Coke Ranchmen Get Better Wool Prices By Grading Staple

COLLEGE STATION, July 2. Texas sheep raisers are getting wise on ways and means of selling wool and getting the right prices. Coke county ranchmen, reports County Agricultural Agent Travis B. Hicks, are upping the price received for wool by grading sheep for staple.


C. E. Arrott, sheep raiser in the county who has been grading for several years, is now getting up to seven extra cents a pound for his wool, says the county agent.

Arrott added an extra feature to his wool preparation this year. He and his son, Le Drew, stood at the tying board and divided the wool into tow lots, according to length of staple. The wool was then delivered to the warehouse as two separate lots, which means extra cash returns.

County Agent Hicks says that ranchmen are getting wise to the old plan of selling wool on a "hog-round" basis.


