost of the lessons will be \$5.00, Roberts said. Persons wanting to enroll for the lessons are asked to sign up as soon as possible so that classes may be organized. The pool operator said that classes would be kept small in order to give more attention to each class member.

Council Asking For Area Phone Service Study

Winters City Council Monday night voiced approval of a suggestion that Southwestern States Telephone Co. make a survey of this area to determine the feasibility of installation of "extended area" telephone service.

A representative of the telephone company met with the council to discuss the company's application for an operating franchise in the city.

The extended area service survey requested by the City would cover the entire Winters area, Wingate, Norton, Bradshaw and Crews. At present, most calls to points in the area beyond a short distance from Winters are handled as toll charge calls. With extended area service, all calls originating at any of the points or communities in the area would be toll-free, it was explained.

Regarding the operating franchise, the Council will continue studying the request and will consult legal advisors. Southwestern States Telephone Co. has been operating in Winters for several months without a franchise.

In other business, the Council approved sending three members of the Winters Volunteer Fire Department to the firemen's convention in Fort Worth. Firemen attending from Winters will be Jack Harrison, Rankin Pace and Marvin Bedford.

Area's Early Days Described In Articles

The following is the second of a series of articles written by Mrs. Charlie Poe on the early days of this West Central Texas area. Mrs. Poe is historian of the Runnels County Historical Survey Committee.

MISSION SAN CLEMENTE DISCONTINUED

Mendoza camped at Mission San Clemente from March 16 to May 1, 1864, almost a month and a half, to await the envoys of 48 Indian nations. (Chiefs and warriors of 16 tribes had already joined him.)

The bottom lands of the river, as described by Mendoza, were luxuriant with plants bearing nuts, grapes, mulberries and many groves of plums. There was much game, wild hens and animals such as bear, deer and a few antelopes. "But the number of buffalo is so great that only the divine Majesty, as owner of all, is able to count them," he said.

Four thousand and thirty buffaloes were killed in the vicinity of camp by the Spaniards and Indians. This did not include the calves brought in or those left in the fields after the pelts were removed. (This suggests the size of the throng of Indians which gathered at San Clemente, and the interest in buffalo.)

While in camp, Mendoza built a rough two-story structure, the lower room served as a chapel where Mass was celebrated each day. The upper room was used as a lookout to prevent a surprise by the enemy.

Mendoza was referring to the Apaches for they swept down from the north and attacked the mission three times, both by day and night. On May 1 he held a council of war and decided not to wait any longer for the Indian nations that were expected. For those in camp, Mendoza and Father Lopez promised to return and establish missions.

Some Indians left for their pueblos and others stayed with the expedition which began the return march to New Mexico the next day.

A different route home was taken for Mendoza had learned that Sabatea, who asked them to come, had plotted to kill them. Sabatea was in bad repute with all the Indians and fled when he heard they had told the Spaniards of his intentions.

COURTS SPEAK

In a case dealing with widespread water rights interests the Third Court of Civil Appeals ruled against unrestricted construction of small reservoirs on Medina River. 

State Capital Highlights—

"Water For Texas" Plan Gets Favorable Comment Generally

By—Vern Sanford Texas Press Association

Comments by legislators and water leaders generally were favorable on the \$3,700,000,000 preliminary "Water for Texas" plan of the Texas Water Development Board.

This massive plan calls for a "rescue operation" for the Lower Rio Grande Valley irrigated region, where a recent court decision knocked out water rights of more than 100,000 acres.

Project, to be designed by the Bureau of Reclamation, would use two big reservoirs on the San Antonio River (Cibola in Wilson County and Goliad in Goliad County), two on the Guadalupe River (Confluence in Victoria County and Cuero in DeWitt County) and one on the Lavaca-Navidad Rivers (Palmetto Bend) to link to a 190-mile canal to the Lower Valley. Water from the three watersheds could be used for a number of years. As needs in those valleys develop, a canal would be linked to the northern end of the pipeline-and-canal system which would start at Texarkana Reservoir, go west to Dallas and Fort Worth to meet their future needs, then down the Trinity, Brazos and Colorado Rivers to link with the southern portion of the canal. Then it could be said that water from Lake Texarkana was being used in the Lower Valley — after repeated use and re-use along the 980 miles of the State Water Project system. Irrigation in the Sinton and Baffin Bay regions also would be supplied from the canal.

Attorney General Rules

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held that veterans and fraternal organizations may charge a service fee for serving drinks from liquor owned by members without having a private club registration permit.

In other recent opinions, Carr decided: Texas Educational Foundation, Inc., operator of Gary Job Corps Center. San Marcos, is not exempt from state motor fuel taxes.

Clarewood House, a Harris County retirement home for aged, is entitled to ad valorem tax exemption as an institution of a purely public charity.

State agencies may pay registration fees for employees attending required courses of instruction in new laws, programs, etc.

Only licensed engineers are legally entitled to use such titles as "sales engineer," "safety engineer," etc.

Parolee "cloper" from another state cannot be turned over to proper authorities without usual extradition formalities. (Restatement)

State military men on official trips are not entitled to free use of toll roads, and a law attempting to give them that privilege is invalid.

A soil and water conservation district does not have the power to create a separate, non-profit corporation for operating a natural gas distribution system.

Arlington State and Texas Southwestern medical schools and the director of the Cotton Research Committee should be compensated for official travels on an actual-expense basis.

Act requiring taxing authorities, using a county tax office, to place their tax rate in the hands of county assessor-collector by July 20 is constitutional. County clerk must file and

record properly acknowledged deeds on request.

DPS IN HIGHWAY STUDY

State Department of Public Safety will participate in a nationwide study of controlled access roads.

Col. Homer Garrison says they will seek administrative guide-lines for police in determining the needs for supervising traffic and providing motorist services on the controlled access highways.

SENATE RACE NOW SPOTLIGHTED

Now that the Democratic primaries are over the U. S. Senate race moves to the center of the 1966 political stage.

Race between Democratic Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and Republican U. S. Sen. John G. Tower is billed as one of top three Senatorial battles in the nation.

It's generally rated among statehouse political pundits as very close. Each side can cite polls to prove its man is really out front.

Although the showdown election is not until November 8, both candidates are canvassing the state as though voting time were almost at hand.

Carr now will try to unite Democratic party factions behind him.

Tower's major job is to appeal to conservative Democrats and at the same time, ironically, to attract as many anti-Carr liberals as he can.

Both candidates outwardly are confident, and both are said to be well financed.

NATIONAL GUARD

Sunday 7,000 men from the 49th Armored Division and 5,000 members of the 36th moved into North Fort Hood for two weeks of extensive field training. But Texas Adjutant General Thomas

Bishop said he has heard nothing to indicate a possibility of a call into Federal service for the Texas National Guard units.

Answering charges that the Selective Service office in Texas is shirking on draft calls, draft director Col. Morris Schwartz said 102,130 Texans who enlisted and another 16,274 who had been drafted were in the armed services as of March 31.

Although racial records are forbidden in the armed forces, Schwartz said it is evident from the places where the 53-percent draft rejection rate of Texas are greatest, the high proportion of rejections occur among Latin American and Negro youths, who failed some service tests.

In April, Schwartz said, Texas' draft quota was only 866, but 1,458 Texans volunteered and another 1,133 were in-

duced by draft.

OIL RULE CHANGES

Oil exploration companies got their third boost of the year from the Texas Railroad Commission when the Commission increased from five to ten the number of oil wells in a new onshore field which get bonus production allowances.

This 10-well rule was urged by spokesmen for major and independent oil companies as a way

to speed up identification of new reserves to meet oil supply demands in the 1970's.

Earlier this year, the Commission extended from 18 to 24 months the period during which wells in newly-found fields-get bonus allowances.



New Walleye Shipment Set For Meredith

This could be the weekend that was for the walleye worshippers in Texas, a comparatively new group of sporting hopefuls looking ahead to the time when the popular game fish will be added to the state's already famed angling facilities.

A Texas Parks and Wildlife

Department plane is scheduled to leave for Iowa Friday to pick up another 2,000,000 walleye fry consignment for Lake Meredith, new Canadian River impoundment near here where a substantial number of the 500,000 walleyes planted there last year apparently have survived.

Last week, Federal authorities released 500,000 walleye fry in Buffalo Lake, also in the Texas Panhandle.

The Department flying schedule to weather, calls for the return trip Friday or Saturday to the local airport where a Department tank truck will be

standing by to rush the oxygen-charged plastic bags and VIF (very important fish) contents to the huge lake.

The fry will be picked up at the Spirits Lake, Iowa, state fish hatchery in exchange for Texas wild turkeys.

Leo Lewis, inland fisheries supervisor, will again handle the assignment.

He said biologists checks indicate the year-old walleyes in Lake Meredith are thriving and that some taken in the test nets are approaching one-foot in length.

Last year, a 2,000,000-fry con-

signment was divided among Meredith, Possum Kingdom west of Fort Worth and the new Canyon Lake north of San Antonio. Fate of the fish placed in the last two named lakes has not yet been determined.

Another possible source of stocking the predacious walleyes in Lake Meredith is the Canadian River which also is

linked with the Concho Reservoir, 150 miles upstream in New Mexico where walleyes have been successfully introduced.

Meanwhile, a strict protective rule is being enforced at Lake Meredith to forbid catching walleyes until they have a good start.

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




