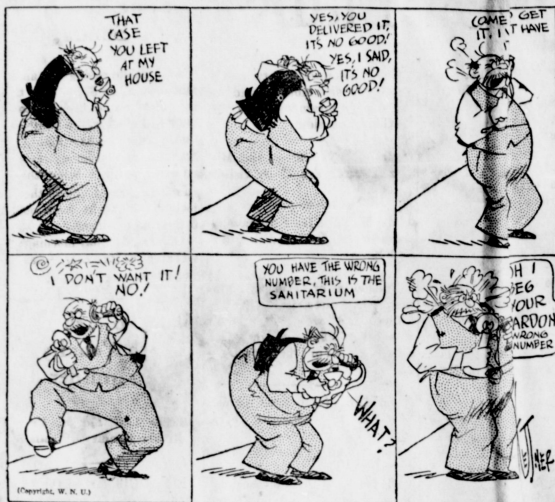

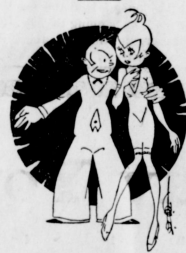

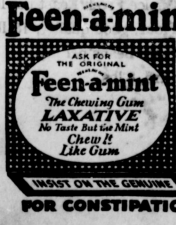

## Delay Planting Various Seeds

Six to Eight Weeks Ahead of Time Is Favored for Many Crops.

It is a mistake to start vegetable plants too soon. Six to eight weeks ahead of the time of setting the plants in the field is long enough, says Prof. J. E. Knott of Cornell University. The plants will do better and maintain a good steady growth if started later, and have a slight check for hardening before they are set in the field.

**Best Starting Soil.**  
A good soil in which to plant seed is a mixture of one part each of sand, loam and rotted manure. When plants are transplanted later in their development, a greater proportion of loam can be used.

Plants are better distributed if the seed is sown in furrows one-fourth to one-half inch wider rather than in the customary V-shaped furrow.  
As soon as the seedlings show the first true leaf they may be transplanted to a wider spacing. When larger plants are moved, the check in growth caused by transplanting is more pronounced. Transplanting is done only as a means of providing greater space for the plant to develop, says Professor Knott. After transplanting, as soon as the growth slows down or a yellowish color is noticed, the plants should be watered with a solution of one ounce of nitrate of soda to a gallon of water. One treatment will ordinarily be enough, he says.

**Water Plants Under Glass.**  
It is best to water plants under glass when they are first started. They should be soaked well and not receive more water until they need it, which may not be every day. On sunny days they may need a second watering. The plants should be dry when night comes. Damping off, or the dying of the seedlings at the surface of the ground, is a serious cause of loss in plant beds. Even if the soil is sterilized it is often desirable to water the plants with a solution of organic mercury. This and care in ventilation, will control damping off.

Cool season crops should be kept at a temperature of 50 to 60 degrees Fahrenheit during the day and warm-season crops at 60 to 70 degrees. The night temperatures may be somewhat lower. By gradually raising the plants to lower temperatures, or by withholding water the plants can be hardened before the latter are set in the field. Lower temperatures will induce seed-stalk formation in celery so the proper method with this vegetable is to withhold water to harden the plants.

## Forests Help Farmers by Soil Productivity

"Alabama's forestry work is directed toward encouraging the landowner and his employees and tenants in making the best use of and the most profit from their timber lands," said Col. F. S. Bunker, who directs the state's reforestation program through contacts with timber tract owners in continuing his efforts among landowners to impress them with the benefits to be derived by conserving the forest lands. "It is readily recalled that present-day agriculture employs a great many systems, methods and devices that have added enormously to the productivity of farm lands. Similarly, practical forestry awaits its opportunity for the application of numerous principles of science, management and business that result in much greater and quicker yields from the woodlands than accrue when the latter are neglected or abused. Forestry is both a science and an art and the adoption of its principles by the owners of woodlands means profit and security to the farmer within the state of thousands of wood-using plants, together with the employment of tens of thousands of wage earners."

## Air Treatment Favored as Milk Fever Remedy

Dr. W. L. Boyd, Minnesota experiment station, has discovered a new treatment for milk fever. This disease at one time took a heavy toll of cows freshening in high condition, since the discovery of the air treatment it has not been so seriously regarded. The air treatment is easy to give and almost 100 per cent effective. Occasionally, however, inflammation of the udder follows the inflation process and there is also a drop in milk production. The new treatment is not open to these objections. It consists of the intravenous injection of calcium chloride. Because of the method of injection, the treatment can be administered only by veterinarians, but it has been well tested and proven effective. Doctor Boyd does not anticipate that his treatment will quickly become popular because of the general satisfaction with the air treatment.

## Celery Is Not Easy Vegetable to Raise

Set in Ground as Early as Soil Is Right.

Celery is not one of the easy vegetables for home gardeners. Plants started under glass or purchased for the early crop should be set in the ground as early as the soil is in good, workable condition. They are spaced about six inches in the row. Rows are commonly at least three feet apart, but if boards or paper are used for blanching they may be much closer, even as close as one foot. Celery requires, for satisfactory growth, a soil which is rich in plant food and humus, well supplied with moisture, yet well drained. Rather light soil is preferred.

Blanching is done by excluding light from the stalks while the plants are still growing. The late crop is commonly blanching with earth, but since celery rots in hot weather under these conditions, boards are commonly stood on edge close to the row on both sides and held in place by short stakes. Strips of building paper may be stretched between posts instead.

Seed for the late crop is sown in outdoor beds or in cold frames in April. Golden Self-Blanching and Easy Blanching are standard varieties and are grown for both early and late crops, but for full and early winter crops the home gardener may well grow Emperor or Giant Pascal. These do not blanch so easily, but they are superior in quality.

## Increased Yields Made

**Without Extra Expense**  
Early plowing and careful preparation of the seedbed was responsible for the largest yield of wheat last year on the Ohio agricultural experiment station, according to M. A. Bachellier, in charge of the work.

With the low price of wheat facing farmers who expect to sow wheat, they may expect to increase their yields much by the use of fertilizer due to cost, but early plowing and seedbed preparation do not cost extra money and may account for several bushels per acre in yield, Bachellier suggests.

On the field where the best yield, 35 bushels, was obtained last year a similar field beside it yielded less grain per acre in spite of the fact that it was fertilized with the same amount of fertilizer as the best field, where soil was not as well prepared.

## Arguments in Favor of Proper Breeding Stock

One of the best arguments in favor of good breeding stock of any kind is low prices, not low prices of breeding stock, but of our marketable products such as beef, pork, mutton, eggs and milk. This is because the market price alone does not determine our margin of profit, but rather the spread between cost of production and the selling price. Therefore when the market price drops there must likewise be a drop in cost of production, else we shall sustain a corresponding loss in profit. Yet we cannot lower the production cost by skimping on feed. Animals must be fed a sufficient amount of feed to produce a surplus, because it is from the surplus that we make our profit. The only way we can lower that cost is by increasing the capacity of our animals, which can only be done by good breeding.

## Herbs are Logical Part of Any Farm Program

Herbs are a logical part of any garden program. Some of them are used for flavoring and some for decoration. All are easily grown. The list comprises parsley, anise, dill and caraway, of the parsnip family; and sage, sweet marjoram, peppermint and lavender, of the mint family. Except for parsley, the herbs of the parsnip group are available for their seed, which is used for flavoring. The members of the mint group owe their usefulness to the aromatic oils their leaves contain. Sage and sweet marjoram are used in cooking meats, and lavender as a means of scenting clothes and presses. Peppermint leaves flavor sanges, candies, jellies and cooling drinks—such as iced tea.

## Agricultural Notes

Plant a less expensive crop than potatoes on the wireworm-infested field.

Early spring vegetables receive most attention from most gardeners. More attention should be given to late vegetables.

Liquid portion of the manure should be saved and returned to the field. Fifty per cent of the nitrogen is in liquid. Use plenty of bedding to save this.

## COUNTRY

NO BEST WAY TO FEED CHICKENS

Emphasis Mu Be Laid on Completeness of Ration.

Recent developments in raising poultry have brought out new feeding methods, each with supporters who see the method more than the feed, says Prof. L. Curtis of the New York State College of Agriculture, who adds that this is no best way to feed poultry as long as the emphasis is laid on the completeness of the ration.

When birds are put indoors it becomes more difficult, but not impossible, to meet their food requirements, because graded of the proper type, and lunged worms, have been automatically removed from their ration. Many food substances needed by hens may be in natural foods, picked from the nest. The only way out of such a situation is to make use of the so-called protective feeds, such as salt and dried leafy green feeds.

The same food needs can be provided in an all-in-one in a scratch mash ration, says Professor Norris. Where an all-in-one is used it must not be too bulky, but should be more concentrated than when a scratch mixture of ground corn and wheat is fed in addition to a bulky mash. When any one of the proteins, carbohydrates, fat, mineral salts, or vitamins is lacking, then poor growth, low egg production and lowered disease resistance results.

For good growth it appears that from 15 to 20 per cent of protein is needed in the feed during the first few weeks. Afterwards the protein content may be gradually reduced to 15 or 16 per cent at twelve weeks and 14 per cent at sixteen weeks. It is saying less than about 15 or 16 per cent of protein in their ration. Pullets during the first six months of egg laying need slightly more protein as egg production is accompanied by slow growth.

Wide variations in feeding methods are allowable, says Doctor Norris, as long as the hens get enough of a ration that has the essential nutritive value.

## Henhouse Ventilator

Cutting a hole in the roof is a poor way to ventilate the poultry building because it allows the maximum heat to escape, making the house cold, says Prof. A. C. Smith, chief of the poultry division at University farm, St. Paul. Running a shaft through the roof to near the floor is also a faulty method because much of the moisture will escape the shaft and accumulate near the top of the roof where the air is warmest.

The easiest and simplest method of keeping the poultry house comfortable with reference to temperature, moisture and ventilation, Mr. Smith says, is to have it equipped with windows just like those used in dwellings and then use the up-draft for ventilation during extreme cold weather. The sash may be lapped any distance required by the conditions of wind and weather. It should never be completely closed, even on the coldest night.

There is no automatic system of ventilation that will give complete satisfaction, Mr. Smith says. Any system used will require adjustment and sometimes they will have to be given several times a day.

## Disinfect Drink Water in Henhouse

A good household disinfectant for the drinking water in the poultry house is a calcium hypochlorite solution. To make one 12-ounce can of chloride one, one-half pound of fine table salt and one gallon of hot water. Mix and dissolve; allow the time and time to settle, and use only the clear liquid.

Prepare the milk in earthenware or glass jars and keep it protected from the light. Solution should not be kept more than ten days. Two tablespoonfuls of solution for each gallon of drink water disinfects satisfactorily.

## Follow Directions

The manufacturer's directions should be followed to the letter in determining the temperature at which to keep the eggs within incubator. The manufacturer did the experimenting that need be, and the recommendations he gives are as accurate as it is possible to make them. The thermometer should be placed just exactly as directed, then the incubator operated. Know that the temperature for eggs is as it should be.

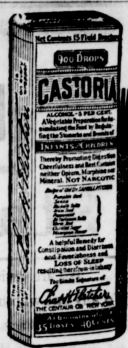

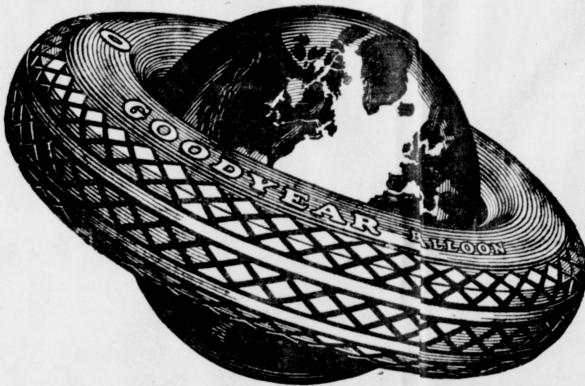

# Move to Save Mothers' Lives

## Proper Medical Care Will Reduce Death Rate in Maternity Cases.

New York.—A way has clearly been found to save the lives of 10,000 of the 10,000 mothers who die each year in maternity, according to Dr. Louis I. Dublin, statistician of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company, who rendered a statistical report here to the Maternity Center association, a study made of 4,720 cases cared for by that organization.

Approximately one-third of these women showed signs of complications which might have been a real peril had they not received the type of attention which included early and continuous medical and nursing care, the report said. The death rate was reduced to one-third the prevailing general average for mothers in the same section, who were not cared for by the association.

"This result," stated Doctor Dublin, "is indicative of the saving of lives that might be accomplished were every mother to receive the benefits of a specialized maternity service. As more than 10,000 women in the United States every year die from causes related to maternity—the highest rate of any country in the civilized world—this means that more than 10,000 are preventable."

### Disgrace to America.

The disgrace from which America has suffered may be removed by providing adequate maternity care for the women of the country, Doctor Dublin said.

Not only were mothers' lives saved, but infant deaths in the first month of life were reduced by one-third. Among the special group, the rate was 20.1 per 1,000 live births, as against a rate of 42.9 in the general population.

"Results obtained show a death rate below that of Denmark," Doctor Dublin added, "which has the lowest maternal mortality rate in the world. Denmark's is 2.4 per 1,000 live births, while among the group receiving special care in New York the rate was 2.2."

In commenting on the report, Mrs. John Sloane, president of the Maternity Center association, said: "The only explanation of America's toleration of the existing situation is that the people as a whole do not know about it. Motherhood is such a commonplace thing to most of us that we fail to realize the necessity to safeguard it. One thing clearly shown is that mothers, as a general rule, do not place themselves under competent medical care early enough. When fathers and mothers know the vital importance of maternity care, a change for the better can be expected."

### Many Die Needlessly.

"In the section of New York city where it was proved that two-thirds of the mothers who die in childbirth die needlessly, a few important points were given special emphasis. First, seek examination by a physician as soon as a baby is expected and continue under his care second, regular work, rest, exercise and diet in accordance with the doctor's advice, and third, supplement this skilled medical care during delivery and the weeks that follow by such nursing and household help as will assure rest in bed for at least ten days and an easy and gradual return to usual activity on the

advice of the doctor and after his examinations."

Mrs. Sloane explained that this education of mothers was carried on by specially prepared public health nurses who taught them individually and in classes. These nurses assisted the doctors when the patients were delivered in their homes, and gave nursing care until the baby was at least six weeks old.

## Hungry Woman Holds Up Bank to Get Into Jail

Fort Worth, Texas.—A gray-haired, motherly woman walked into the Union Bank and Trust company here, held a bottle over her head and shouted she would blow up the bank unless given \$3,000.

Some one stepped behind her and easily seized the bottle. It contained milk and copperas. The woman, Mary Rosenthal, fifty-three, told the district attorney:

"I had been out of work since the first of July and was desperate. Although I needed money badly and was hungry, I was too proud to beg."

"I had no one to take care of me in my old age, no living relative in the world. My husband and I had no children."

"This morning I decided to go to the bank and pull this stunt, which I knew would get me into the penitentiary, where I could work and be taken care of."

Mrs. Rosenthal was given the best bed in the woman's ward of the county jail. No charges were filed against her.

## National Parks Visited by 3,000,000 in Year

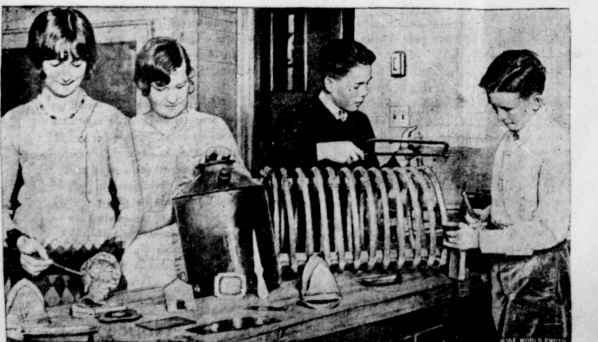
Portland, Ore.—Nearly 3,000,000 visited the 22 national forests of Oregon and Washington last year, forest officials say. The report shows that the 14 national forests of Oregon drew 1,627,380 persons and the eight forests of Washington 1,330,120. The Mount Hood national forest, only 50 miles from Portland, was most popular with 700,757 visitors.

Baltimore.—Helen Tasker, who flaps flapjacks in the window of a restaurant, had her record of never flapping a fritter spoiled.

She had just flipp'd a fresh sock when the wind, followed by a lamp post, fell through, routing the flapjacks. The post was struck by a runaway automobile car.

## New Machine Will Test Asphalt for Experts

Washington.—A machine that deteriorates asphalt road material as much in a few days months of exposure to the weather, as a long test device used at the test of standards.

It is used to speed a tests. If the samples are prepared as exposed to the weather, a long test must elapse before it can be found whether or not they wear well. With the machine this information can be obtained quickly.

The device has been used by O. G. Strieler, research associate of the Asphalt Shingle and Paving Institute. It consists of three open arc lamps operating at 220 volts 13 amperes. Each lamp is surrounded by a cylinder with three-inch slots a back of which are inserted the test pots. The entire cylinder is turned by a motor once in 20 minutes. Vertical water jets can be turned emitting light rain, while ordinary van sprinklers, with rotating arms, are used for vigorous spraying, to simulate hard rain.

Because of the heat produced by the lamps the cylinders are ordinarily kept at a temperature of 140 degrees, but a separate refrigerating unit can be used to cool them in order to produce the effects of sun temperature changes.

Panels of asphalt set on aluminum, similar to that used in the "weathering" machines were exposed to the open air for long time, and it was found that its effects were practically the same.

## Turkish Women Freed, Rush to Divorce Courts

Istanbul.—Hundreds of women in Turkey have given their right formerly held out by men, which they have not wanted to exercise—that of instituting and obtaining divorce.

Divorce suits have increased and a large number of them have been brought by the wife. An average of 25 suits are being brought daily. Apparently there is more other than the desire to be free of the marital bond in most cases, for only 15 per cent are successful.

The Turkish law on marriage and divorce is now set in penny booklets on the street.

Formerly, the husband had the right of repudiating his mate. Now the wife takes the initiative and, for good measure, demands alimony.

## Colombia Sets 8 Hours' Work for Its Employees

Bogota, Colombia.—Government employees are to have an eight-hour day. Formerly, they amuse themselves otherwise during their working hours, in a decree issued recently by President Enrique Herrera. All governmental workers must put in a minimum of eight hours a day and may take Saturdays afternoons off only under special circumstances, according to the decree.

### HINTS FOR HOMEMAKERS

Caramel is a favorite flavoring with a large majority of people. It is equally as good as a flavoring for meat sauces, soups and made dishes, as in desserts and ice creams. It may be quickly and easily prepared as follows:

Melt a cupful of granulated sugar slowly in a smooth omelet pan and cook until it becomes a rich brown, being careful to avoid scorching. Pour in a cupful of boiling water and stir until a thick strip is formed. The caramel may be kept indefinitely if kept covered or bottled.

In staining the fingers may be removed by rubbing with a cloth moistened with household ammonia. Rinse the hands in clear water afterwards.

Lemon juice and sunshine is an excellent remover of rust spots on linen or white fabrics.

When it is necessary to use boiled water for dry food it will be better if it is poured back and forth from two pitchers, giving it more air.

Use a lump or two of sugar instead of salt when washing fine fabrics. An easily prepared mushroom sauce which adds tremendously to the attractiveness of a broiled steak is prepared by mixing the following: one tablespoonful each of butter and flour stir in gradually one cupful of brown stock; when boiling point is reached add one cup of mushrooms, salt and pepper to taste, a tablespoonful of mushroom catsup, with a teaspoonful of caramel.

When white stains on polished wood surfaces cannot be removed by a cloth dampened in alcohol, use powdered pumice mixed with linseed oil to make a stiff paste. Rub over the surface with the mixture. Wipe off carefully with a soft cloth dampened with furniture polish.

A quick relief may be had for an occasion by chopping cooked beets with celery and cabbage and a tablespoonful or two of freshly grated horseradish root, sugar, salt and a little vinegar or lemon juice to taste.

### Reasons for Scarcity of Batak Literature

Marco Polo and the emperor of China landed on the Batak coast, to avoid a storm in the Thirteenth century, and had to erect block houses to avoid being eaten by the natives. This tendency on the part of the Bataks is probably the reason why libraries are not usually furnished with Batak literature, because very few agents could be induced to look for rare works within reach of people with such ideas. Indeed, the Cleveland public library is probably the only library in the world to possess a Batak.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

## Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson for January 25

(By REV. P. B. FITZWATER, D. D., Member of Faculty, Chicago Bible Institute, 606 S. Dearborn St., Chicago 1, Ill.)

### LESSON FOR JANUARY 25 JESUS TEMPTED

**LESSON TEXT**—Luke 4:1-13.  
**GOLDEN TEXT**—For in that he himself hath suffered being tempted, he is able to succor them that are tempted.  
**PRIMARY TOPIC**—Jesus True to God.  
**SECONDARY TOPIC**—Jesus True to God.  
**INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC**—How to Overcome Temptation.  
**ADULT TOPIC**—Conflicting Ideals.

**I. The Place (v. 1).**  
The wilderness of Judea. The first man, Adam, was tempted in a garden with the most pleasant surroundings. The second man, Jesus Christ, was tempted in a barren wilderness, surrounded by wild beasts (Mark 1:13). Adam shamefully failed, involving the whole race in ruin (Rom. 5:12); Christ gloriously triumphed, bringing justification of life as a free gift upon all who believe (Rom. 5:18).

**II. The Purpose (v. 2).**  
Christ was led into the wilderness by the Holy Spirit. His temptation was Messianic. Men today are not tempted as he was, but the same temptations are tempted by the Evil One. The time had come for the Redeemer to enter upon his mediatorial work. Therefore, he went from the place of his birth to the heavenly recognition as the Son of God to meet and to spill the atonement of God and men (Heb. 2:14).

**1.** It was not a preparation for his work but rather his first conflict with the enemy. In his baptism he gave the symbolic act of the dedication of himself to the work of redemption through the work of the cross.

**2.** It was not to see if Christ would stand fast, as to whether he would fall under the most crucial test. Being the eternal Son of God, incorporated with the perfect humanity, sin and failure were impossible.

**3.** It was to exhibit Christ as an abner whom which we may rest our faith with the unshaken confidence. He came as the second man, the head of a new race, the very source of its life. The temptation was, therefore, a demonstration of the inseparability of the divine and human natures in the incarnation.

**III. The Method (v. 2-12).**  
Christ as the world's Redeemer sustained a threefold relation—Son of Man, Son of God, and Messiah. Therefore, Satan made each one a ground of attack.

**A.** As Son of Man (v. 2-4). Satan made his first assault upon him as a man by appealing to the instinct of hunger. Satan urged him to use his hunger as a weapon to use a stone into bread. The temptation was in satisfying a right hunger in a wrong way. To have yielded in this case though his hunger was desperate would have been to renounce the human limitations which he had taken for our sakes. To do right in a wrong way is to sin.

**B.** As Messiah (v. 5-8). Here the temptation was to grasp his rightful dominion by false means. The Devil offered to surrender unto him the world if he would adore his messenger, would worship him. The force of this temptation was in the fact that the kingdoms of the world are Christ's by God's covenant with him. Satan has forfeited his right to rule. God's method by which Jesus was to possess the world was his sacrificial death on the cross.

**C.** As the Son of God (v. 9-12). Here Satan tries to induce Christ to presume upon God's care. He quoted a Messianic psalm to induce him to so act. The temptation was in presuming to go. At all good druggists. AL-42
