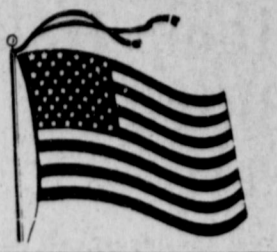

In fact, we had the first game jitters," said Head Football Coach Dewayne Sexton of the Lazbuddie Longhorns.

He praised his young players, and although he has 18 returning lettermen on the team, only three seniors are listed on the roster. Speed has been determined to be the major weakness of the team, added Sexton. "And, with just 25 players on the roster, if even one gets a serious injury, we're in trouble," he said.

The coach said his young players were coming along rather well and basically, they will be using the same offense as last year, when the 'Horns season record was 6-4 for the season and 3-3 in district.

Sexton said he has three students of the 25 on the roster who never played football before, but feels Lazbuddie will have a good shot at the district title, along with three other teams.

Four of his small players only weigh 104 pounds, which will really hurt in some instances, especially when they go up against some of the teams who have more and larger players to draw from.

For instance, 85 percent of the male students are on the football field and a team like Sundown will have 130-140 students

to draw from, while Lazbuddie has only some 74-75 students enrolled.

Dennis Steinbock will miss the first six weeks of games, but is expected to be able to see action by the time district play starts. He received a broken wrist

in practice early last week. Coach Sexton expects the team with the least number of serious injuries throughout the season to come up with the district win. "With only 25 players, we can't afford injuries," he commented.

The coach said the team got a lot of experience from games last year and he will rely heavily on quarterback Steinbock and halfback Russell Windham during the current season. "We will be competing on the field, regardless of the number of players we have listed," he added. "We're rolling, we're tough and we will have no major problems."

Lazbuddie will play a scrimmage on their home field against Nazareth at 6:30 p.m. on Friday, September 1.

**Retirement Party Given For Bayless**

Roy Bayless, 82, animal warden for the City of Muleshoe since 1967, was honored with a surprise retirement coffee in the basement of the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center last Wednesday. City, county and state employees gathered to wish him many years of happy retirement.

A cake, baked by Municipal Judge Linda Huckaby, was inscribed "Best Wishes, Roy" and featured a little old man fishing with a tangled line, which depicted Roy's future plans.

Bailey County Judge Glen Williams presented Bayless with an inscribed watch on behalf of the group and recalled his many years of service to Bailey County and the City of Muleshoe in many capacities.

Roy Bayless and his late wife, Virginia, moved to Bailey County in 1924 from Snyder and for a time farmed near Baileyboro. They moved into Muleshoe in 1929 and Bayless went to work for the Chevrolet company, a job he held for the next 26 years.

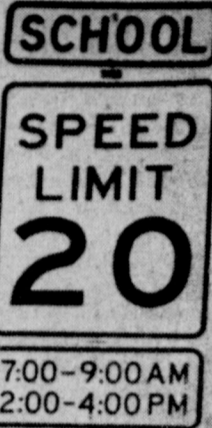
From 1957-1961, he worked as a City of Muleshoe policeman. In 1961, he became the custodian for the Bailey County courthouse and in 1967, he won the office of constable for Precinct One, and served four years in that capacity.

Also in 1967, he was appointed animal warden and as the time for his retirement approaches, he estimates he has captured some 5,000-6,000 dogs, a-

## Muleshoe School Begins Here This Wednesday

### Broadhurst Gives Rotary Water Views

Boosting more efficient use of existing water supplies, Bill Broadhurst, a many year proponent of good water use, was special guest speaker for the Muleshoe Rotary Club, Monday.

He told of his background in water and said that in 1937 and 1938, when he first started measuring water wells throughout the High Plains, only 296 wells

were in use. Today, said Broadhurst, there are more than 50,000 irrigation wells in use on the High Plains alone.

He said that in 1953, he helped form the High Plains Underground Water District to help control water used for irrigation purposes.

Known throughout the area as "Mr. Water" he helped Southwestern Public Service acquire the Plant 'X' electric generating plant site at Earth in Lamb County and helped SPS acquire water rights to some 40,000 acres in the sandhills under Halsell Cattle Co.

At rising costs of energy to operate irrigation wells, Broadhurst recommended the possible conversion of crops to cotton, which require far less water than corn.

Broadhurst said although corn requires more frequent applications of water

### Police Chief Boosts Safe Driving Habits

Muleshoe schools will throw open their doors this week for the 1978-1979 school year. Superintendent Neal B. Dillman, announced late in the week that school buses will pick up students at the regular time Monday, August 28, for registration and will leave the high school parking lot at 11:30 a.m. to return the students to their homes.

On Wednesday, August 30, the first day of instruction for all students will get underway.

Muleshoe staff members were in inservice training last Wednesday, Thursday and Friday to prepare for the year. They will be preparing classrooms for the students on Tuesday, August 29.

The chief said not only speed limits will be enforced very strictly, but stop signs will be equally as important to the patrolling officer. "It is not our intention to harass the driving public," he warned. "But, our first job is to provide safety for the students, the driver and the parents."

He also cautioned that although the school speed limit has been raised to 20 miles per hour, this will not hold true in all instances. He reminded that the law provides for the driver to be driving according to current driving conditions.

Chief Richards also warned that within the city, police will keep a close eye on school buses in the process of loading

import water to this area," explained Harbin and Lewis.

They told of the studies being conducted with the Mississippi, Missouri and Arkansas Rivers and other means of acquiring adequate water supplies to replenish irrigation supplies in this area. Lewis said that A.L. Black of Friona, who formerly was president of Water, Inc. has been named to the High Plains Study Council created by Congress in 1976. Working with the Economic Development Association, they are conducting a study of the economic impact of the declining Ogallala Water Formation. The study group encompasses areas in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado, Nebraska and Kansas, who all feed off portions of the Ogallala formation.

Lewis outlined future plans for research into the feasibility of importing water to assure continued water supplies. However, he emphasized that the High Plains of Texas is not the only portion of the state with declining water supplies. He said that of 43 different planning zones in the state, 31 face water problems if steps are not taken now. Of the 31 districts, or zones in

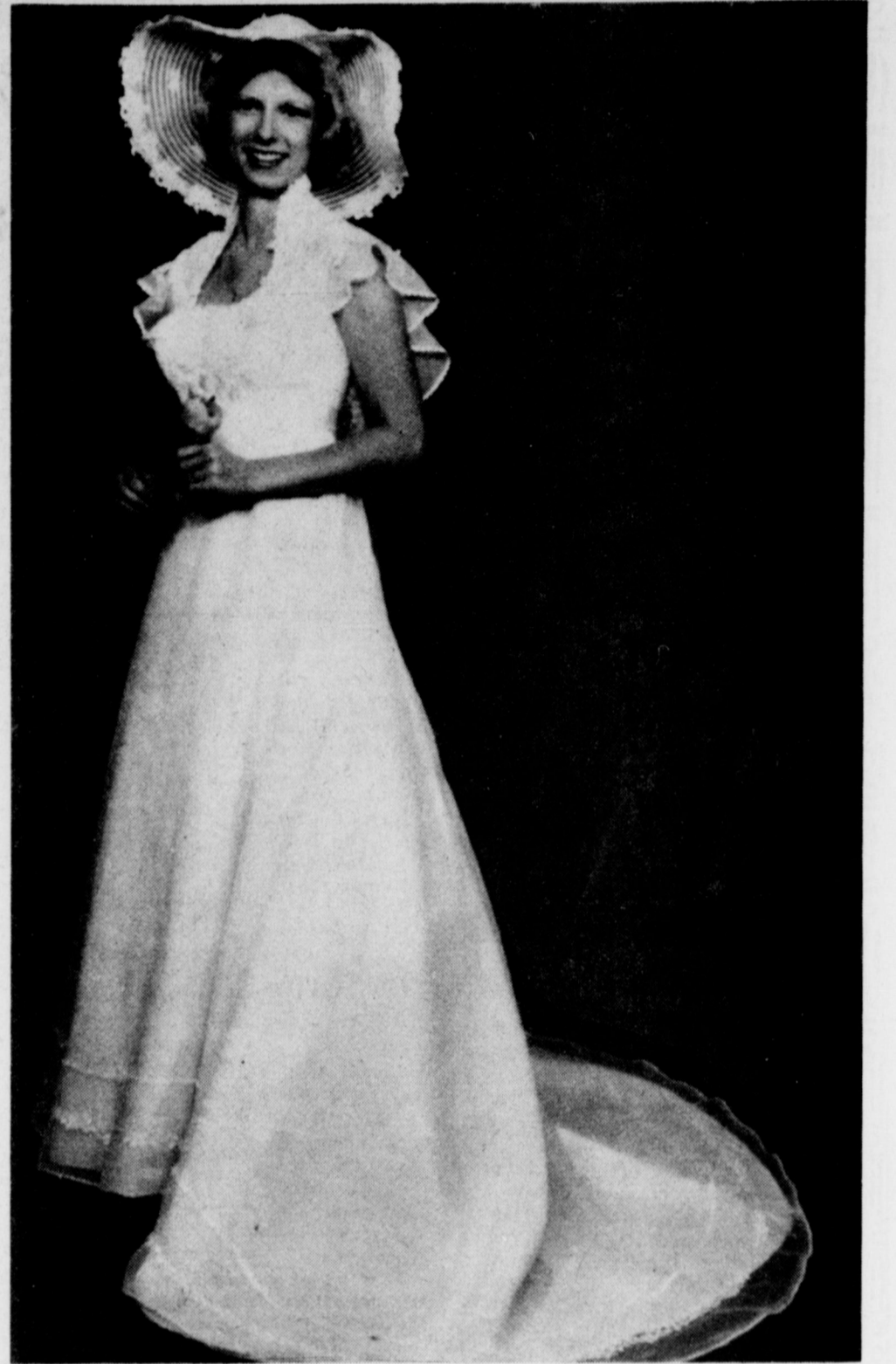

• use varieties of cucumbers grown especially for pickling;

• avoid soaking produce; this causes loss of flavor and nutrients;

• use fresh spices, either whole or ground;

• use pure granulated pickling salt or iodized table salt (iodized salt causes pickles to darken);

• follow recipe directions exactly; make small batches—never double or triple the recipe.

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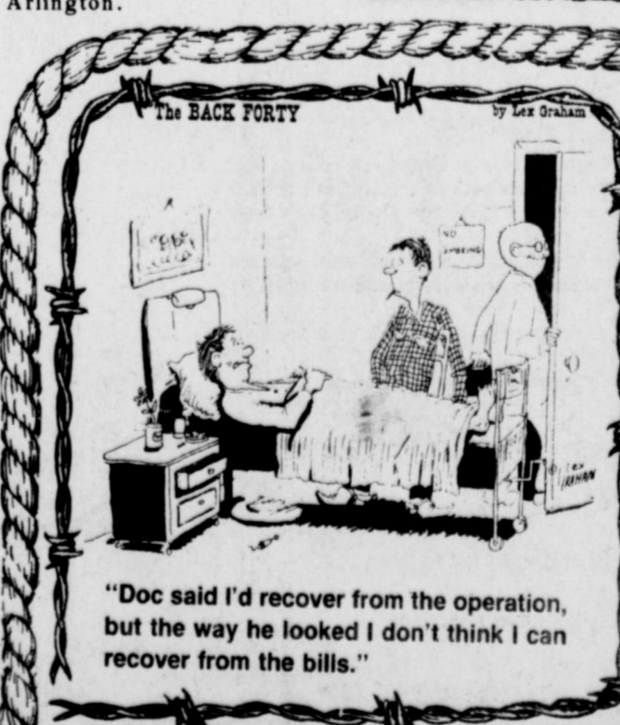

to make a crop, cotton can be pre-watered and one time more when it emerges and still have a good crop.  
He also said that in future years, if more efficient use of water does not occur, this area may be going to almost all dryland farming, the same way it started out.  
He propounds awarding people who produce the best crop for less water use.  
On importation, Broadhurst said he feels that continuous research should be conducted, along with the study on the possibility of utilizing solar energy to produce energy

to pump water.  
The speaker did say he did not think there would be water importation from any source during his lifetime.  
He stated that although he thought irrigation water would be depleted, or almost depleted before water importation becomes a reality, that the rest of the nation would have to unite to provide water to the "breadbasket" of the food growing areas. Until the nation becomes united in the effort, Broadhurst thinks water importation will not take place.  
Broadhurst explained that it is his contention

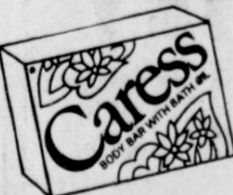

Not enough calories or selected nutrients is the most common cause of undernutrition in United States' preschoolers.

The nutrient most commonly lacking in the diet of preschoolers is iron. Of all the nutrients, the iron allowance is probably the most difficult to provide in the diet.

Lean meat, deep green leafy vegetables, and whole grain or enriched cereals and breads are the best sources of iron in the daily diet. Also, liver, other organ meats, dried fruits, legumes, shellfish and molasses are iron rich foods.

Most infants receive some type of iron supplement due to the fact that milk, the principle food in the diet at that age, is a poor source of iron. Mild anemia caused by

insufficient intake of iron does influence behavior in young children although it does not seem to have any direct effect on intelligence. It does, however, cause a decrease in attentiveness and increase in irritability.

Iron deficiency affects the child's ability to learn because if he is unattentive, he misses some of the learning process and then has that deficit throughout the learning cycle. In addition, poor nutrition impairs the child's defenses against disease.

Poor physical growth is also evidence of under-nutrition. However, children grow at different rates, so this is hard to measure, and social and environmental factors do play a part.

Some of the areas of the child's life that may be affected are reading ability, concentration, motivation and agility. Under-nourished children are less active and do not participate fully in activities and in their environment.

**UNDERSTAND WHY CHILDREN SAY "NO"**  
Young children say "no" as a plea for independence, not to revolt against parents. This is normal in the development of a young child, particularly for toddlers.

During this "no" period, parents should reward and encourage attempts at self-sufficiency and avoid making a child feel incompetent or like a failure. Children also say "no" often because it is said so frequently to them.

In addition, some children are testing their parents, wanting firmness from them. This gives the children assurance that they are loved. After children begin to walk, they can direct their own movements. With this ability comes some responsibility: they must watch out for barriers and keep from hurting themselves.

In a parent's attempts to protect the child, they place restrictions on behavior and frequently use the word "no". For a year and a half, other people have done things for the child. Now, he needs to learn independence. He feels it is his turn to control his life. He wants to assert his abilities and demonstrate to everyone, "I can do it".

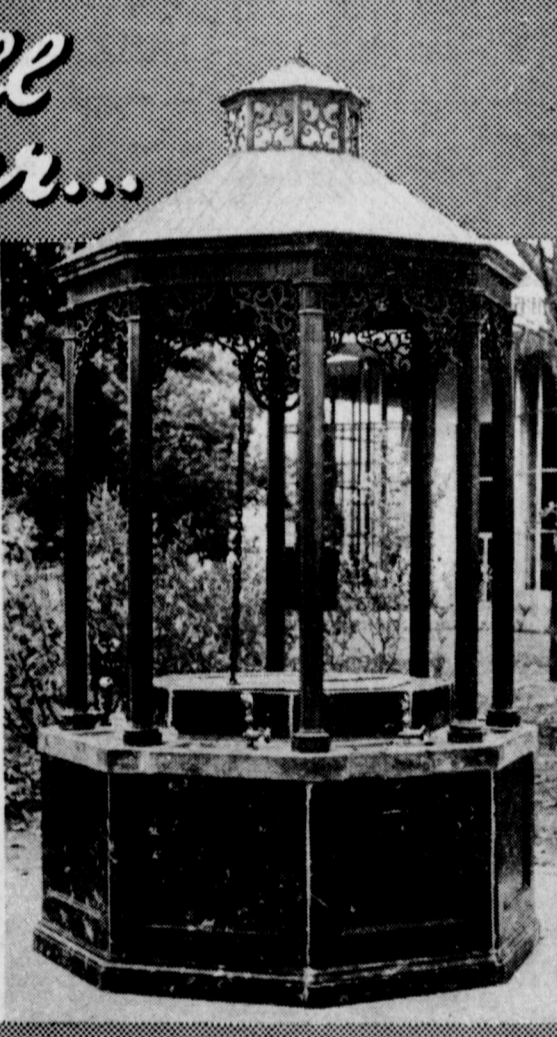

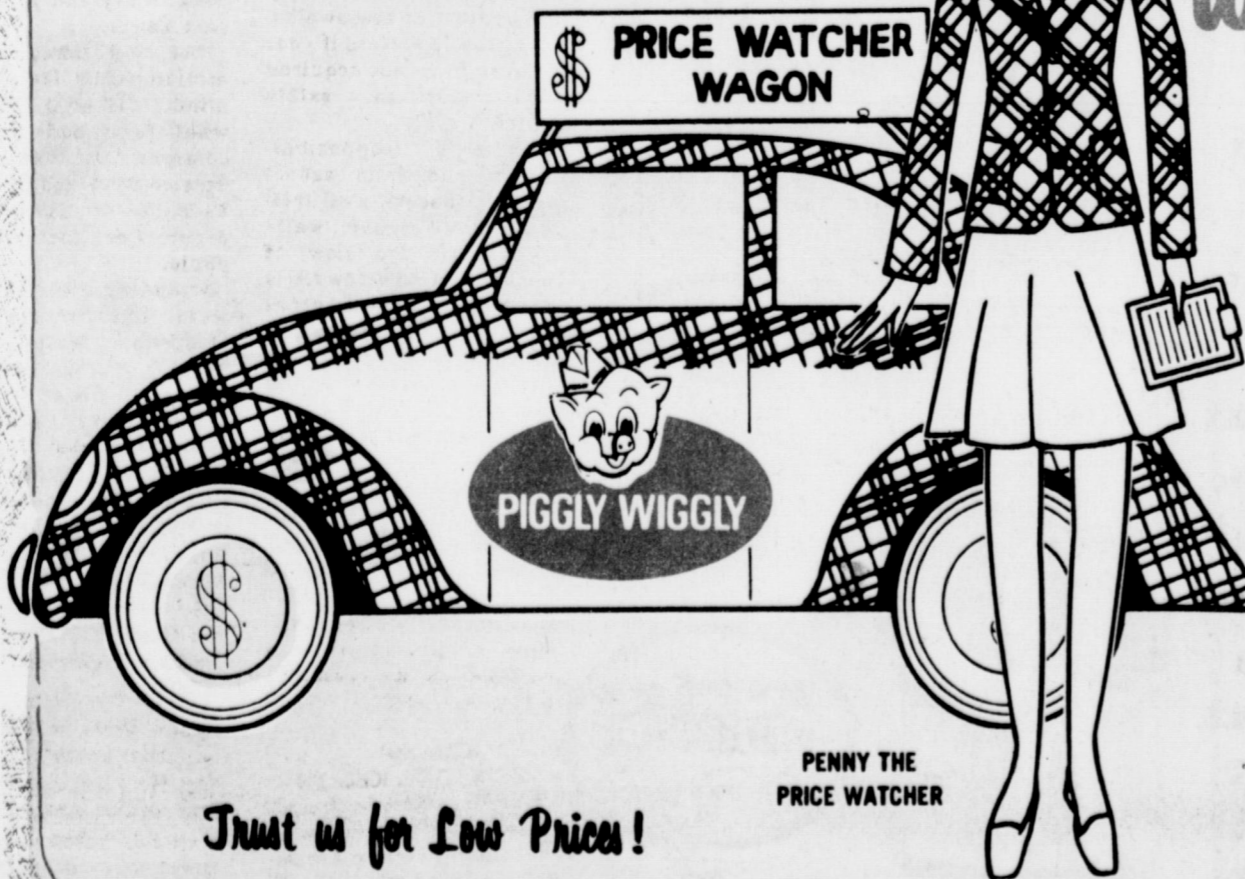

Cont'd from page 1 trouble, only five areas make up the High Plains, he said.

The Bureau of Reclamation workmen are studying playa lakes on the possibility of utilizing the water in playa lakes. Farmers are being checked to see what they are doing with the playa lakes on their own property and checked to see if they are using the lake water for a portion of their irrigation needs. He feels the studies will prove it is impractical to use the playa lakes for very much irrigation.

Also underway, Lewis explained, are studies by the U.S. Geological Survey group, who are working on a study of all major aquifers in the country to see what underground water supplies are available.

"We are facing a changing lifestyle, our prosperity will be gone, and we will possible have to go back to dryland farming," said Lewis.

"At this time, we are mining water like the gold miners did gold, and look what happened to those communities that sprang up around mines. What we have to do is face the problem and fact it without panic."

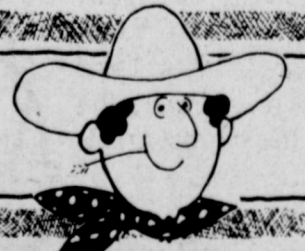

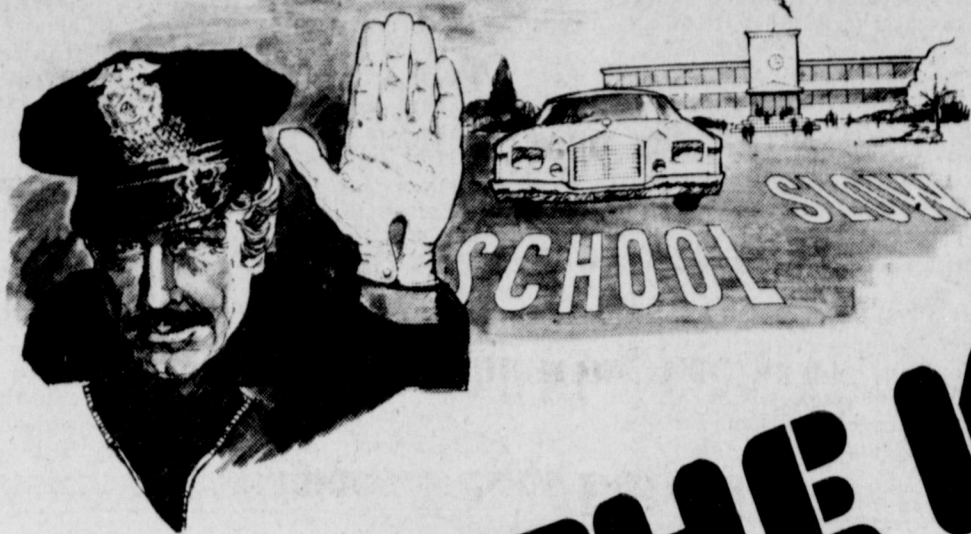

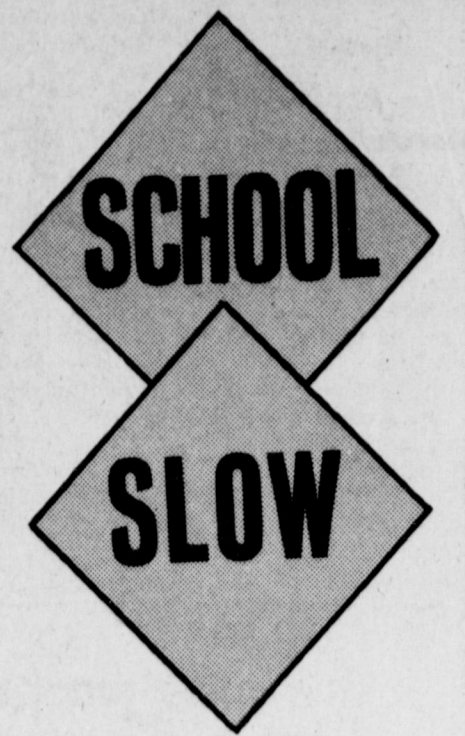
