Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated Thursday on the balcony of a Memphis hotel. Concerning this assassination of the 39-year-old Nobel Peace Prize winner, Beauford

Shields, minister of the Christian Negro Church of Muleshoe, appeals to his people here to carry on in the method of peace which he felt Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. stood for.

Mr. Shields said, "We are all shocked that this tragedy happened. It seems these days are filled with such tragedy and violence of all types is occurring. It is my hope that the Negro citizens in the communities of America reflect upon what has

occurred and conduct themselves in such a manner and to deserve peace and show the nation that they want unity and peace.

## Commissioner Resigns Post

I. M. (Ike) Stinson tendered his resignation as commissioner of Precinct 1 of Bailey County on April 2. The resignation is to be effective June 1. Stinson had announced earlier that he would not be a candidate for the post in the May primary. His present term was to have ended January 1, 1969.

The edgy mood of apprehension vanished quickly and the minds of men, both farmers and merchants, were swinging faster than a weathervane when some 50 persons met at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 4 in Bailey County District Courtroom to make a decision of great importance to the community.

The steering committee of the Farm Labor Housing Project, a project which has been in the making for more than two years, called the second and final meeting for the purpose of deciding what should be done about construction of the proposed project.

The major topic of the discussion dealt with the advantages of a Farmer's Home Administration Loan against the advantages of securing Loan-Grant to erect a 36-family unit and a dormitory for 50 single workers.

After a lengthy discussion was held, exploring all aspects of both routes available, the group voted unanimously to organize and pursue the Loan-Grant method for building the complex.

Irvin St. Clair, chairman of the steering committee said "This will mean securing a 50 percent grant and a 50 percent loan. Under the grant-loan basis, the payback on the money obtained will be \$18,000 per year as compared to \$34,000 per year should the loan route have been accepted.

"In order to secure this loan-grant, we must have a broad base of members. There is still a dire need for members," St. Clair said.

The method which is being used will allow the group to

build a better, more modern complex than originally planned. Instead of the \$350,000 now, the financing plan to be used will be in the figure area of \$64,000 and will include permanent built-in furniture such as stoves, refrigerators, bunks and tables.

"Another requirement to secure the loan - grant is that it be governed by a Board of Directors composed of four businessmen and three farmers," St. Clair said.

After the unanimous vote of the group at the meeting to organize and proceed with securing the FHA money appropriated for this purpose, the organization was named Muleshoe Area Agriculture Housing, Inc.

The following were elected to compose the board of directors: Irvin St. Clair, chairman; W. Q. Casey, vice chairman and John Smith, secretary. Other members of the board are T. R. White, Houston Hart, Harry Lee and Horace Hutton.

The board of directors moved on into action early Friday, retaining Norman Bays as lawyer.

Corporation papers for the non-profit organization, were drafted and sent to Austin. Ralph Douglas was employed as engineer. Land for the building site is being secured for the site, plans are being drawn and construction is expected to begin by August 1.

The building site has been tentatively approved by FHA and approximately \$16,000 has been raised in membership payments and donations.

"More members are needed," St. Clair said.

# Educator Sparks College Plan

He was then asked, "What happens to this 425 who do not finish college?"

He replied, "They have to be trained and educated to support themselves to enable them to contribute to society so society will not have to support them."

"It is estimated that by 1985, only five percent of the population will be unskilled. "We have to make preparations to train these people to make a living. If we do not make this training available to these people, who will?"

According to Dr. Clinton, it was his feeling Muleshoe is

overstressing the advantages of joining a junior college district strictly for academic studies.

When asked how this training could be made available in the Muleshoe area, Chamber of Commerce Manager Derrill Oliver said, "If we join the South Plains Junior College District, we will be able to train young people academically, vocationally, technically and occupationally."

"Also, in community colleges, one of the primary objectives is adult continuing education which will help train those persons who either did not have the opportunity or the desire to be trained when they were younger."

In the event Muleshoe is annexed into the South Plains Junior College District with the election to be held Saturday, April 20, a \$100,000 Adult Education Center would be built in Muleshoe, which would have available a full-time professional counselor. If a group of ten or more persons wish to enroll in a course that is a part of the South Plains curriculum, the college will send an instructor to Muleshoe to teach the class, providing the facilities are available to teach this course.

"Dr. Clinton could not emphasize enough the value received from Adult Education Centers in communities which provided these services. He

said each year it is becoming more and more competitive to enroll in state universities. "As a member of South Plains Junior College District, each student graduating from Bailey County high schools would at least have an opportunity to attend," continued Oliver.

## Thieves Take First Treflan This Year

No arrests have been made to date in the theft of seven quarts of Treflan taken sometime during the night Sunday, March 31, from Worley Grain Company, Goodland.

Howell Merrick, manager of the company, found the chain and lock picked when he opened the business Monday morning. Investigating officer Deputy Bob Henderson reported that a flat bar, over one-half inch wide, was used to pry off the locks. Black paint, presumably on the bar, was in evidence where it was used to gain entry to the building by this method.

The Treflan was taken from beneath the counter in the office. Damage to the door was estimated at \$25.

Another break - in was also investigated by Deputy Henderson at Maple Fertilizer Company, The front door was pried open with what appeared to be the same bar used at Worley Grain Company.

Apparently nothing was missing at the Maple Company. Surrounding counties have been reporting theft of Treflan for some time, however this is the first Bailey County has lost this year.

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

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### Summer Session At South Plains Starts June 3

LEVELLAND - First semester summer session at South Plains College will be held June 3 to July 13 inclusive, a six weeks term.

Registration will be held June 3 in Room 3 of the Administration Building and classes will begin June 4 and meet daily, Monday through Friday.

Seven semester hours is the maximum load. Six semester hours is the normal load for

the summer session. The College reserves the right to modify the courses offered and the schedules, based on the demand of the students. A minimum of ten students is required for a class to be taught, and requests for additional courses not on the schedule should be made to the Registrar.

Fee for the summer session is \$7.50 per semester hour for College District residents; \$9.00 per semester hour for Out-of-District students and \$20 per semester hour for Out-of-State students. The minimum charge is \$15.

The first session will be from 8:00 to 9:25 a.m.; the second, 9:30 to 10:55 a.m.; and the third 11:00 a.m. to 12:25 p.m. daily. There are no afternoon classes. Two classes have been scheduled for the evening. Unit Re-

cord Equipment I, 137T-1 will be held from 6:30 to 8:25 p.m. Monday through Thursday; Introduction to Electronic Data Processing, 131T-1 will meet from 8:30 to 10:25 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

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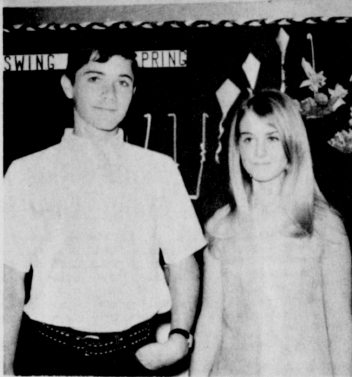

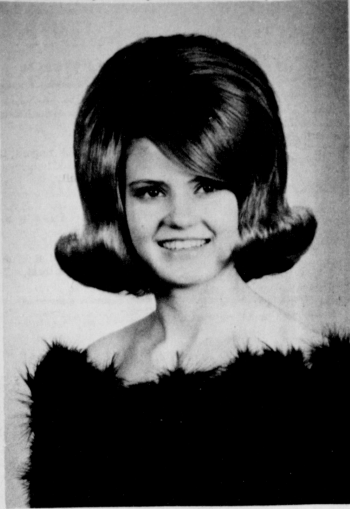

A reception following the wedding was held at Reese Air

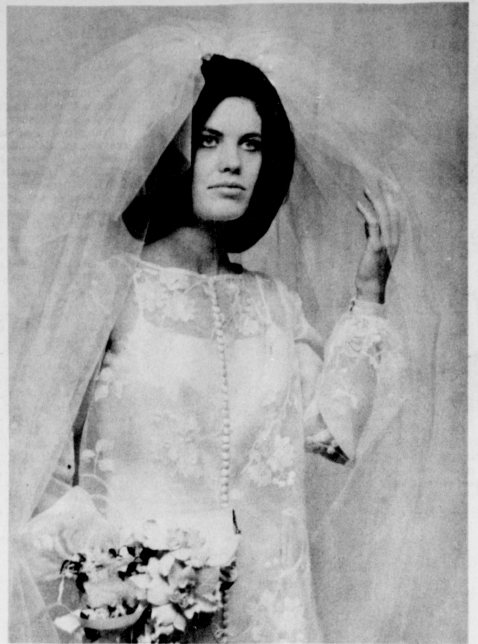

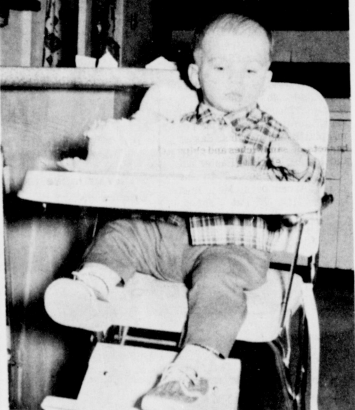

# Dear Editor

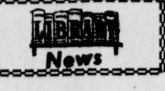
TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN!

The "Book of Survival" is one that would benefit almost all of us to read.

New books added to the shelves.

The "Book of Survival" by Anthony Greenbank, takes it for granted that we are all paunchy, pregnant, or generally past-it. It was not written for the physically perfect specimens. It is all about staying alive - living through every conceivable catastrophe our dangerous world can produce. Accidents and disasters happen every day; speeding cars, crashing planes, fires, muggings, break-ins. When faced with a quick-decision situation, if you have read this book, you will have an excellent chance to escape the immediate danger, and stay alive until help arrives. It is the first of its kind - a textbook for non-heroes.

"The Plot" by Irving Wallace - a book we have had a lot of requests for, is a mount of suspense type, with a group of fascinating men and women for characters and intrigue among the great of the world's five major nuclear powers. A reader-approved book, too.

Mrs. I. B. Hall said it was hard to put down, so taking her at her word, allow yourself a good long weekend for it.

Another great book about Abraham Lincoln - this one by Carl Sandburg, "The Prairie Years, and the War Years." Originally, this was a monumental six - volume biography, now it has been distilled into this big one - volume work of art. Sandburg made almost a life - time study of this man whom he greatly admired. Perhaps no one else has ever gotten so deeply inside the character of Lincoln. "The Man and Lincoln the President."

Someone said the other day, "I don't guess you would have 'The Confessions of Nat Turner' in the library, when I read that it is on order, they seemed surprised, since it just hit the best seller list a short time ago. So, don't be too surprised if you find we have that book that has just come out and that everyone wants to read -- make your requests, and if we don't have it, we may be able to get it.

The next storyhour will be held the third Wednesday of April for the children from the Goodwill Center. All children are cordially invited to attend one of these story-hours at the library.

# Sunflower Breeding

The sunflower is fast gaining prominence as a possible cash crop in the Southwest. A breeding program has been underway at the High Plains Research Foundation since 1961. The aims of the sunflower breeding program are to develop improved varieties that are completely adapted to mechanization, have high yielding ability, short stalks, and are disease and insect resistant. Since some varieties now have an oil content of 40 percent and because of the low irrigation requirements and a growing season of 85 to 96 days, sunflowers could become a dependable cash crop in many areas.

This is a crop that has been more highly developed in countries other than its native U.S.A. The Russian sunflower breeders have developed sunflower varieties that contain as much as 56 percent oil.

The sunflower moth is a serious threat to susceptible varieties. This is an insect pest that lays eggs in the developing head. Then the hatched larvae devour the meat on the inside of the seed. There is at least one insecticide now approved for use in controlling the moth, but plant breeders are searching for inherently resistant strains as a better way to escape damage from this pest.

Two hundred and nineteen strains and varieties were included in the sunflower nursery which was planted on June 19, 1967. These were selections from 642 strains and varieties from previous plantings. One irrigation was applied on August 9 and no insecticides were applied in order to observe individual plant resistance to the head moth. Individual selections were made for the 1968 nursery, which will be under the direction of Ben H. Quebe, Assistant Agronomist, and Dr. Douglas Owen, Senior Agronomist at the Foundation.

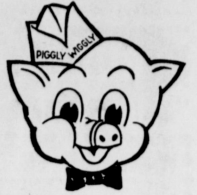

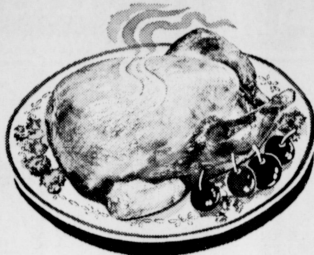
