Iran's alleged support for radical groups from North Africa to Central Asia.
The department said in its annual report on international terrorism that
seven Iranian murders of dissident were confirmed last year, up from with four in 1994.
The report, covering terrorist activities around the world in 1995, follows a recent upsurge in Iranian weapons
shipments through Syria to Hezbollah shipments through Syria to Hezbollah
guerrillas in Lebanon. The rebels used the weaponry to attack targets in the weaponry to attack targets in
Northern Israel that prompted counterattacks by Israeli forces and 16 days of cross-border mortar and rocket exchanges.
The study lists Iran, Syria and five other countries - Cuba, Iraq, Libya,
North Korea and Sudar North Korea and Sudan - as sponsors of international terrorism. The list

## Exchange program

 uses flower speciesby April Castro
The University Daily A Texas-Israeli Exchange Pro-
ram conducted by Texas Tech' department of plant and soil sc ences is using a local flower to research its medicinal purposes. Several different species of the evening primrose, the yellow or ink flower seen in the South Plains research scientist Zohara Yaniz he Volcani Center in Bet Dagen, Israel, for research on the oils produced in the seeds of the flower.
