Carolina Broiled Steak

"Steak is especially good when prepared 'Carolina broiled.' Be sure to select a tender steak, preferably 1½ inches thick.

"Have the skillet piping hot, and salted. Put in the steak, searing it quickly. Turn often. Use two forks, and try not to puncture the steak. Keep all the juices in.

"Steak should be gooked care in. "Steak should be cooked rare in 10 minutes. Well done in 15. When done as you prefer it, place on a heated platter. Season with pep-per and butter, and serve piping

For frying steak you need a very hot fire. If you use an oil stove with long chimney burners, you will get most satisfactory results by turning the flame until yellow tips appear, about 1½ inches high above the blue area.

For the former, select short plump peppers; cut off tops and remove seeds. Put in a saucepan and cover with boiling water to which has been added a bit of soda the size of a pea. Let peppers stand in water about 10 minutes. Drain and place each pepper in a greased muffin pan. Then fill with the following mixture:

Bring the birds together as nearly in the shape of a bird as possible and tie with a strong string. Fry slowly until a golden brown in two tablespoons butter in a pudding pan. Then cover with % cup cream. Place in hot oven for 20 minutes (460° F.). Remove the cover from the vessel and allow to brown for seven minutes. The drippings in the pan may be used for gravy, if liked.



Ham and Raisin Sauce

Ham with raisin sauce is delicious, and can be cooked in 50 minutes according to Mrs. Vaughn's recipe.

1 slice ham (1 ib. 10 os.)
1 cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
4 cup water
4 cup vinegar
5 cup raisins

Place slice of ham in oven 400 degrees F. in a small baking pan. Mix sugar, cornstarch in saucepan and add water and vinegar slowly, stirring until thick. Add raisins. Cook ham for 40 minutes, pour the raisin sauce over ham and continue to cook for 10 minutes longer.





Combined Reaper and Thresher Used in Eastern Wheat Fields IN BANK ROBBERY MAKE HAUL HERE





The new eastern type combine (above) is said to reduce grain loss from 74 pounds per acre to 32 pounds, and increases capacity per season from 200 to 376 acres. It eliminates all twine cost and separate threshing. H. R. Tolley, federal farm management chief, expects the machine to be widely used. The chart shows the various stages of cost figured on a basis of 15 bushels per acre.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.— Compared with the binder and stationary thresher, govern-ment experts declare, the new eastern type combine, costing approximately \$1,000, reduces grain loss from 74 pounds per acre to 32 pounds, increases capacity per season from 200 to 376 acres, and reduces manhours per acre from 3.6 to 0.75. It eliminates all cost of twine

and separate threshing. An 8 or 10-foot combine consumes 1.4 gallons of fuel per acre, travels 2 1.2 miles per hour for an average cut of 2 acres per hour, and can be used to harvest wheat, oats, barley and rye.

"The new eastern type," Tolley says, "likely will concentrate on a ten-foot cutting bar and utilize the power take-off principle, a system by which motive energy for the grain separator is taken directly from the tractor. The entire machine will be pulled by a tractor whose drawbar rating is 15-horsepower, or less."

Considered an expert on farm costs, Tolley figures that if as much as 100 acres of wheat is to be harvested, it is no more expensive to own and operate a combine than it is to cut the grain with a binder and hire a "threshing rig'' to complete the opera-
