Deficit Should Not Be Center Of Attention

Continued fixation with the federal budget deficit will lead to
further economic woes for the United States, according to a Texas Christian University management professor. ${ }^{\text {Dr }}$ Richard Boettger believes the proposed tax hikes for reducing the
deficit are being introduced at the wrong point in the country's economic cycle.
Stressing that economic activity and health are linked to the spending of money, Boettger said no recovery in economic history
has been helped by the introduction of taxes.
"We are doing what we can to redsce the number of jobs in Ameitica by increasing taxes at this point, " he said.
Additional outlays for taxes will
reduce the number of dollars available to purchase goods and services, Boettger claimed. As fewer items are purchased, fewer will be produced, and layoffs will result from the decline in demand, he said.
"The only

The only thing that increasing taxes does is reduce this hugely
flawed number that we call the deficit.Once you've reduced the deficit, that's it. You've reduced the deficit." he said. Judging economic performance by the size of deficit is as outdated a by World War I generals who marched their soldiers into machine gun fire, Boettger argued. Although the war plan had been successful throughout history, new developments weaponry Boettger said today's leaders,like the World War I generals are trying to use old methods to steer the ecosony. The condition that once generated inflation-namely too
much money chasing too much money chasing too few in the United States, where an abundance of goods and services are now available, he explained. Boettger contended that economic policy makers are too concemed
with inflation. This has resulted in an overly strict control of the nation's money supply, which has led to fewer dollars being circulated in the economic system to keep the inflation rate low, he said The tight money supply has led
to a discrepancy between the amount of dollars flowing through the country's economic system and the nation's productive capacity and accrued capital wealth, Boettger continued.

We are sitting on a gold mine in this country," he said. "We have
had dividends put into a bank account and we have not been told that account is there."
Boettger charged that data used to
determine the deficit does not determine the deficit does no provide for the possibility that
money can be spent to make additional money.
"The debt we are measuring is so
flawed that if the federal government were buying gold a $\$ 20$ a pound, that would count as
adding to our federal deficit". he adding to our federal deficit," he
said. "As long as we regard the numbers of the national debt as more important than the economic health of the nation, there will simply be greater economic ills o
