Girls Start Basketball 'Win' Season

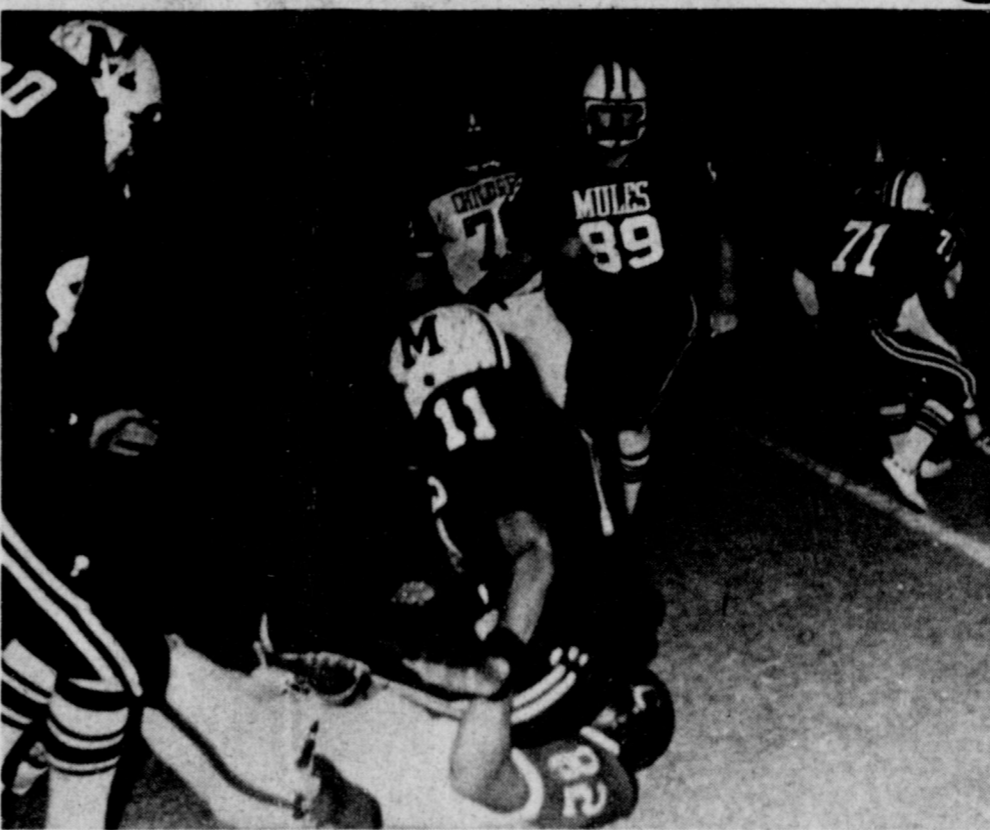
Muleshoe High School freshmen girls are starting off to a winning season by taking their first three games with decisive victories over area teams.

Holiday Safety Tips Are Given

'Tis the season to be jolly--all right, but the Muleshoe City Police Department has issued a serious note to the joyous season.

'Tis also the season for shoplifters, burglars and muggers, reminds Muleshoe City Police Johnny Richards. The chief reminded Christmas shoppers to be sure to keep their cars locked while shopping, in town or out of town.

He suggests keeping purses, coats, or gifts covered in the vehicles, or ideally remove them from the vehicle or lock in the trunk of the car until the shopping trip is ended. Chief Richards said officers believe this will eliminate broken vehicle windows by persons who want to remove the items for their own use.

The chief also suggests that lock systems on homes be carefully checked. Recommended are dead bolt locks, which would virtually preclude burglars from entering a

home to remove Christmas gifts from trees or expensive major items.

He also said that leaving lights on in a house, and a radio playing is usually an effective way to discourage would-be intruders.

In the event you plan to be out of town for the holidays, take time to notify the police department how long you will be gone, whether or not you will be leaving lights or radio, or both, operating in the home, and who, if anyone, has permission to be in the home.

'I don't care if we have a list of 200 people to watch out for during the holidays,' said Chief Richards, 'we'll just add another officer if necessary to help make this a safe holiday season.'

Another think to watch out for will be muggers. In the past, as in some locations, Muleshoe has not been especially plagued by muggers, but it could happen. Keep your vehicles in as light a location as possible, and off side streets after dark, when possible, he suggests.

In stores, keep your purse closed and near your side, with the closing flap held preferably toward your body and secured against your side. Too often, it is all too easy for someone to slip open a clasp and lift billfolds from a purse where the clasp is exposed.

For merchants, the police suggest immediately report suspicious persons, loitering in or around their stores. 'It is not our intention to harass or embarrass anyone,' said the chief, 'but, by being alert, perhaps we can prevent the occurrence of a crime.'

The chief said suspicious cars or individuals in neighborhoods also need to be checked, and asked that neighbors call in when unknown persons are seen around a neighbors' home.

Another safeguard for merchants is in accepting checks for purchases. Chief Richards commented that a ring of people cashing commercial or company checks is circulating in the southwest, so asks that merchants be sure to get adequate identification, including matching pictures on drivers' licenses with the person presenting the check.

He said that if a person gets 'spooked' by being asked, to be sure to let the

police department know.

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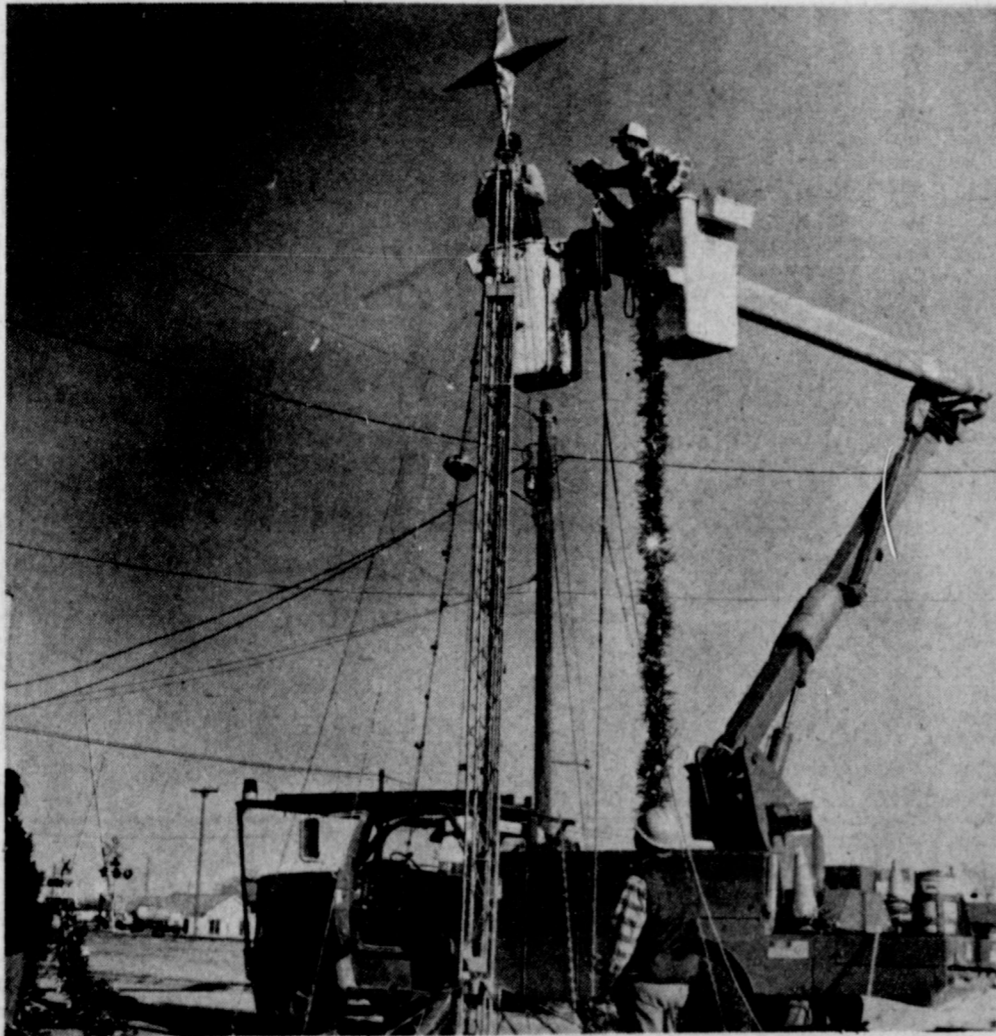
Instrument Bus Vandalism Reward Up

Crack Down Due Vehicles In Emergency

Thursday morning, Muleshoe City Police Chief Johnny Richards issued a strong statement concerning vehicles which have formed a habit of following emergency vehicles.

Chief Richards said that in the future, any vehicle found following the red lights and sirens of police, ambulance or fire vehicles on an emergency run will be in real trouble.

If it occurs in the city limits, or within the jurisdiction of the Muleshoe City Police, citations will be issued by police to the drivers of the vehicles.

Also, adding to the warning was Don Thomas, Trooper for the Department of Public Safety. He echoed Chief Richards' words, and said, following an emergency vehicle, or impeding emergency vehicles in the performance of their duty is a violation of Texas laws.

Bringing the situation to a peak was a recent incident where an ambulance could not get through a crowd of cars to take an injured man to a hospital following an accident.

Cattlemen Criticizing Export Bill

Independent Cattlemen's Association President Roy Wheeler sharply criticized President Carter's Nov. 11 veto of the Meat Import Bill, saying the veto is a complete contradiction of the President's anti-inflation program.

Wheeler said the legislation, which passed Congress this past October, would have brought stability to the market place and would have encouraged cattlemen to rebuild their herds, thus avoiding beef shortages in the future.

The Texas cattlemen, who has visited with President Carter and other top administration officials twice in recent months, said the President reportedly believed the bill

would prevent him from suspending beef import quotas at times when he felt a suspension was necessary. Wheeler and other cattlemen say suspension of the quotas has a negligible affect on retail prices but promotes disastrous prices at the producer level.

Wheeler encouraged cattlemen not to give up hope at eventual passage. He said the fact that both Houses of Congress passed the legislation (the House vote was 289-66) is a victory in itself. Wheeler emphasized that for the past four years, ICA has been lobbying for revision of the 1964 Meat Import law and that gains have been made all along the

way. ICA will continue to work for revised Meat Import legislation in the 96th session of Congress.

"We hope to be able to find common ground with the President so that he will agree to restrict his suspension authority during times of cattle liquidation in this country," said Wheeler. "Those times are most disastrous for cattlemen, particularly when more imports are allowed to flood the country."

He commended members of ICA for the hundreds of telegrams and letters sent to the White House in support of the Meat Import Legislation.

Social Security Incoming Laws Are Clarified

Recently the Associated Press released information about working while drawing social security disability checks. Part of that release may be misleading to some persons in the Lubbock area and may cause those who work without reporting to the social security office to be overpaid.

The Social Security law

requires a report from all persons who work, regardless of the amount of pay they receive. If any question arises, anyone working and drawing disability checks at the same time should write, call or go to the Social Security office and discuss the work with a representative.

Social Security has a new booklet, available without charge to everyone who requests the booklet. If you draw disability checks and are working, ask for booklet SSA 78-10153 and a free copy will be mailed to you.

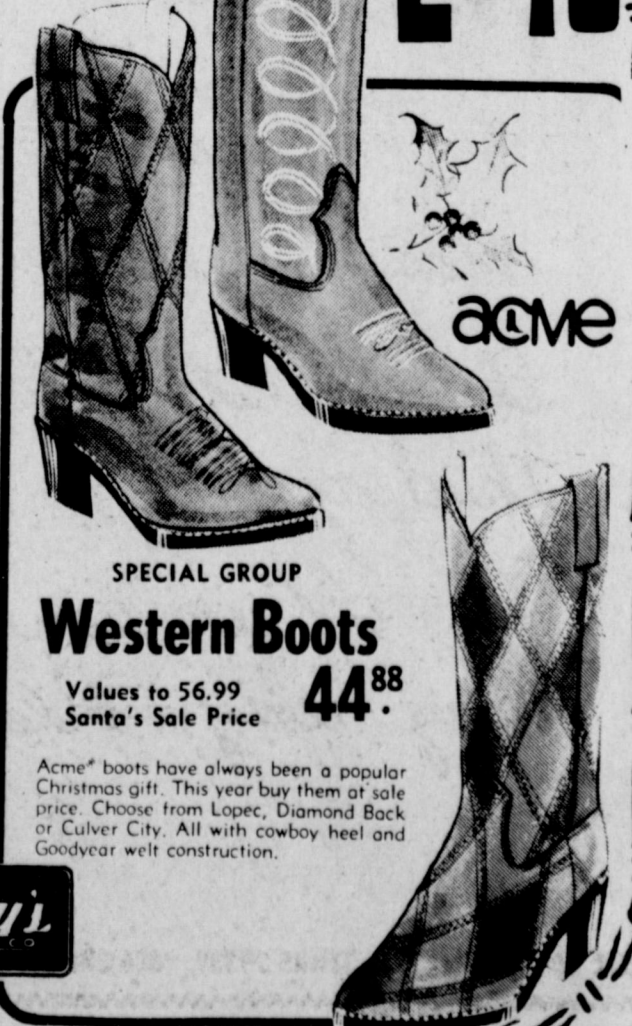

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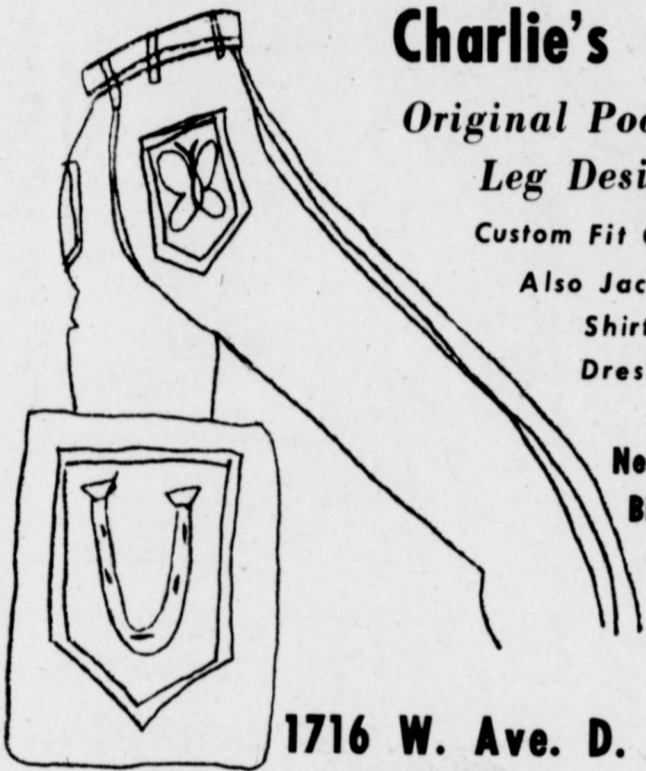

3 carrots
2 green peppers, diced
8 green onions, diced
1/2 lb. mushrooms, halved
2 T. cornstarch
1/4 cut water
cooked rice.

Cut steak in 1/8 inch thick or thinner strips, 3 to 4 inches long. Brown in cooking fat. Pour off drippings in a measuring cup and add water to make one cup. Combine with soy sauce, sugar, pepper and garlic and add to meat. Cover and cook slowly 45 minutes. Using vegetable parer, cut carrots lengthwise into this strips and cut strips in half. Add carrots, peppers, onions and mushrooms to meat. Cover and continue cooking, 15 minutes. Combine cornstarch and 1/4 cup water to thicken cooking liquid. Serve with cooked rice. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Mrs. Shain adds more vegetables to this recipe and a small amount more water.

BARBEQUED CHICKEN
2-3 lb. chicken, skinned and cut
2 onions, sliced
2 T. vinegar
2 T. worchestershire sauce
1 t. salt
1/2 t. paprika
1/2 t. red pepper
1 t. chili powder
3/4 c. catsup
3/4 c. water

Place cut chicken in roaster and cover with onions. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over meat. Cover and bake in oven at 350 degrees for about 1 1/2 hour. Turn chicken pieces once or twice. Remove cover during the last 15 minutes of baking. Serves 4 to 6.

Mrs. Shain serves this recipe with baked potatoes, salad and rolls.

Soil Conservation RCA Findings Given

The ability of farmers and ranchers to continue to produce adequate food and fiber was the number one natural resource concern expressed in Texas during a series of statewide meetings held early in 1978. Soil erosion by water, deterioration of rangeland, shortage of municipal and rural water supplies, and irrigation water management, came in second, third, fourth and fifth -- respectively -- in a tabulation made by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

Jerry Wenmohs, District Conservationist for Soil Conservation Service at Muleshoe, said the number one resource concern expressed in the local Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District was irrigation.

Technical assistance, information and funding, came in second, third and fourth, as brought out in a public meeting conducted June 1 of this year in Muleshoe.

George C. Marks, state conservationist for SCS in Texas, said that some 8,500 Texans established those priority concerns during a series of 377 public meetings held last spring and summer. The meetings were held in compliance with the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977.

SCS and local conservation districts sponsored the meetings in each of the state's 198 soil and water conservation districts.

Other statewide concerns listed in order of ranking were flooding, loss of rural lands to urban sprawl, soil erosion by wind, rural development, increased demand for recreational facilities, and loss of wildlife habitat.

The public inputs from Texas were forwarded to Washington where they will be combined with responses from the other states, explained Wenmohs. National concerns will be announced in 1979. At that time, the public will again be asked to help SCS and Conservation districts decide what conservation programs should be used to solve local concerns.

New Band Uniform Design Honors Due

During 1979 a \$500 scholarship will be awarded to the winner of a Texas Tech University band uniform design contest.

Full-time students at Texas Tech and at Lubbock County high schools may enter an original design before the deadline, Dec. 31.

Marilu Grace, contest coordinator and Texas Tech instructor in clothing and textiles, said, "Members of local civic clubs talked with band members and decided to donate money for new uniforms, which

hopefully will be on the backs of the band members during the fall of 1979."

Designs must be original, in color and on 8 1/2 x 11 inch paper. They should include front and back views and head dress, predominantly in Texas Tech colors of black and red. Jackets need to be slenderizing, preferably covering the derriere, and long pants must be included in the design.

"Flexibility of uniforms is also important because of the marching formations of the band," Grace said. "Detachable items are good."

Tech band director M. Dean Killion, representatives of the Tech faculty and civic leaders of Lubbock will judge the entries. The winner will be notified by March 1, 1979.

Designs will be judged on originality, suitability for a band uniform, comfort for marching, adaptability to group formations on the field and esthetic appeal.

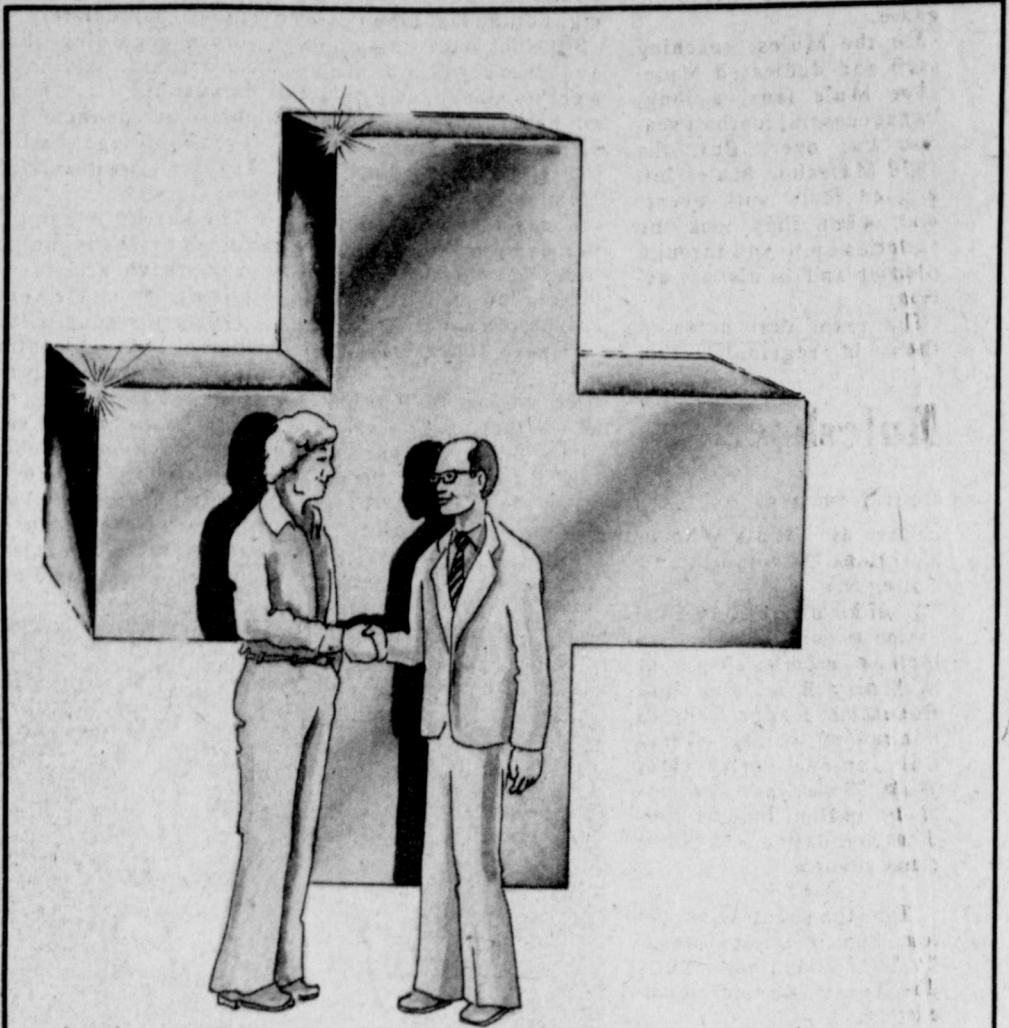
If the winner is a high school student, the scholarship money will be held at Tech until the fall semester following the student's high school graduation. If not activated within a year after the student's graduation, the scholarship will automatically be forfeited. If a Tech student wins, the scholarship must be activated by fall 1980.

A student may submit as many designs as desired by attaching entries to the official form which will be published in the "Lubbock Avalanche-Journal" and the "University Daily."

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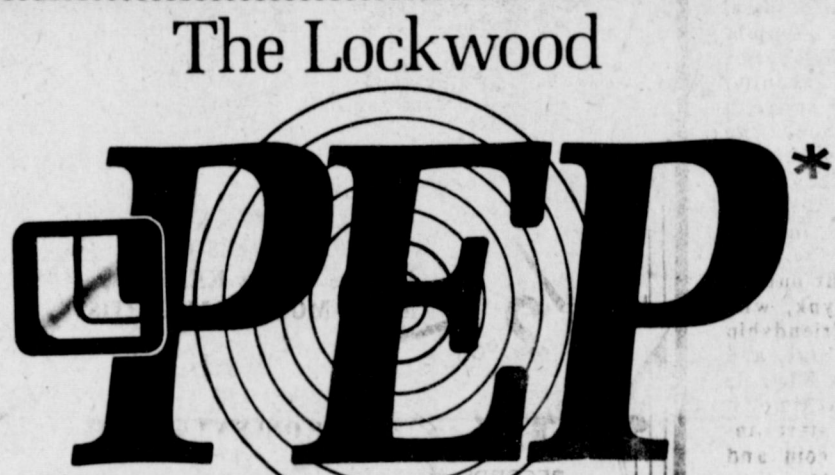
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Tax Workshop Slated Soon In Plainview

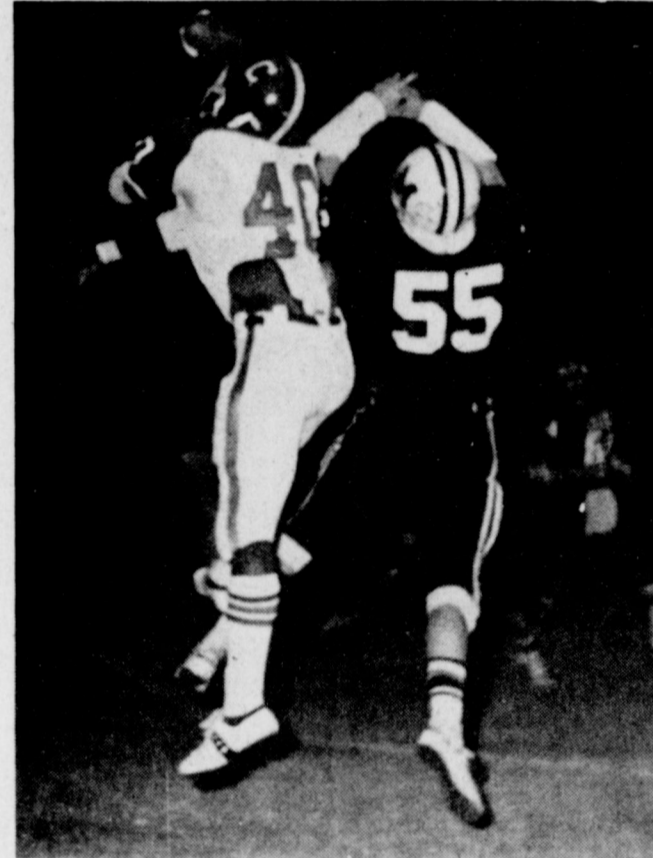

Arsenic Acid Survey Response Is Needed

Cotton farmers in Bailey County are urged to respond immediately to a survey regarding the use of arsenic acid as a harvest-aid chemical, points out Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The survey is being conducted by the manufacturer of arsenic acid to obtain opinions from farmers regarding the benefits of the chemical for continued profitable cotton production.

The basis for the survey comes from an October 18 decision by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to place all uses of inorganic arsenicals including arsenic acid on the

Rebuttable Presumption Against Registration (RPAR) list. This does not mean automatic removal of arsenic acid from the market, explained Tanksley, but EPA will now demand more evidence that the benefits of this compound outweigh risks before further registration is permitted. An assessment team has until December 4 to respond with benefit comments concerning the value of arsenic acid to the cotton industry, explains Tanksley.

of the benefits vs. risks of arsenic acid as a cotton desiccant could have far-reaching effects on cotton producers, contends Tanksley. More than two million acres of cotton in the Southwest are treated annually with arsenic acid to prepare the crop for stripper harvesting. Some 5,000 to 25,000 acres are treated annually in Bailey County. The chemical desiccates or dries the plant for stripper harvesting so that lint and seed quality can be preserved. Loss of the chemical could be devastating to a large segment of the cotton industry, pointed out the county agent. First of all, it would cost producers millions of dollars

in terms of lower lint and seed grade due to delayed harvest. It would also prevent stalk destruction for insect and disease control and would mean higher ginning costs due to the reduced capacity and increased energy required for additional drying of

cotton. A change in cotton varieties and harvesting methods to circumvent the need for arsenic acid would cost additional millions and would disrupt the industry to the point that many producers would no longer grow cotton, he added. The months ahead will be critical for the producers of stripper cotton, emphasizes Tanksley. Therefore, everyone is urged to respond to the survey and to express his opinion on the use of arsenic acid and its benefits to the cotton industry.



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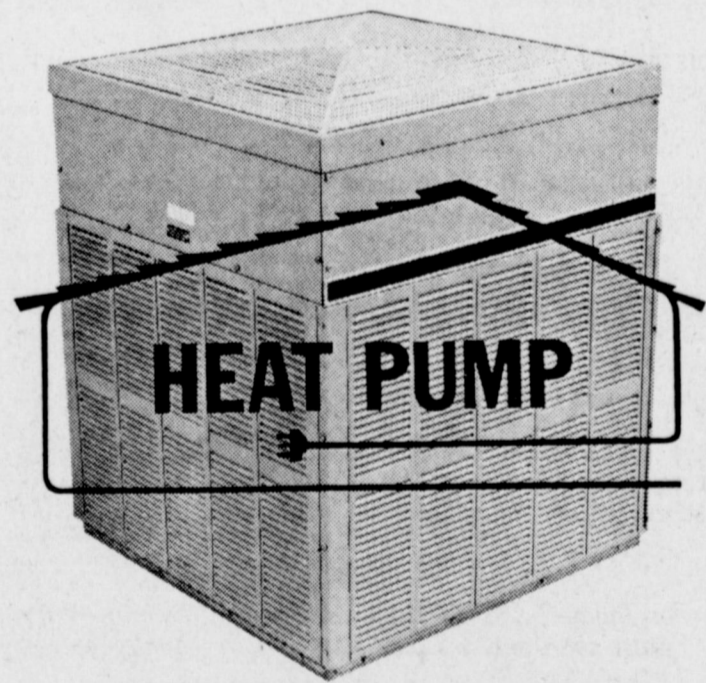

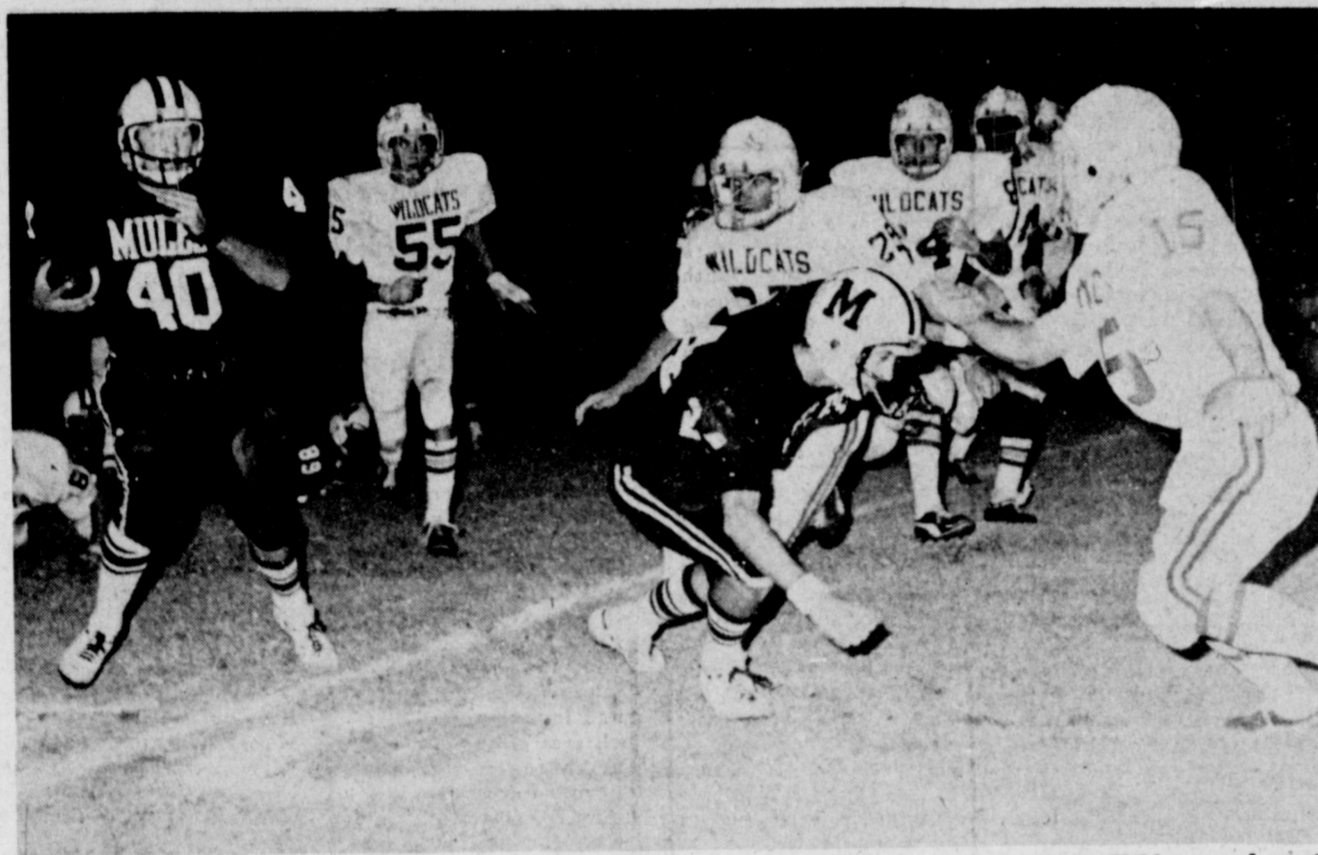

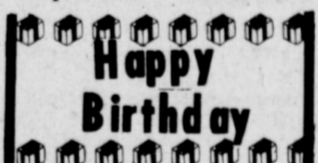
During the summer the Mules worked on their own, keeping themselves in top physical condition. All during this time the players involved could feel the start of something great happening.

Friday night, September 8, was the official opening of Mule Mania; and the Mules, who were heavily supported by the school and town all year, came out victorious by a score of 21 to 13.

The next week the Mules traveled to Floydada to take on one of the best football traditions in the State. Although the Whirlwinds were tough, Mule Mania prevailed with a 27-7 win.

The third week of the season, the Mules defeated a good Tulia Hornet team by a score of 21-0, and the Mules produced their first shutout.

The Mules then had two weeks to prepare for the Abernathy Antelopes who would come into the game 4-0. In a wide open game the Mules came through in the final seconds with a 26-20 victory.

Homecoming was scheduled for Friday, October 13, and the Mules received all the bad luck they wanted in being defeated by the Idalou Wildcats, 21-7.

The Mules then began their second season by taking on Friona in a district contest. The Mules won this game 18-14. Littlefield came to Muleshoe hoping to upset the 5-1 Mules, but fell short as the Mules won 21-7.

The following week Olton tried their luck but in a hard rain storm the Mules came through with a 28-8 victory.

Dimmitt was the next foe for the Mules and Black Magic was present as the Mules clinched a spot in the state playoffs by beating the Bobcats, 21-15. The Mules went to Morton on November 17, trying to win the district championship outright and were successful in racking up a 30-7 win. This was to be the first time in 15 years the Mules had been in the playoffs.

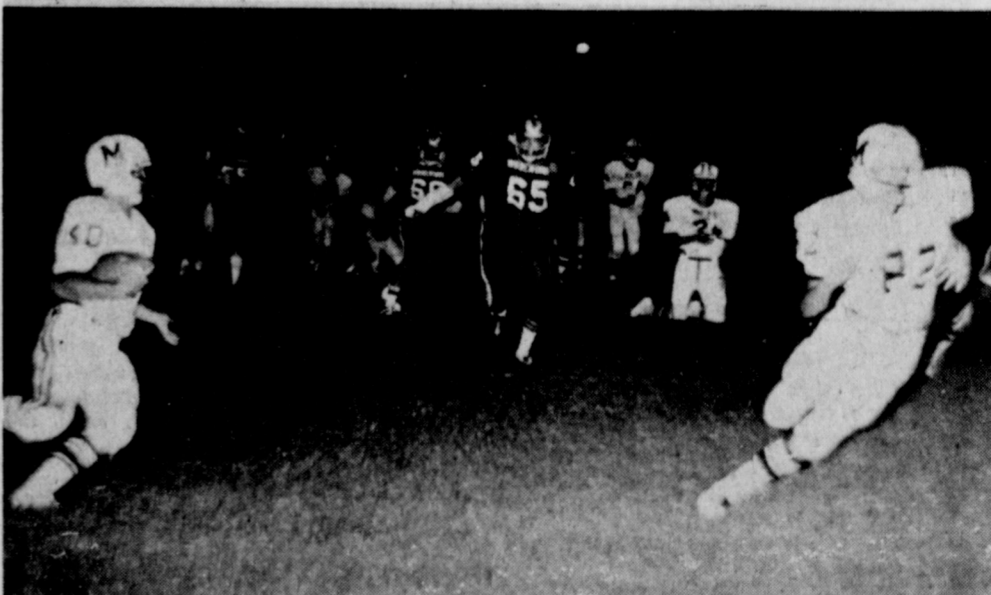
