two to four of the plows in third, fourth or fifth gear. The way the frames and points are constructed with a pull towards the surface of the earth, makes it possible to draw several plows at the required depth with ease.

Mr. Jennings has included a feature in his invention which puts his plow far ahead of any sub-soiler yet on the market. The chisels may strike a root, rock or any underground object with no damage to the plow or tractor. A tripping device raises the chisel in a motion which backs away from the obstruction, raises enough to clear the object, and heavy springs reset it into the ground at no loss of space. This feature alone is making those who do sub-soiling place orders for the new plow in advance of production

Mr. Jennings stated that he had contracted with various manufacturing houses for the frames, springs and chisel points. He expects to receive enough parts soon for assembling 500 plows and stated that he would increase production as fast as possible. Later he intends to build smaller units which can be used as cultivators, for heavy sweeps and other types of plowing. Units will also be built on wheels for tractors that do not have tool

His patent papers read: "Various changes may be made to the form of the invention herein shown and described without departing from the spirit of the invention or the scope of the claims.'

The Jennings plow has been used already on a number of Runnels county farms and ranches. Tests were recently nade on a nearby farm where ub-soiling was done with the machine on one terrace. Dirt moist enough to ball up by hand was found at 33 inches eep. One local farmer stated used the machine to chisel etween a terrace which had lways caught full and run ver after a heavy rain. Folowing a three-inch rain sevral weeks ago the water hardly tood in the terrace, all going into the ground. Crops on this part of the field are showing the result of the deep moisture all of which have been built in addition to a few demon-
