





The Bible Teaches:

NO. 20 IN A SERIES. SAVE EACH ONE. YOUR QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS INVITED.

What Must I Do To Be Saved?

Past lessons have shown that we are not under the Old l'estament as a law today, that the events of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John occured under the law of Moses, and that we go to the book of Acts to find the plan of salvation

Christ told Peter that he could have the privilege of first announcing the conditions of salvation under Christ's will and that the conditions he bound would be bound in heaven (Matt. 16:18-19). Peter by inspiration (John 14:26; 16:13) did that on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1-4; 14:40), the day of the probation of Christ's last will and testament, and the birthday of the church (Acts 11:15; Mark 9:1; Acts 2:1-4; 1:6; 2:47).

Paul defines the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ as the facts of the gospel (1 Corinthians 15:1-4). Before they took place, of course, they could not be preached as facts, so the gospel could not be preached during the lifetime of Christ except in promise. On the day of Pentecost, however, those events had taken place and Peter preached to the people the death, burial, resurrection, ascension, and kingship of Christ (Acts 2:23-33).

PETER PREACHED CHRIST AND THE FACTS OF THE GOSPEL to the people to create FAITH in their hearts. In Acts 2:36 he told them to BELIEVE IN CHRIST ("KNOW ASSUREDLY . . . Jesus . . . Lord and Christ").

PETER WAS NOT A "FAITH ALONE" PREACHER. Salvation by "faith only" is an outright contradiction of the Bible (James 2:24, etc.) Peter had already told the people to believe (verse 36) and the fact that "they were pricked in their heart" and said "Men and brethren, what shall we do" (verse 37) shows that they did believe in Christ. Many of the very same people had taken part in the crucifixion of Christ (v. 23) so certainly they would not have been "pricked in their heart" and would not have cried out "what shall we do" if they were still unbelievers in Christ. Peter, laboring under the Great Commission, was taught by Christ to baptize BELIEVERS (Mark 16:16). The Pentecostians were told to be baptized; therefore they were believers.

If Peter had been a "faith only" preacher his answer to "what shall we do" by these people who believed in Christ would have gone about like this: "There is nothing more for you to do. I have already told you to believe and you have shown evidence that you do; therefore you are already saved and need to do nothing else." Was Peter's answer anything at all like that? No. Peter got his teaching from Christ and the Holy Spirit rather than from Martin Luther and human creeds (Matt. 15:9); therefore his answer to these people who believed was not "faith only" but "REPENT, AND BE BAPTIZED EVERY ONE OF YOU IN THE NAME OF JESUS CHRIST FOR THE REMISSION OF SINS . . ." Acts 2:38.

Christ had taught the same terms of salvation from past sins in the Great Commission. In Matt. 28:19 he said to baptize the taught. Mark 16:16 shows that the taught must be believers and must be baptized. Luke's version of the commission (24:47) shows that the ones baptized (baptism being the way to secure remission of sins: Acts 2:30; 22:16; 1 John 1:7; Rom. 6:3-4; 1 Pe. 3:21) must repent. Taking the three accounts of the Great Commission togetner we see that people were to HEAR (be taught), BELIEVE, REPENT, and BE BAPTIZED. Christ said the preaching of those terms was to begin at Jerusalem (Luke 24:47) and that Peter would announce them (Matthew 16:18-19). Peter in Jerusalem (Acts 1:4) by inspiration (Acts 2:1-4, 14-40) gave the same conditions of salvation from past sins: FAITH, REPENTANCE, and BAPTISM FOR THE REMISSION OF SINS (Acts 2:36, 38). Those conditions were spoken by the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:1-4), were bound in heaven (Matt. 16:18) and will remain forever unchanged (Galatians 1:8-9; Rev. 22:18-19).




