Voters of the Ballinger independent school district have authorized the funds for construction of a lunch room on the campus at Eighth and Broad streets. This will insure a building program for the summer. School authorities will get the work begun as soon as possible so that it can be completed and equipment installed before the beginning of the term in September. Tentative plans have been drawn for the building and work will be underway shortly. Land adjoining the junior school will be cleared and sodded so it can take part of load off the playground. This half block is west of the junior high building, just across Ninth Street. It will serve as a playground for this school, and pupils of the elementary school will use the full block across Broad Street. The installation of furniture and fixtures in the new elementary and negro schools, and the rearrangement of rooms in the elementary school on the high school campus means a busy summer.

Farmers of this section have been out of town the past ten days, only a few coming in for seed and machinery parts. Since the rains, planters and tractors have been running steadily in an effort to get 1951 crops in the ground as soon as possible. While moisture is not adequate, farmers are planting and hoping for additional rains. The range has been greatly benefited by grass growing and most livestock raisers have been able to stop feeding and depend upon grazing. Stock water is plentiful and most cattle and sheep are doing well.

Ballinger negroes have a recreational building about half completed and have run out of money. The large concrete structure is located in the colored park, near the new negro school and could serve a good purpose. To date about \$2,500 has been spent on the building, about \$350 cash is held, and \$1,500 to \$2,000 is needed to complete the job. The building would provide a place for public gatherings, general recreation for the young, and would also be convenient for school programs, physical education, etc. The committee hopes to raise additional money from some source.
