**DICK RUSSELL BACKS ADLAI**

RUSSELL IS THE GEORGIA SENATOR FOR WHOM GOVERNOR SNIVERS AND TEXAS DELEGATION VOTED UNANIMOUSLY ON ALL BALLOTS AT DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN CHICAGO

Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, the man the Texas Delegation headed by Gov. Allan Shivers supported on all ballots at the national Democratic convention in Chicago, predicted last week that Adlai Stevenson and John J. Sparkman will be elected by one of the largest majorities given a national ticket in recent years.

Senator Russell, who is chairman of the senate armed services committee and of the senate subcommittee on agriculture, said: "General Eisenhower's evident confusion in his efforts to grapple with vital political issues has clearly demonstrated to the American people the grave danger of placing our government in the hands of a military man. . . . No military career, however great, can be a substitute for familiarity with the operation of a government which traditionally and by law is dependent on civilian control. . . ."

"As one who has admired General Eisenhower as a military leader, I have been bewildered by the endless contradictions of his political pronouncements. It would require a book to catalog them. . . . Shortly after stating that he did not understand the term 'Farm Parity,' he assured the American farmer of 100% parity for all the products of his soil. As one who has devoted a large part of his legislative service to overcoming Republican opposition to fair farm legislation I have vainly awaited an endorsement of this last farm statement from General Eisenhower's Republican congressional supporters. I have failed to see where one of them has disclaimed his record of opposition to the soil conservation program and to the laws which enabled these farmers to have some idea when they plant their crops what they will receive from their harvest. . . ."

"The American voters are thinking for themselves in 1952. Neither the bedlam of this campaign nor the military glamor of the Republican candidate will confuse them. They will go to the polls in the greatest number in our history on November 4 to maintain in power the party of the people. . . ."

"Governor Stevenson has the potentialities which can make him one of the greatest presidents who has ever served our country. With the support and prayers of the American people and the aid of the Almighty he devoutly worships, he will see this nation safely through the dangers of today's world."

vice rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Ballinger by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns are hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

Minimum Monthly Bill \$5.00  
Readiness to Serve Charge \$5.00  
All Gas at \$7833 per m.c.f. gross; \$705 per m.c.f. net  
Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

Except with respect to rates, all charges for natural gas service now in effect shall remain in effect unchanged.

The above rates and charges are applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

**SECTION 2.** The rates and charges set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or the company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law.

**SECTION 3.** The fact that there is an imperative public need for an immediate change and adjustment in the rates and charges for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the mayor.



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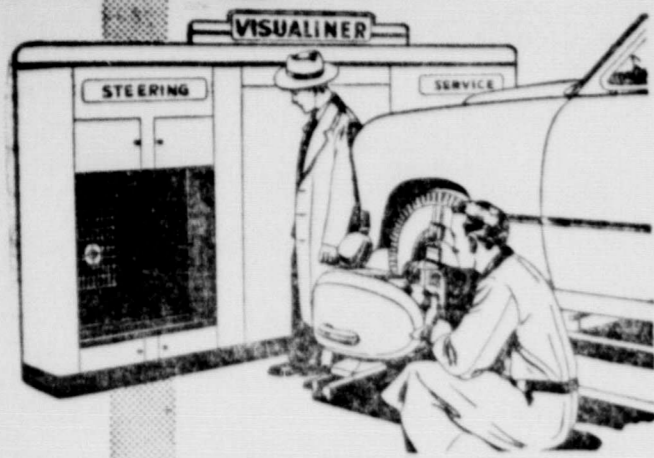

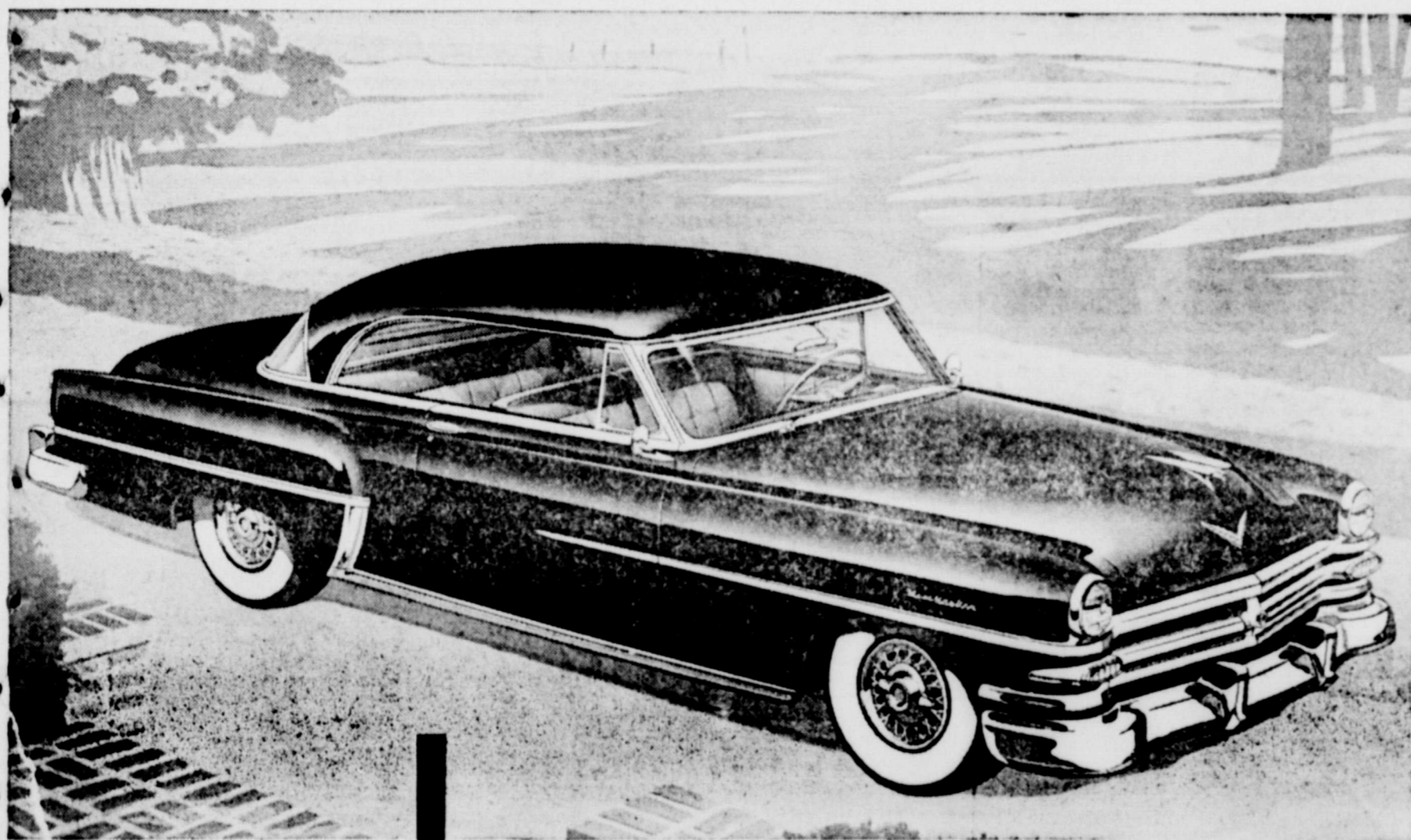

## Fourth Quarter Scoring Gives Bearcats Victory

The Ballinger Bearcats came from behind in the final period Friday night to edge the Comanche Indians by the score of 18 to 14. It was the passing of Jerry Bell and the pass catching of Billy Maedgen and Dan Dankworth that turned the trick and gave the Ballingerites the better part of the score.

The Redskins were a constant threat on the ground and added 301 yards running during the evening against a Bearcat defense that took advantage of every break. Four times the red-shirted boys covered fumbles that put them on the offense again.

The Bearcats counted first when Bell heaved a 45-yard pass to Maedgen, who caught it on the goal line and fell across for the touchdown. Buddy Clark's try for the extra point was no good.

The score at half time was 6-0 in favor of the locals.

Early in the third quarter Weldon Hicks started a wide end run, lateralled to Lloyd Biggs, who raced down the side line for 69 yards and to touchdown. Hicks added the extra point to put the Indians out in front, 7-6.

Only a few plays later Hicks started another wide run, cut back in the opposite direction, where he picked out blockers and for 68 yards out-distanced the Ballinger contenders to rack up another touchdown. Hicks added the extra point to make it 14 to 6 for the Tribe. After recovery of a fumble, Bell passed 21 yards to Dan Dankworth, who was down on the Indians' 4-yard stripe. Mike Egan went over to chalk up six more points but Clark's kick was again wide of the uprights, leaving the Indians leading by two points. In the final minutes Bell found Maedgen in the open

again and threw a 28-yard pass to him. Maedgen took it on the 13-yard line and raced to pay dirt. Clark again failed to kick but the third touchdown put the Bearcats out in front.

First downs were Comanche 11 and Ballinger 12.

In ground gaining the Redskins had a total of 301 to the Bearcats' 146.

The invaders passed 10 times, completing 4 for a total of 37 yards. The locals passed 10 times, completing 7 for a total of 138 yards.

Each eleven was penalized three times, Comanche for 35 yards and Ballinger for 25

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## WEST TEXAS NOTES

Absentee balloting in Texas counties indicates the largest vote in history will be recorded at the general election on November 4. Many organizations are pushing until election day to get all eligible voters to go to the polls and express their preferences. In Ballinger, Boy Scouts, Rotarians and special groups are conducting campaigns to get all men and women to go to their voting boxes next Tuesday. The Texas Bar Association has called the attention of its members to the fact that less than half the lawyers in the state voted in the last general election and at the same time is urging 100 per cent turn-out at the polls this year.

After the general election Ballinger citizens will face another important election on Saturday, November 8. At that time the city will submit a \$100,000 bond issue, the proceeds to be used for expanding and improving the municipal water plant and distributing system. Last summer patrons would have faced rationing had it not been for the Elm Creek lake and the old pumping plant there. Next summer when the peak period arrives, the Elm Creek supply will not be available and unless facilities are expanded at the new lake, additional pumps installed and other work done, rationing will be imperative, even with an abundance of water. The city commission is submitting the issue at this time so that if the bonds are authorized, pipe and other critical materials can be ordered and received in time to complete the job before the heavy consumption period. They are leaving the matter entirely up to the citizens after giving the facts in regard to

Home demonstration agents from a wide area in West Texas assembled at Stephenville last week for a dress making school. Miss Mary Ruth, of the extension service, was in charge of the instruction which will be made a part of the home demonstration clubs and girls' 4-H clubs program in 1953. The Order is as follows: WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Ballinger, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore

BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BALLINGER, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 8th day of November, 1952, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order,

at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:
