AN ORDINANCE

-relating to traffic and regulating the use of public streets and highways of the City of Ballinger; providing for the installation, regulation and control of the use of parking meters and parking meter zones; authorizing a method of payment for parking meters and the installation thereof exclusively from the receipts obtained from their operation; providing for enforcement and penalty for violation thereof and providing that invalidity of part shall not affect the validity of remainder.

Be it Ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ballinger:

SECTION 1. SECTION 11. Any person who shall violate or assist in violation of Section Seven (7) or Section Eight (8) of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined rot more than one thing.





AUSTIN, Jan. 22.—Department pros and apparel stores chalked up the greatest month in the history state in December, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research, with sales soaring 29 per cent above November sales.

Although this rise conforms to the usual seasonal increase December over November, the entire year's sales have been higher than previous years, making December the highest month in retail sales.

The bureau's seasonally adjusted index was 268 compared with an index of 229.9 for December, 1945. This was below the adjusted index of 310.9 for November, however. Average monthly index for 1939 was 105.5. A comparison of November and

December sales reveals that department stores showed the greatest increase by reporting a sales gain of 44 per cent for the month.

#### **Buffalo Grass Can** Be Restored Here. Says County Agent

Buffalo grass or often spoken of as curly mesquite, can be reestablished on pastures in Runnels county, according to County Agent John A. Barton, who bases his statement on the eight-year results obtained at the Denton subexperiment station at Denton

According to this report five pounds of the treated buffalo seed should be planted to the acre with an ordinary corn planter that will cover the seed about half an inch deep. The seed should be planted in the spring along about corn planting time. On land that is too rough to use a corn planter one can use an ordinary grain drill

Runnels county is right in the heart of the buffalo grass area and it is the opinion of the agent that more attention should be given to the growing of this most valuable native grass for permanent pasture. Its ability to withstand more constant and severe grazing than any other native grass makes it of particular value Some years ago a test on this grass at the Spur experiment station revealed that it actually during the year produced more forage per acre than did sudan


