Water Board Directors Meeting Held Monday

Directors of the Runnels County Water Conservation District met here Monday night with members of the Runnels County Soil Conservation District for a special session. The groups met in the district courtroom at the court house with a good attendance.

A general discussion of a plan for retention dams on the Colorado River in Runnels County was brought before the group. A number of men from the two organizations recently toured the flood control project on Brady Creek and inspected retention dams in McCulloch and Concho Counties.

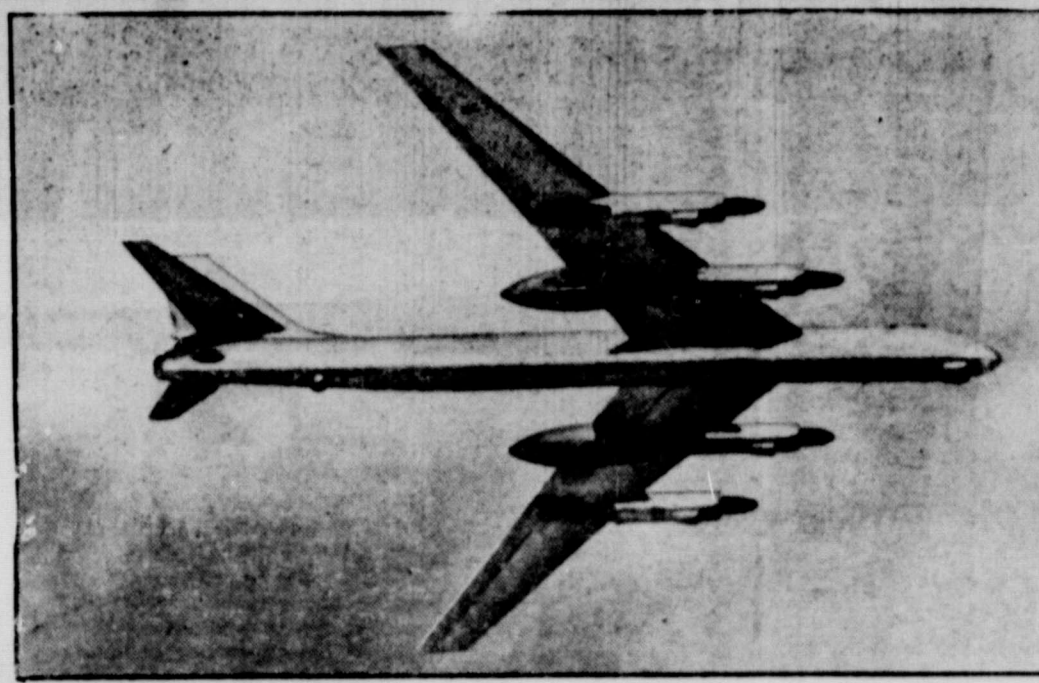
Members of the Runnels County board are watching the progress of the Poage Bill now before Congress and the success of the proposed project in this district will depend on its passage. Kirby Robinson of the Soil

Conservation board and Ray Fuqua of the Water district have sent wires to Lyndon Johnson urging him to support the Poage Bill.

Such a program of retention dams in this county would be built with federal aid as a flood control measure. It would provide for a series of large dams which would impound many acre feet of water before the flood waters reached the Colorado River and would serve the farmers and ranchmen for permanent water supplies.

The groups also discussed the salt water pollution problem in this county and at their next meeting will have qualified speakers on this subject.

Directors stated that under the Poage Bill the maximum project would be for an area of 250,000 acres.

There will be no game here Thursday night, all teams being idle on account of the all-star game scheduled at Hobbs, New Mexico. Tony York will manage the east team and Joe Giel, Kenny Jones and Ralph Mason will be members of the east all-stars.

Friday night, Pampa will move in for three games closing out Sunday afternoon, Monday and Tuesday, July 23 and 24. Plainview will be here for a pair of games.

Friday night, July 20, will be youngsters' night at the Runnels field and some lucky boy or girl will receive a Shetland pony, saddle and bridle during the game. This is expected to draw one of the biggest crowds of the season.

The Westerners were successful on the last road trip playing 500 per cent ball. A feature game was a two-hitter by Eugene Lippold against the league leading Hobbs team, which he won 5 to 0.

Absentee Voters Cast 27 Ballots In Primary Here

Monday morning a total of 27 people had cast absentee ballots in the first primary election. This number is expected to increase considerably before the absentee voting is over on July 24. Absentee votes may be cast all day Tuesday, July 24 which is three days before the election.

Boxes are being arranged by election officials and will be ready next week for distribution to the election managers in all boxes of the county. All supplies have been purchased and are on hand for the election.

Voting will start Saturday, July 28 at 8 a. m. and boxes will close at 7 p. m. As soon as possible managers will report their tabulations to the Ballinger Ledger office and these will be relayed to the Texas Election Bureau at Dallas.

Homer Hudgins, county chairman, and a full staff of workers will be on hand at the Ledger office to receive the returns and will keep tabulations posted as fast as possible.

The primary ballot is long this year and will take considerable time to count. Most boxes will begin counting early Saturday morning and will be able to give a complete result of their box shortly after the polls close.

Voters may cast their ballot by placing a check-mark in the square in front of the candidate's name or may scratch all the candidates for the office with the exception of the one they are favoring. This has been confusing to some voters and because of the two methods of marking a ballot, many have been thrown out by election managers. Only one method should be used by the voter.

Irrigation Hours For Water Users

Water pressure was so low a few days this week that some sections of town were without. City officials have announced a plan for irrigation in the future which is expected to make it possible to keep enough water in the storage tanks to provide pressure in all sections of the town.

Under the new plan everyone may water until noon each day. Beginning Tuesday, July 17, houses with odd numbers will stop watering lawns at noon on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Houses with even numbers will stop watering lawns at noon on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. As there has been no water shortage on Sundays yet, all houses regardless of odd or even numbers, may use water all during the day.

All water users are asked to take notice of this time provided for watering and abide by the hours. This is the only way that everyone will be assured of a supply of water at all hours of the day.

Research League Makes Study of County Roads

A. L. Barnes, staff member of the Texas Research League, spent Thursday and Friday of last week here visiting with the members of the Runnels County Commissioners' Court. Mr. Barnes was here to make a study of the road and highway problems in the county.

Thursday morning he was with the court in session where he asked many questions regarding the handling of road funds and other matters.

He discussed the unit system with the county officials and they pointed out the advantages of working on a precinct level in this county and not having a road engineer in charge of all work in the county. He was also interested in the many types of top soil to be found in this county which creates a road building problem. It was shown that as many as five different topsoils can be found in a two mile stretch in this area.

Thursday afternoon and Friday he spent time with each of the four commissioners in driving over roads in each of the four precincts and making a study of future needs.

The visitors asked members of the court in regard to the method of acquiring right-of-way and if the state should buy additional land and have complete control of roads. He was also interested in the number of miles of farm to market roads which would eventually be needed.

The Texas Research League is made up of 25 members for the purpose of studying highway and road matters in a large number of counties. After inspections in a county, a survey and report is made up by the staff member, for use of the entire board at a later date. It was understood that no report of the findings would be sent to the county.

Runnels County was one of 38 that is being visited at this time.

Humble To Drill 5,000 Foot Test In Rowena Field

Humble Oil & Refining Co. will drill a south step-out to production in the Rowena (Capps lime) field. It will be their No. 3-Ollita Wildcat. The application calls for a 5,000 foot test, a depth sufficient to test the Cambrian. Operations will start when application is approved.

Gulf Oil Corp. has filed application to drill their No. 3-J. W. Lindsey, step-out to production in the Sanford field, two miles northeast of Wingate. The project will be drilled with rotary to 4,600 feet.

Tex-Mex Drilling Co. will drill a 4,800 foot wildcat three mile southeast of Norton which will be their No. 1-C. J. Robinson. It is 1 1/2 miles southwest of the two-well Norton, East (Gardner sand) field.

George Baumgart and Jack A. Reichert No. 1-Hesterwood, 8 miles east of Ballinger, recovered 1,800 feet of sulphur water on a drillstem test in the lower Gardner. They are drilling ahead past 3,606 feet on a 4,600 foot contract.

Bert Fields No. 5-J. W. Smith has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 96 barrels of 48 gravity oil in the Norton, West (lower Fry) field. Top of pay was encountered at 4,328 feet.

Sunray Mid-Continent Oil Co. No. 1-Ryan in the Briley (Gardner sand) field has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 295 barrels of 40 gravity oil. Top of pay was picked at 4,373 feet. Location is 4 miles northeast of Winters.

M. J. Brannon Jr. has filed application to drill a 55,200 foot wildcat one mile south of Wingate. It will be his No. 1 Bessie Dean.

The Paul Thomas (3000 sand) field has been assured of another producer with the flowing of oil on a drillstem test in the King and recovery of oil in the Cisco reef. E. P. Thomas and Keith Graham No. 1 W. B. Reeves is located 6 miles west of Winters.
