



sary. "This is why lawyers seek to bar women jurors when their clients are women. They fear an unreasonable, spiteful verdict.

"Everyone is aware of how frequently women direct hurtful remarks toward other women — how they instantly and ruthlessly ap-praise members of their own sex. Intense Rivairy.

"This is because their rivalry is more intense than man's. Hence they give it more violent expression. They love violently and hate violently. And, if the object of wrath is another female, a normally gentle woman may react with almost un-

believable cruelty."




