Since the use of lead shot in waterfowl hunting has been proven to cause lead poison and death when consumed by a variety of migratory birds, Federal regulations require that only steel (nontoxic) shot will be used for waterfowl hunting. Although the regulation includes coots and associated species, steel shot is not required for hunting cranes in the South Plains area which is Zone A.

How To Keep Customers, Rotary Program Topic

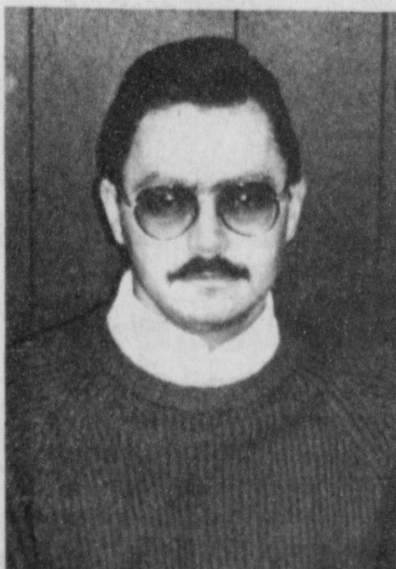

CofC Plans For Bigger, Better Christmas Parade

It's that time of year---time for everyone to get into "The Spirit of Christmas"! In fact, that happens to be the theme for this year's Christmas Parade. The parade will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday, December 7.

All businesses and organizations are encouraged to participate by having some type of entry. "Together, we can make the Christmas parade this year the biggest and best in Muleshoe's history," said Carolyn Johnson, Chamber of Commerce manager. "As customary, cash awards will be

given to winners of the float entries."

Float entries must have signs on both sides of the float with the name of the sponsoring club or organization. The sign should show the name or theme of the float, if any, and be readable from a distance of ten yards.

All entries in the antique cars and unique vehicle (two different classes) division must have signs indicating the make, model and year displayed prominently either on both sides or on the front and rear of the car. The sign should also give the name of the owner and/or driver.

Cars carrying a dignitary or dignitaries must also have a sign or signs indicating who the dignitaries are, by both title and name, displayed on both sides.

The chamber will secure judges to judge by the rules of the American Association of Sheriff Poses and Riding Clubs for riding clubs entering.

In the commercial division all entries must have signs on both sides of the entry with the name of the sponsoring business.

"All entries will be grouped with likeness," said Mrs. Johnson. "They may be on bikes, mules, horses, in wagons or on foot. Animals will be judged on uniformity of pair or group, grooming, tack, gear, showmanship and parade ability."

All entries must be at the Boy Scout Grounds, on the southeast of Main Street, one hour prior to the parade time.

"Please complete an entry form and return it to the chamber office no later than Dec. 2," Mrs. Johnson continued. "Putting together a parade that runs smoothly takes a lot of

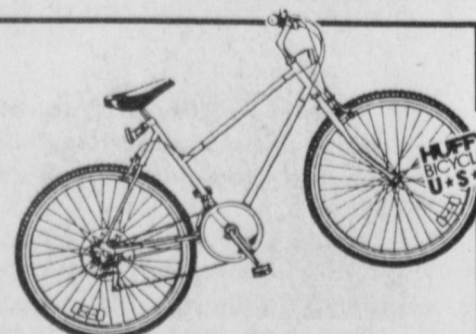

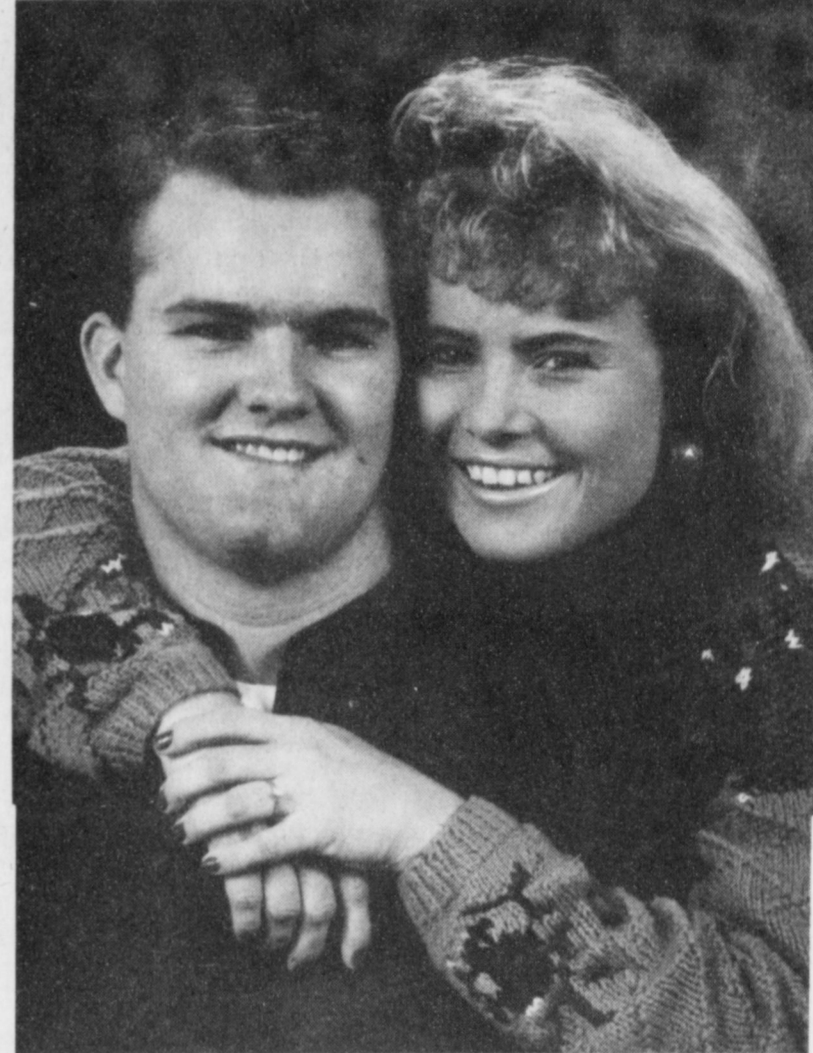

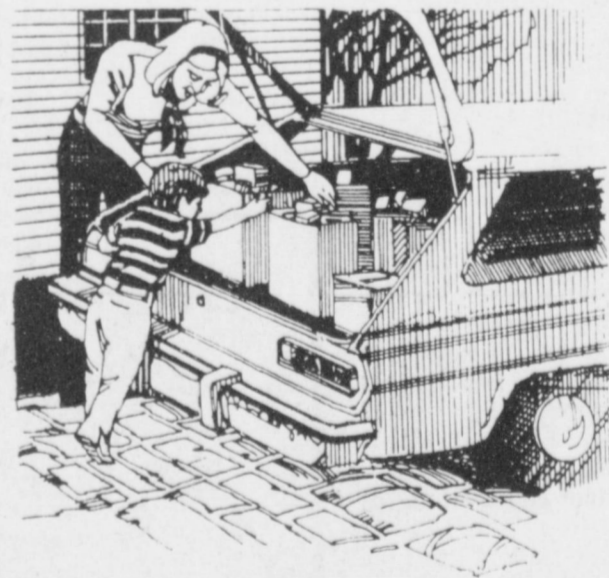

excellent service. "You lose 68 percent of customers because of your indifference," Clarkson said. "They expect you to keep your promises. Your customers want you to be accessible."

In delivering excellent service, complaint solving is necessary. A good businessman must be responsive to his customers. "We learned that an existing customer is worth ten times more than a new customer," Clarkson said.

"If you address a customer's problem, you have a 75 to 90 percent chance of keeping him," he said. "If I lose a customer, it is to my advantage that I find out why."

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

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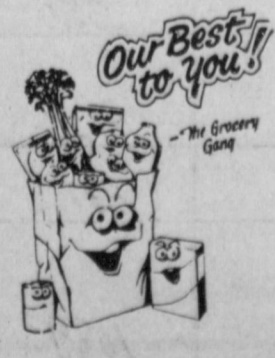

Wildlife experts from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and other governmental agencies will provide vital population and habitat management information to landowners and land managers during the South Plains Wildlife Symposium, November 13 at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock.

The symposium is designed to provide a focus on basic principles of wildlife enhancement for land managers in the 30-county South Plains area.

Scheduled topics and their presenters include quail versus pheasant habitat, Don Wilson, TPWD; sandhill cranes, Ron George, TPWD; fish pond management, Joe Kraai and Charlie Munger, TPWD; enhancing plays for ducks and geese, James Ray, TPWD; an update on the Playa Lakes Joint Venture program, Harvey Miller, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service; brush management, Dale Rollins, Texas Agricultural Extension Service; and white-tailed and mule deer manage-

ment techniques, Danny Swepston, TPWD.

Others include Conservation Reserve Program lands for wildlife, Charles Coffman, Soil Conservation Service; windbreaks, Robert Fewin, Texas Forest Service; marketing wildlife resources, Steve Demaris, Texas Tech University; animal damage control, Rick Gilliland, U.S. Department of Agriculture; and private lands enhancement, Gene Miller, TPWD. 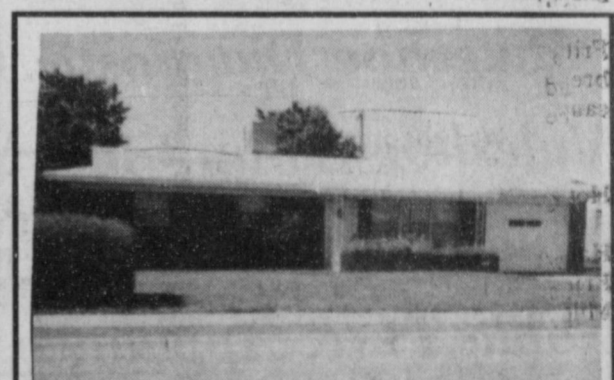
