
A local television station reported Monday that Texas Tech Athletic Director Bob Bockrath is a finalist for the AD

position at Alabama. The report stated Bockrath did not apply for the position, but was contacted by Alabama. He could not be reached for comment. Tech Assistant AD Joe Hornaday also was unable to confirm the report.

This is the second time in Bockrath's tenure at Tech that his name has been mentioned in connection with an AD position at another university. He interviewed for the AD position at Arizona Dec. 2, 1993, four months after taking the same position at Tech.

Bockrath spent 17 years at Arizona as an assistant coach and as an assistant AD from 1988-91.

Officials think more wreckage from ValuJet crash may lie beneath



to open dialogue with the students, but were largely overruled by communist hard-liners. Eventually, official's patience ran out, and the Chinese army was ordered to retake Tiananmen Square at all costs.

With the knowledge of what would happen on the night of June 3-4, viewers will likely find the youthful exuberance and doomed idealism of the students all the more tragic.

Particularly poignant is footage of protesters cheering and shaking hands with soldiers of the ironically named People's Liberation Army after they initially backed down — the same soldiers who would soon fire upon unarmed and fleeing protesters.

## Former president yuks it up at college graduation ceremony


WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass. (AP)
