The death of Lawrence Carlton Kersey is probably as much lamented as that of any other young man ever before in this community. His high moral character; his excellent mental acquirements; his amiable disposition and his persistent industry of head and hand were proverbial, and held him in the highest esteem of all who knew him. Temperate, polite, modest and unobtrusive, but above all, his distinguishing trait was "he was so good to his mother." He was a great student, devoting every spare hour to his books, and to such company as could instruct him—and was noted for being a "good listener"—a virtue too rare among young men. The cause of the tragedy of his death has not yet been divulged, further than he was killed by the railway train near Cincinnati. He had been attending for a year the University of Kentucky at Lexington, and at the close of the session had started home. Tidings of his death were telegraphed to his father at Roswell. His remains were expressed to Amarillo which for twelve years past has been his home—and will hereafter be for his tenement of clay—while time endures. But his ever-living spirit, we know, has gone to a better world than this.

Mr. McKinley says that the Filipinos "opened fire upon our army." He refers to the beginning of the fighting, February 4, 1899, when, as he says, "the insurgents attacked the American army, after being previously advised that the American forces were under orders not to fire upon them except in self-defense." But Gen. Otis [report of 1899; page 96] explains the beginning of the fighting by saying that the first shot was fired by an American picket upon a Filipino who approached him and refused to halt or answer when challenged. This shot, which began the engagement, was replied to says Otis, by the Filipino troops and he adds that "the engagement was one strictly defensive on the part of the insurgents, and of vigorous attack by our forces.—The Public.

Like his confusion over export balances is Mr. McKinley's idea that the reduction of interest on government bonds is proof of general prosperity. Low interest on government bonds is not evidence of prosperity. It is evidence on the contrary, that opportunities for profitable and safe investments in productive enterprises are scarce. This is the reason that low interest on gilt edge securities is always an accompaniment of low wages or precarious employment. When opportunities for employment are abundant and profitable, so are opportunities for business investment. They go together. The very conditions that induce people with money to buy government bonds bearing low rates of interest because they are safer than business investments, are the conditions that diminish opportunities for employment. Mr. McKinley is oblivious to the fact that in boasting of low rates on government bonds he is calling attention to the precariousness of employment. But it is so. Steady employment at good wages never exists when safe opportunities for profitable investments are few.—The Public.

## SCHOOL LANDS.

Editor Amarillo News:

For the benefit of those concerned and in answer to several inquiries as to the requirements of the school land law. I herewith hand you the following communication this day received from the Land Office which you will please publish.

C. C. Laddis.  
The purchaser of agricultural or grazing lands must either reside on a part of the lands purchased, or on other lands owned by him, within a radius of five miles of the lands purchased. He must be so residing at the time he makes his application to purchase such additional land, and must continue such occupancy for three consecutive years, and make proof of this fact within two years after the completion of his occupancy.

Before the completion of the three years consecutive occupancy the purchaser is only permitted to leave the home tract for two purposes, viz sending his children to school and for the purpose of earning money with which to pay for the land, which temporary absence must not exceed six months in any one year.

Absence from any other cause, or for any greater length of time, will cause the land to be forfeited for abandonment.

The death of a purchaser relieves his heirs from the obligation to further reside upon the land, and gives them one year from the first of November succeeding such death to pay any interest that may be due at the time of death. As soon as the three years' occupancy of the home section is completed, any additional land which has been purchased by virtue of living on said home section, whether it has been purchased three years or not, may be paid out and patented. But if the additional land has been purchased by virtue of living upon lands other than school lands the occupancy of the homestead must be continued for three years after the purchase of the additional land.
