Halloween Parade Of Costumes, Contest Set

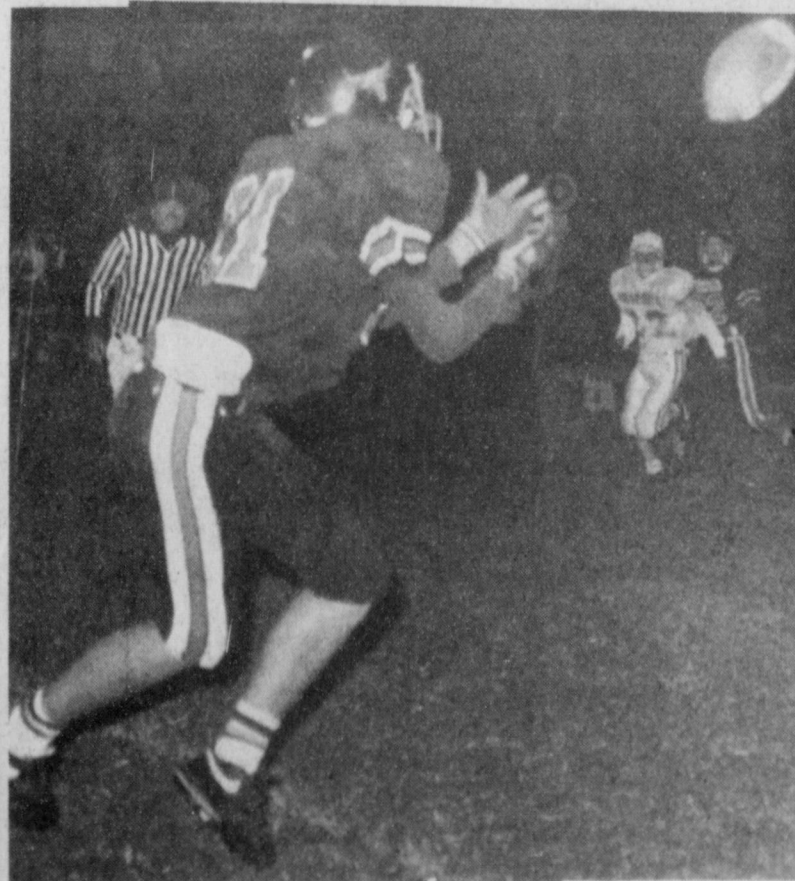

During pre-game activities, Patricia DelToro was crown the 1991 Homecoming Queen for Muleshoe High School. She was escorted onto the field by her father Rey DelToro. Ramiro Alarcon, varsity football captain escorted her.

Other queen candidates were Shea Wilbanks who was escorted by her father Paul Wilbanks and Yvette Hernandez who was escorted by David Quintana, Sr. Mike Friend and David Quintana, varsity football captains, served as escorts for the other candidates, respectively.

Taking the opening kick-off of the game, Dimmitt Bobcat Coby Heller raced downfield into the endzone for the first touchdown of the game at 11:42 showing on the clock. He scored on a 73 yard run with the extra point try being unsuccessful.

The Mules taking possession of the ball at 11:34 in the first quarter were able to rack up about 18 yards in their first possession of the ball before having to punt the ball away to the Dimmitt Bobcats with 10:23 showing the clock.

With the Bobcats in control of the ball once again saw themselves in the endzone with 9:00 minutes left to play in the first quarter.

Bobcat Chris Cowen made it into the endzone on a 7 yard scramble with the PAT being no good.

The score stood at Muleshoe

0, Dimmitt, 12. With the Mules in possession of the ball once again at 8:54 in the first quarter were unable to gain some yards before the first penalty flag of the game was thrown. The flag was called against the Dimmitt Bobcats for face mask, giving the Mules some momentum before having to punt the ball back to the Bobcats with 4:41 left in the first quarter. The Bobcats were handed their second flag of the evening for roughing the kicker.

With the flag, the Mules were able to capitalize on those penalties against Dimmitt, were able to make several first downs.

The Mules still in possession of the ball, were forced to punt with 2:17 left in the quarter.

After a few rushing plays and a pass attempt to Casey Summers recovered a Mule fumble by Ramiro Alarcon with :45 seconds left. A play later, Chris Cowen fumbled the ball as well but was able to recover his own fumble.

At the end of the first quarter, the Mules were trailing the Dimmitt Bobcats by a score of 0-12.

The Bobcats still in control of the ball at the beginning of the second quarter kept the ball to themselves when they fumbled it and shoved the football into Mule Territory.

Bailey County's New Ambulance Arrives

Ray Bogos from Mansfield, TX recently presented Jackey W. Burris, director of Bailey County EMS, the keys to a new 1991, diesel Wheeled Coach ambulance. After having flown to Dallas looking at ambulances, Burris met with the commissioners court in July and made his recommendations for the purchase of a new ambulance and the commissioners authorized the purchase.

Bailey County EMS started out on a First Aid responder level. First Aid was given at the scene, then the patient was transported to the local hospital. At that time ambulance service was provided by Ellis Funeral Home.

The next phase of the ambulance service was in the nursing home, where an office was established.

In 1985, Rochell (King) Watkins, RN, EMT was the director. The ambulance service started out with a director, secretary and 10 volunteers.

When a call came in at the police department for an ambulance, Ms. Watkins was called. She would then call a crew. They would get the ambulance out, use the radio to call the police department and get the address and nature of the call.

The level of training was improved to EMT (Emergency Medical Technician). At this time two paramedics were added to the service. They would rotate days.

Then came 1986, new things were in store, pagers were purchased. Now the volunteers could be paged direct. Ms. Watkins was still director, serving until 1989.

In 1987-88 the service grew by leaps and bounds. There were 14 volunteers and three full time employees. More pagers were added.

In September of 1989, the service had a new director, Joy

Harp, EMT. The office staff consisted of four full time employees.

Jim Fitzgerald came on to the service as director in November 1989, and stayed through May 1990. There were 14 volunteers and three full time employees. At this time all volunteers have pagers and can be paged direct by the police department.

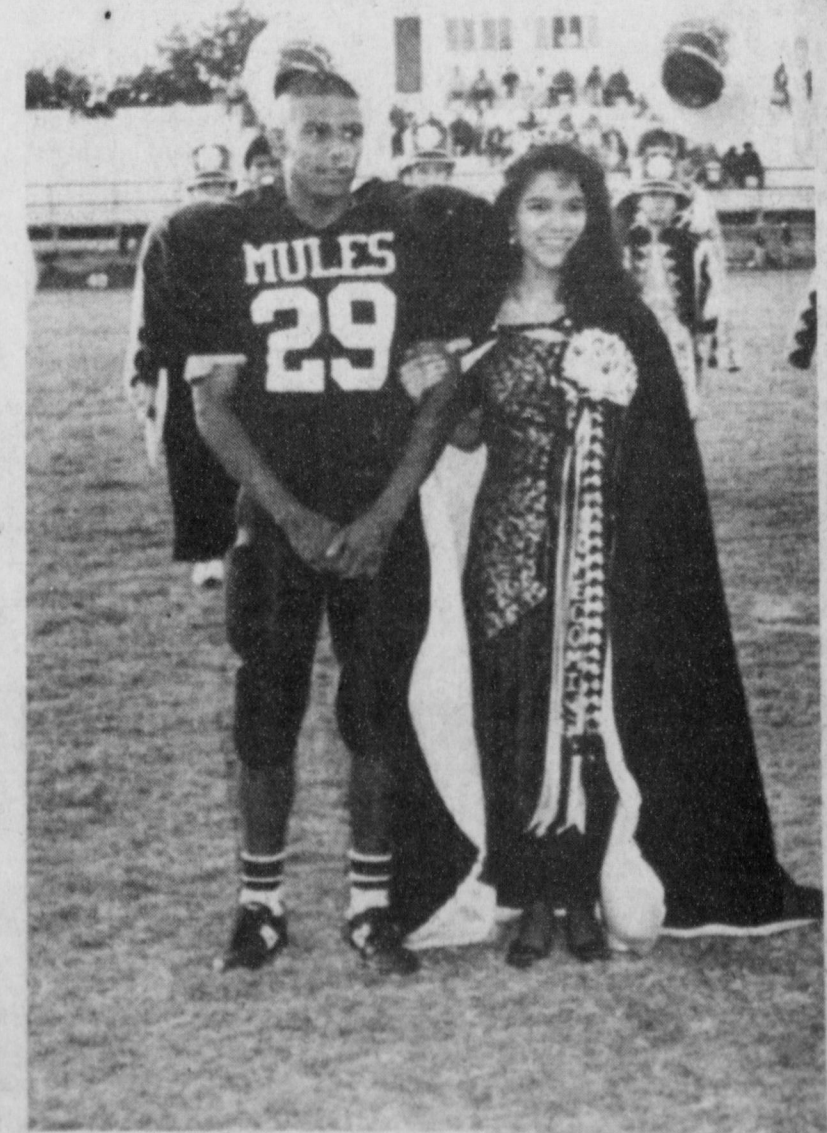
Lazbuddie Wildcat

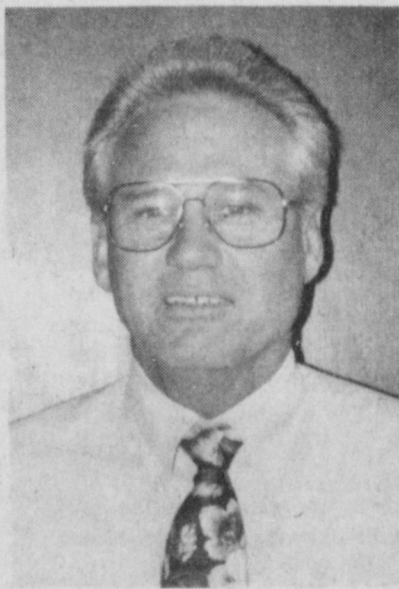

2. Reserving marinade, remove and drain pork. Preheat microwave browning dish 8 minutes or as directed by manufacturer of dish. Add oil, red pepper and celery. was appointed director of the ambulance service and is presently in that position.

There are 11 volunteers, three full time employees and five EMT students.

There are two levels of response for the ambulance, Code 1 and Code 3. Code 1 is a non-emergency and Code 3 is an emergency, with lights and sirens. It is the paramedics decision which code to use when transporting a patient to the hospital.

Bailey County EMS now has three ambulances, the two primary units and a reserve unit.

All those involved are constantly upgrading skill levels to be able to give the citizens of this area the best medical help available.

Every ambulance service is required to have a physician to give medical direction and control. Dr. Bruce Purdy serves in that capacity for the Bailey County Ambulance Service, as well as the Lazbuddie EMS. Each physician sets up procedures and requirements. These guidelines are used by the crew on all calls.

"We would like to take this opportunity to thank the citizens in this area for the support and confidence in your ambulance service," said Joyce McGehee.

To date the service is making approximately 500 calls a year.

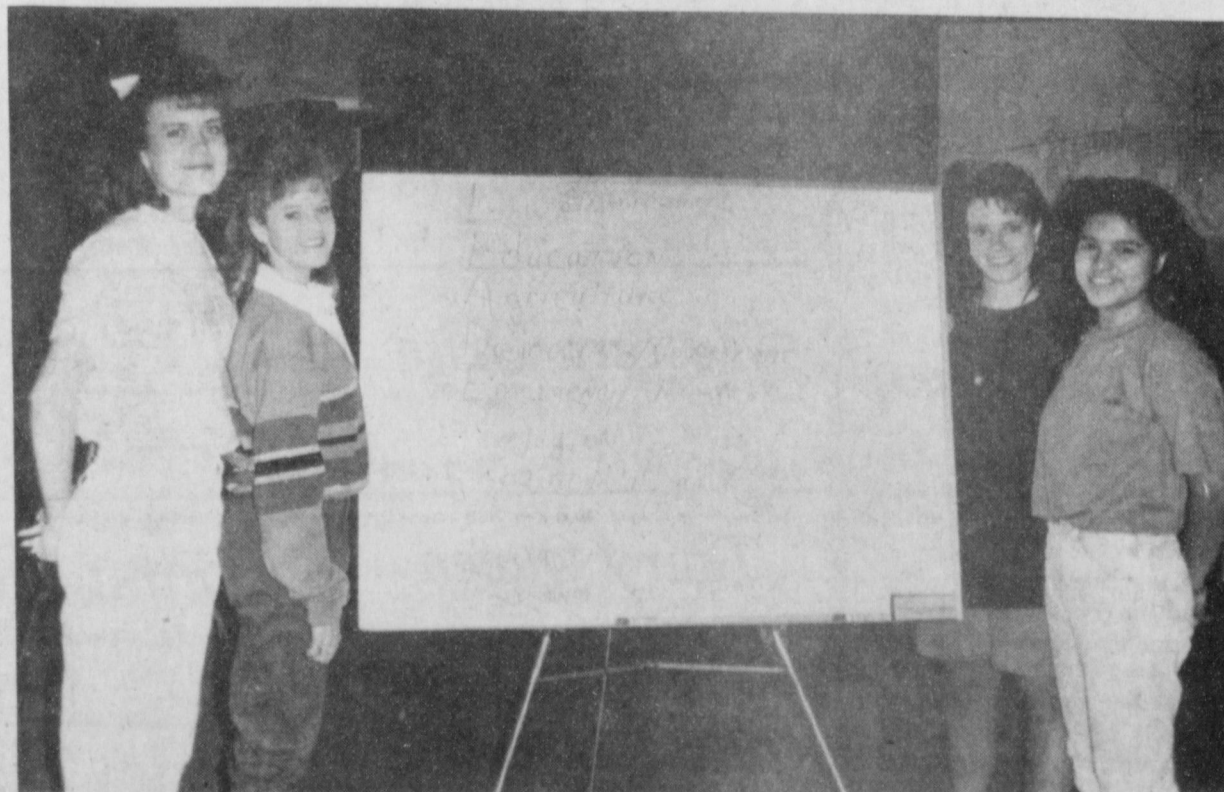

Letter To The Editor

Dear Mr. Hall:

The Senior Companion Program oversees a group of elderly who perform duties for other Senior Citizens. The main office is located in Levelland, Texas. The Senior Companion Program is funded by ACTION and is sponsored by South Plains Community Action Association. Like most funded organizations, it's short of funds. Our two main goals are (1) to help the elderly and handicapped stay in their own homes instead of going into nursing homes and (2) to keep senior citizens active in their communities.

The Companions do light housework, help with grooming, shop for the clients groceries, give respite care for those living with family members and develop relationships. These services are offered without charge to the client and their family.

The Companion must be at least 60 years of age and fall within the federal poverty guidelines. They also must be in reasonably good health and "retired" from the work force. These individuals work 20 hours a week and serve 1 to 3 clients in a week's time. The Companion receives a small allowance that helps to improve their lifestyle with the cost of living as it is today. The SCP has 96 Companions ranging from 60 to 86 years of age that are from an 8 county area that covers approximately 8,000 sq. miles. During the Christmas season a recognition lunch is held and

gifts are given to those that give so much of themselves to their clients.

The Senior Companion Program needs donations of samples, seconds or rejects, or whatever you could donate to use as gifts or as door prizes to give to the companions. Any donation to the program would classify as tax deductible. Thank you in advance for any contribution you can make to our Program.
