The first \$15,000 raised in the share-selling project goes toward the production of a "penny-loafer" shoe. The machinery comes out of a Terrell plant.

The company has been in operation on a seasonal basis 953, and gross sales for ave ranged near \$250,000 about \$68,000 paid out in

Ballinger citizens purchased \$15,000 in notes to get the company to locate here in 1953. The note-holders may convert their notes to stock, or may get their money back on, or before the due date, an official said.
