# Bearcats to Open Season Tomorrow Night

The Ballinger Bearcats will open the 1951 football season here tomorrow (Friday) night when they meet the Eastland Mavericks. It will be the first home game this year and for five straight Friday nights the Bearcats will be at home. Game time has been set for 8:00 p. m. with the bands and pep squads to make their entry earlier.

Eastland flashed a surprise offense last Friday against the Coleman Bluecats and defeated the regional champions by a score of 19 to 6. The Mavericks have a short squad, only 16 men suiting out for the first game, but plenty deep in exper-

ience. Against Coleman they combined running and passing from a spread formation which bewildered the Bluecats. Two of the touchdowns came on forward passes and the other on a wide end run.

The game at Albany last week-end found the Bearcats in plenty of trouble and they were forced to take the short end of a 12 to 6 score. The Albany Lions are back as a threat in their district with a full team of lettermen and a hard running backfield. Coaches Douglas Cox and Frank Barnett have worked hard this week, correcting mistakes made by the Bearcats last Friday night, and expect to field a better combination this week.

Eiroy Payne and Harold Merrifield turned in a good offensive game and time and time again ripped gains through the Albany line. A fumble deep in the third quarter on the 12-yard line was a tough break for the Bearcats and probably prevented a tie game or possibly a victory.

For the opening game here all the school color will be seen. The Bearcat band will make its first appearance under Director A. T. Estes. Members have been working since before the opening of school in order to be ready for the season.

The pep squad completed its organization last week and will be out in force for the Eastland game.

School officials are hopeful for one of the best crowds of the year tomorrow night.

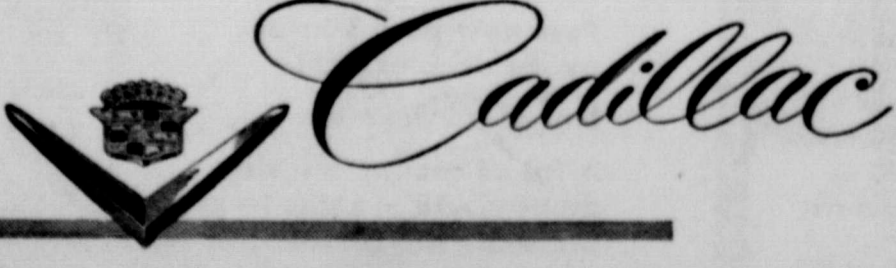

NOTES**

The first bale of 1951 cotton was sold here Saturday morning, a good premium being subscribed. Runnels county, with more than 200,000 acres planted in cotton, had a chance to set a record in production at the beginning of the season. Dry weather has almost brought a complete failure and few observers are willing to make a prediction on the final ginning total. Not only is the cotton crop one of the poorest in recent years, but feed and other farm products have been severely damaged because of dry, hot weather. The poor crops are hitting livestock raisers, many of whom are selling their lambs and other animals rather than go into the winter with insufficient feed. Cotton harvesting will get going within a few weeks, but most of the crop is very late.

Ballinger needs a house numbering campaign which would put the correct number on each dwelling in the corporate limits. Those who with citywide delivery service are finding plenty of trouble, especially in the new additions and in the sections south of Hutchings Avenue. Often two sets of numbers are found in the same block and there are several blocks that have the same numbers on the same street. The Ledger has had considerable difficulty in the delivery of newspapers due to this cause. Boys are given lists according to streets and house numbers but even this plan is proving difficult until the carriers can memorize their routes. There are more misnumbered houses on avenues than on streets. If some organization with a supply of numbers would make a canvass the matter could be corrected with little difficulty. The Rotary Club recently did a good turn in getting streets and avenues properly marked at intersections.
