Two large exhibition cases are filled with Chaucer editions dating as far back as 14 years before Columbus discovered America, and may be seen at the library open house, Sunday afternoon, Novem-

Oldest item in the Chaucer group is a leaf from the first ediion ever printed of "The Canterbury Tales," dated 1478. Struck from the press of William Caxton, England's first printer, it was the fifth book printed in Great Britain.

Other copies shown range from 1526 to 1602. The university's copy of the 1602 edition was at one time owned by the Duke of Northumberland, Earl of Warwick and bears his autograph.

FIRE LOSS IN TEXAS HAS REACHED HIGH MARK

AUSTIN, Nov. 6.-The value of insured property alone, destroyed by fire in Texas each year, would go a long way toward solving the relief problem or building up our national defense, Marvin Hall, state fire insurance commissioner, said today.

Texas has an annual insured fire loss of approximately nine and one-half million dollars, the commissioner declared, and if this amount of money could be saved it would pay for 950 warplanes costing \$10,000 each, or pay onehalf the cost of one of the world's finest first-line battleships.

It would pay the cost of food, clothing and shelter for more than 9,000 families for a period of one year. This amount of money would build 1,900 modern onefamily surburban homes sheltering 9,500 people—the population of an average Texas city.

The price of cotton, by long established custom, is based on two factors: grade and staple.

Actually a third factor is taken into consideration, that of 'character or spinning quality. This, according to M. C. Jaynes, specialist in cotton work with the Texas A. & M. extension service, takes into consideration such factors as ability to take and retain dyes, staple strength and stretch, staple diameter, 'twist,' and cellu-

One aim of the marketing program currently being carried on by the U. S. department of agriculture surplus marketing administration and the extension service is to find just what spinners want' in cotton and to make this information available to farmers and cotton breeders.

The SMA is at present buying cotton at several centers of quality cotton areas, including Dallas, Paris, Floydada and Munday.







> Mourning doves have been accused of pulling young corn, especially after it has just shot up out of the ground. However, investigations by game department biologists have shown that the mourning doves do very little, if any harm to young corn. Not a grain of corn was found in any of the crops of fourteen mourning doves taken in and around the corn fields in Robertson county in April and May, Croton, Johnson grass and a variety of other seeds were found. 


