An Ordinance to prohibit the rection of barbed wire fences. No. 80 - Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Ballinger:
Section First.-That it shall be unlswful for any person, firm or corporation or any association of persons hereafter to erect, build or place or cause to be erected, built or placed upon or around any lot street or land or land, situated within the corporate limits of the City of Ballinger, any fence or part of a fence composed in whole or in part of barbed wire.
Section Second.-Any person firm or corporation, or any association of persons violating any the provisions of this ord nce shanibe inedin any sum not exceeding one hundred dol Council said barbed wire may be emoved at the cost and expense fany person violating any of e provisions of this ordinance. Section Third.-That this or dinance take effect from and af ter its passage.

The writer has been in Runnels county since 1873, three years before the organization thereof, and to his certain knowledge there has been but two years of that time that approached anything like a failure. That was in ' 86 and ' 7 if we remember correctly and embraced nearly the entire state

As a stock-farming county this has no superior. Men have come here with but a yoke of oxen and plenty f "get up and go," rented land a few years and now own their own homes consisting of from 160 to 640 cres of land and that paid for. Also stock enough to eat the surplus feed stuff and grass.

There are but few renters here. The "vine and fig tree" are tended by the owners of the soil, there fore contentment and presperity reign supreme.
