



Problems Of Soil Under Irrigation

Runnels Soil Conservation District. One of the greatest problems of irrigation farming is to prevent soil crusting and excessive cracking. The more cracks on the surface of the ground, the higher the evaporation rate according to George Krupala, local Soil Conservation Service Technician. The fine texture bottomland soils have a high rate of contraction and expansion at each drying and wetting. The cracks will be more pronounced on the soils low in organic matter. Severe crusting occurs on the medium and fine textured soils. Organic matter acts as a cushion allowing the soils to contract and expand without serious cracking or crusting.

Farmers concerned over this problem can help reduce this condition by planting cover or soil improving crops on these acres. These crops, if treated like a cash crop under irrigation, will provide a high tonnage of residue for the soil and increase the organic matter content. The cash crops following the soil improving crops will produce higher yields from the Constitution



22:6-16: 26:12-18. Notice first that just any religion won't do, and that more than sincerity is required to be saved. Saul was very sincere and zealous (Ac. 23:1; 26:9) in obeying

the religion taught to him by his parents and preachers Ac. 23:6; Phil. 3:5-6; 2 Tim. 1:3; Ac. 22:3). If sincerely obeying the religion taught by parents and preachers is enough.

then Paul was saved while persecuting the church and killing Christians. Romans 10:1-3; 11:20; Proverbs 14:12; John 4:24; 17:17; Matt. 7:21; Heb. 5:9 and other scriptures

Christ's appearing and talking did produce faith in

Christ's appearing and talking did produce faith in Paul's heart which caused him to repent. If he had not been a believer, certainly he would not have mourned three days (9:9) Saul was a disbeliever before the vision and a penitent believer afterwards. He became a believer just as people do today—by hearing Christ's words. The difference is Saul heard them audibly before the N. T. was written. We hear them by written word ("... faith cometh by hearing ... the word of God" Rom. 10-17).

If faith alone gains forgiveness of sins, it was absurd for Ananias to tell Paul to be baptized to have his sins washed away (22:16). If faith alone saves, Christ would have answered Paul's inquiry by telling him he was already saved; but James 2:24 and other passages plainly show that faith alone is not enough. If faith alone saves, the devil and his angels will be in heaven (Jas. 2:19).

his angels will be in heaven (Jas. 2:19).

Since faith alone is not enough, what did the pentitent believer Saul have to do? Acts 9:17 promises him the Holy Spirit. It was received at baptism (Ac. 2:38). The next verse (9:18) states that he "arose and was baptized." Though already a pentitent believer before baptism, he was still unsaved and in his sins because in Ac. 22:16 Ananias told him "Arise and be BAPTIZED, AND WASH AWAY THY SINS..." He could not have truthfully confessed before baptism, "I believe that God has for Christ's sake forgiven my sins" because he was baptized to wash away his sins.

What was the purpose of Paul's baptism? It was in der to wash away his sins (Ac. 22:16). His baptism being we scriptural baptism was "for the remission of sins" Acts 38. It was to come in contact with the saving blood of brist (1 Jn. 1:7; Rom. 6:3-4).
