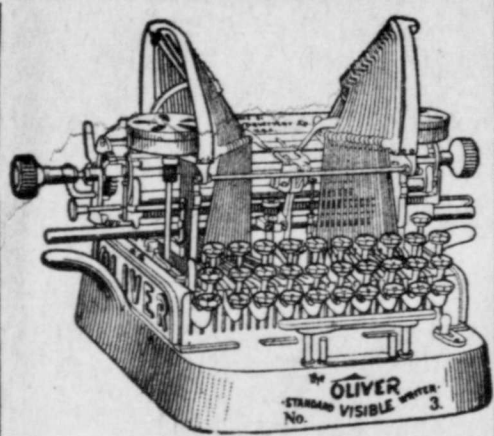

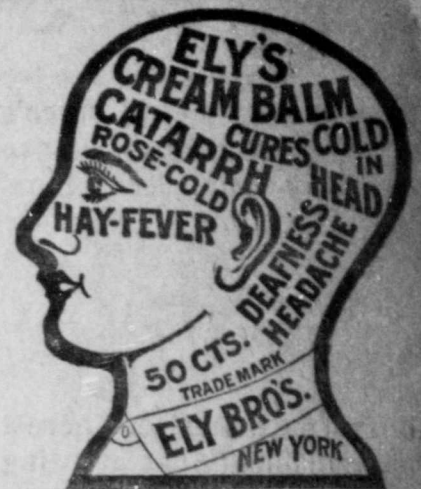

The New Republic.

The new republic of Panama comprises the Isthmus of Panama, with many islands. It has an area of 32,380 square miles. It is, therefore, nearly the size of the state of Maine, which has an area of 33,040 square miles, and is somewhat larger than the Indian Territory, which has an area of 31,400 square miles, and South Carolina, which has 30,570 square miles. It is larger than New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, which cover 31,365 square miles. It is about as large as West Virginia and New Jersey, which combined have an area of 32,615 square miles. Its population is about 285,000.

The capital of Panama is the city of Panama, which has a population of about 35,000. It is a bishop's see and has a handsome cathedral and five other churches, a charity hospital and a normal and seven private schools sustained by the government. One newspaper is published daily in Spanish and English. The city of Panama is situated on a tongue of land which extends some distance out to sea. The harbor is safe for small vessels; large vessels cannot approach nearer than three miles from shore, and are unloaded by lighters.

President's Message.

President Roosevelt's message, like other presidents' messages which have gone before it, is the source of the greatest anxiety to those concerned in putting it in its final form in order to prevent any possible "leakage" before the appointed day of its delivery. From the time it leaves the White House to be put in type and printed for the use of congress until the printed copies are placed on the desks of congressmen and senators in the capitol it is closely guarded, and every step in the process is carried on under the vigilant eyes of inspectors appointed for the purpose.

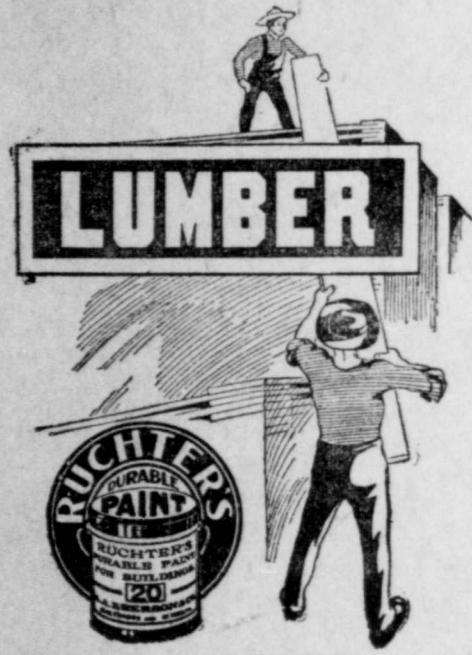
There have been occasions, or at least one occasion, when the president's message was printed in a newspaper before the day of its delivery to congress but the fault did not lie in the government printing office. When the original copy is received there it is cut up into very small "takes," or sections, only one of which is given to each compositor, and he puts it into type with an inspector standing alongside

his case. The government printing office has not yet introduced typesetting machines, and the composition is all done by hand in the old fashioned way.

When the forms are put on the press a guard stands by each machine and watches it so closely that not a single sheet could be abstracted. Indeed, all the waste and incomplete sheets pulled from the press while it is being made ready are preserved. Not a scrap of paper of any kind can be removed, and while the presses are at work on the message no one is allowed to enter the room except the printers and the guards.

When the edition is printed it goes to the folding room, where women are employed to assemble the sheets and stitch them together. There also the work is done under vigilant guard. No one is allowed to leave the room until the work is completed, and every sheet must be accounted for. Neither there nor in the composing room are the employees allowed to carry on any conversation.—New York Commercial Advertiser.

Yasashuro Yamachita the god son of W. J. Bryan, has applied for the position of special World's fair correspondent for the Japanese government. He says that he probably will be appointed. Yamachita is a Nebraska university student and entered the Bryan home in a peculiar way. He had heard, in Mr. Bryan's first campaign, that the Nebraskan was one of the country's great men, and following a custom in his own country he came to America determined to be Mr. Bryan's son. One day he walked into the Bryan cottage and sat down. An interpreter was brought and the stranger told his purpose. The Bryans were amazed but they were unwilling to turn the young man away and the young "Jap" has been in their home ever since.

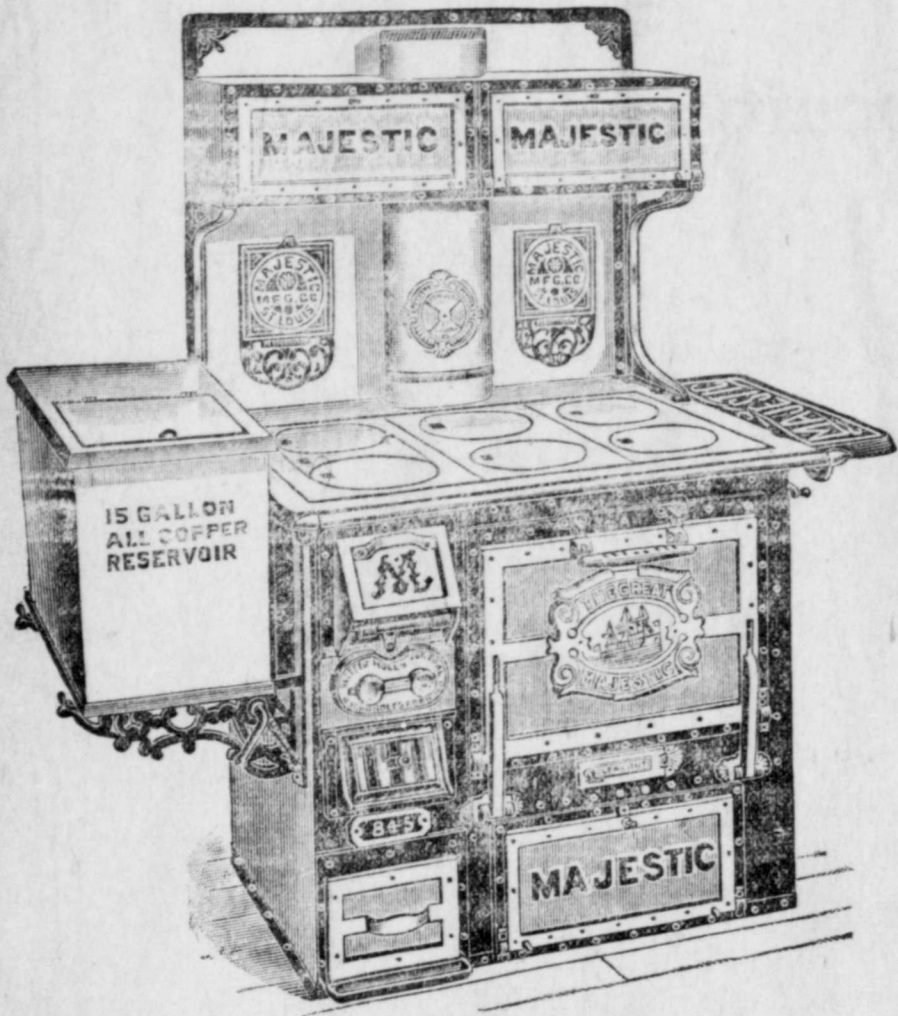
