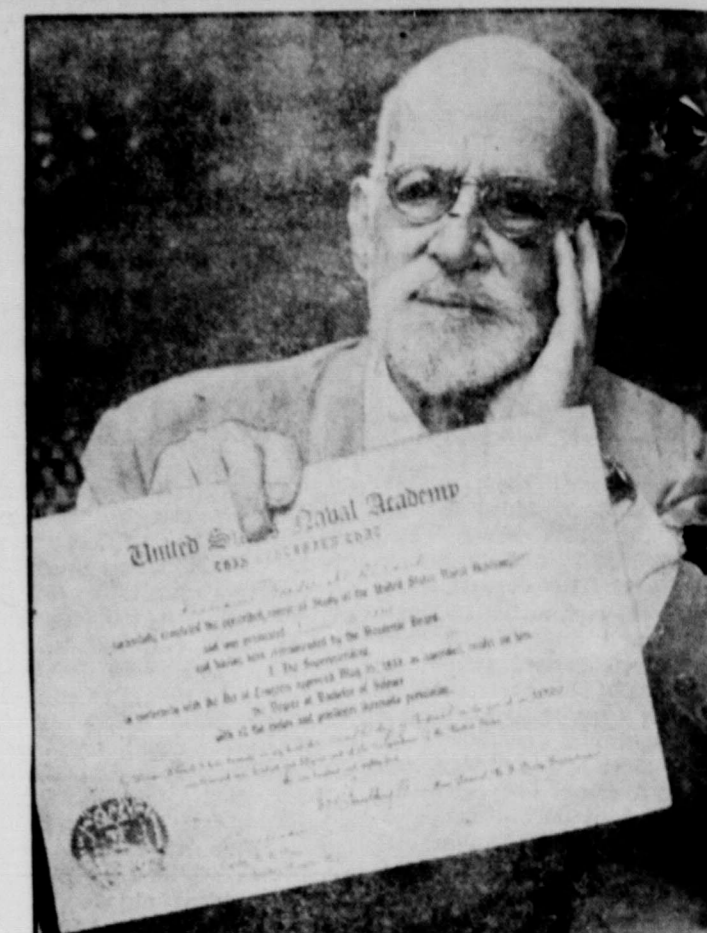
The Colonel was released from active service in January 1956. His most recent assignment was base dental surgeon at the Craig AFB, Alabama.

Roughage Plan Is Being Reappraised To Meet Demands

The volume of approved applications for assistance under the Texas Emergency Roughage program has exceeded the estimates of demand made when this program was negotiated,

so it is necessary to reappraise the actual cash requirements. The agreement between Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and Governor Allan Shivers provides for an allocation of \$1,000,000 of federal funds for the roughage program.

The Bible Teaches:

NO. 26 IN A SERIES. SAVE EACH ONE. YOUR QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS INVITED.

WHAT MUST I DO TO BE SAVED (No. 6)

CONVERSION OF THE JAILOR

Acts 16:25-34 tells of the conversion of the Philippian jailor. Paul and Silas had been committed to prison (v. 23). At midnight the prison doors were miraculously opened and the bonds were unlocked by an earthquake (v. 25-26).

JAILOR SAVED BY FAITH ALONE? Paul and Silas told him first of all to believe and he would be saved (v. 31). What kind of faith is spoken of here? Is it a dead faith, faith alone, like the devils have (Jas. 2:19)?

The human doctrine (Matt. 15:9) of salvation by faith only plainly contradicts James and the Holy Spirit. Martin Luther, the originator of this doctrine, realized that, so rather than change his doctrine he attacked the entire inspired book of James, an called it "an epistle of straw."

The Bible plainly teaches that we are saved by faith (Rom. 5:1, etc.) but it nowhere teaches salvation by faith alone. There is a vast difference. Peter says baptism saves us (1 Pe. 3:21) but it would be absurd to say baptism alone saves us. The Bible mentions many things which save us as grace, the blood of Christ, faith, baptism, works, etc. but none of them alone saves us. It takes them all working together. It takes God doing his part and man doing his.

Hebrews 11 gives numerous examples of O. T. characters who were saved by faith such as Abel, Abraham, Noah, Moses, etc. What kind of faith saved them? Dead faith, faith alone? "By faith Abel OFFERED..." (v. 4). "By faith Noah... MOVED... PREPARED AN ARK" (v. 7). "By faith Abraham... OBEYED... WENT" (v. 8) and "OFFERED UP ISAAC" (v. 17). "By faith Moses: 'REFUSED' (v. 24), CHOSE (v. 25), 'FORSAKE' (v. 27), and 'KEPT THE PASSOVER' (v. 28). "By faith the walls of Jericho fell down" (When? the moment the Jews thought they would? NO, they fell down): "AFTER THEY WERE COMPASSED ABOUT SEVEN DAYS" (v. 30).

Thus we see that availing, saving faith is active and obedient and not faith alone (the simple assent of the mind without any action). Faith alone will not save (Jas. 2:14-26). Paul, who preached to the jailor, knew the kind of faith that avails or saves because in Galatians 5:6 he plainly said, "For in Jesus Christ neither circumcision availeth anything nor uncircumcision"; (What does save or avail then, Paul? "BUT FAITH WHICH WORKETH BY LOVE.")

What kind of faith was Paul speaking of to the jailor then? Saving faith, a faith that leads to obedience. This is evident not only from the above discussion but also from the very verse (16:31) and his obedience which followed (v. 33). With it understood that saving faith would lead him to obey the commands, Paul tells him to believe and he will be saved (v. 31). All today who will have the kind of faith the jailor had, a faith that leads to repentance and baptism, can likewise be saved.

TAKE ALL THE TEACHING ON THE SUBJECT

Those who quote Acts 16:31 as the complete plan of salvation are ignoring that verse from the two that follow in the same subject to complete the teaching. Those who tell a sinner he can be saved by faith alone are not teaching all that Paul and Silas taught here as the plan of salvation. Let us not be guilty of subtracting from God's word (Rev. 22:19).

WHAT DID THE JAILOR DO TO BE SAVED?

After Paul and Silas told the jailor to BELIEVE (v. 31) "then they spake unto him the word of the Lord" as we read in the next verse (32). In speaking to him "the word of the Lord," the word of the Lord on repentance (Lu. 13:3; 24:47) and baptism (John 3:5; Mk. 16:16) must have been taught because the jailor washed their stripes (v. 33) and fed them (v. 34) indicating his repentance, and he was baptized (v. 33).

The jailor HEARD (v. 31-32), BELIEVED (v. 31), REPENTED (as implied by washing stripes v. 33), and was BAPTIZED (v. 33). It was then (after baptism, but not the moment he believed, that he REJOICED (v. 34). He had something to rejoice over AFTER BAPTISM because then his sins were forgiven (Ac. 2:38; 22:16).

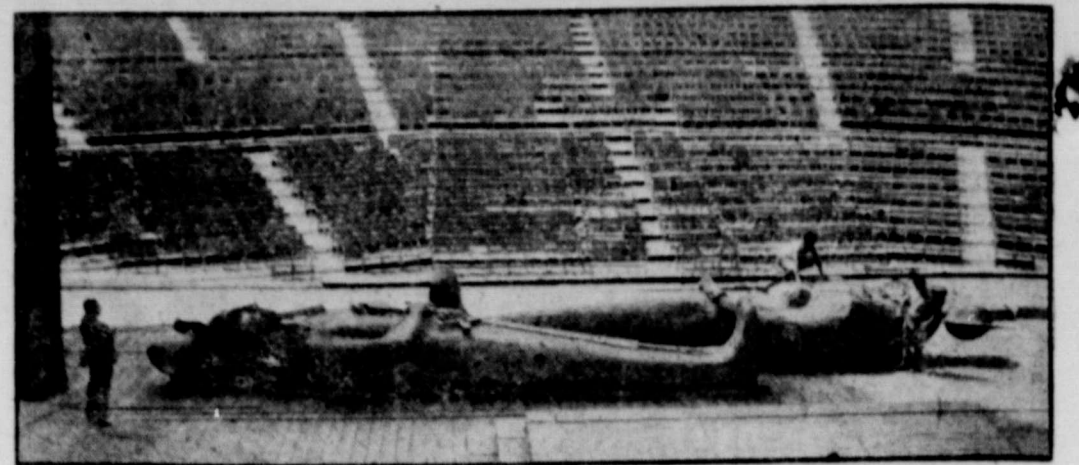
REVIVAL TO START AT CHURCH OF GOD

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

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WEST TEXAS NOTES

Water is getting serious in some parts of the county, and unless rain comes soon, much hauling will have to be undertaken to provide livestock and also water for domestic use. Such conditions are all the more reason why everyone should become interested and support the proposed flood control program being studied for this county. The building of many flood water retaining structures would keep most streams full of fresh water and still leave a large amount of water in these lakes which would be used by the persons on whose land the lakes are built. There are many other reasons why such a project would be a great benefit in addition to the preventing of flood damages following heavy rains. It is hard to realize the value of water until places are without. This county has two streams which annually runs-off much water that could be held and distributed into these streams over a period of time. A long range water conservation program with flood control benefits should be of interest to every person in the county and would take care of many urgent needs for the next generations.

At that time months of planning, preparation and hard work will come to a head and the 1,650,000 men and women who make up oil's family will report to the nation. A meeting of the directors of the Upper Bosque Watershed Association was held at Stephenville last week to make preliminary plans for calling an election to set up a water control district on the watershed. Should the voters of the watershed favor the forming of a district, such a program will be started on all tributaries of the Bosque River. All residents at Stephenville will be eligible voters and voting boxes and their locations will be announced shortly.

Coleman County's first United Fund Drive will be launched on October 23. A kick-off program has been arranged according to the chairman, Dr. M. D. Mann. Those heading the campaign stated that a sectional type pledge card was being printed and would be in the hands of each soliciting group. The fund will be attempted on a countywide basis with all communities participating in the fund which will provide money for a number of organizations which depend upon campaigns for their support.

The city council at Miles met last Monday and decided to go ahead with the laying of a pipeline from the new water well to the storage tanks. The well is located in the northwest part of the city. The pipe was purchased several months ago and is being placed in the line by R. A. Urban Co. Paul Gordon, county commissioner, is assisting the city by using county equipment to dig the ditch for the pipeline. A storage tank from another well will be moved to handle the water from the new source.

Joe Shiller, formerly of Rowena, will be in charge of the band at all rodeo performances at the Heart-of-Texas fair in Waco this year. He has been a professional musician for the past 20 years. The annual budget hearing was held at Comanche Monday with the county showing a drop in valuations there of more than \$200,000 bringing the total of the county to less than \$11 million. The tax rate was set at 80 cents on the \$100 the same it has been since 1950. The judge pointed out that renditions on property has not been raised since the early 30's.

The Kiwanias Club at Colorado City staged their annual kid day last Saturday with hundreds of boys and girls on hand for the fun and entertainment. The day opened Saturday morning with a free show especially for the children. Later this was followed by free ice cream. A huge kid's parade took place at 2 p. m. with cash prizes for the winners. A pet show with cash prizes was later in the afternoon with classes for dogs, cats, rabbits, goats, barnyard fowls and wildlife pets. A watermelon feast on the court house lawn closed the activities of the day.

An ordinance against street painting at Brownwood will not stop students at Howard Payne College. President of the student body announced that the whitewash would be dug out and streets outside the city limits would receive the usual paints before football games. Painting will also be done on the campus at the school but will be six feet back from the city's curb. The ordinance was past last year when the practice was abused at underpasses and when one visiting team's bus was given a new paint job.

Heavy shipments of sheep and lambs continued at Menard last week with the Santa Fe agent reporting stockyards jammed with livestock from the drought-stricken Southwest. The first of the week 6,941 sheep were handled by the Santa Fe along with several hundred head of cattle. In addition a large number were shipped by truck and some 7,000 head of lambs sold through the auction ring there. Reports were received that stockyards in a number of market centers were jammed and no livestock were being received.

The Winters directors of the chamber of commerce met last week with a group of merchants to discuss the type of Christmas program which would be staged there this fall. Plans for programs were presented by a committee and dates and programs were discussed by the merchants in an effort to stage a feature that would attract shoppers to Winters. The group also talked over details of a trades day promotion that has been submitted to the merchants as a business getter during the fall months. Approval was given part of the suggestions and the committee will proceed with plans.

The City Council at Brady received a request last week from the Parent-Teacher Association that the local police crack down on "numerous infractions of the law among teen-agers." The request came from the city council of the P-TA and was signed by all unit presidents. Although the letter did not specify what laws were being violated, the city officials stated that it probably referred to traffic violations. City council members referred the matter to the police for their attention.

The City of Eden has notified all dog owners that a new ordinance has been passed and that dogs will be impounded after October 1 if they have not been vaccinated, registered with the city and the dog tax paid by the owner. The emergency ordinance was passed in August by the city council at Eden and the fee for registering a dog at \$2 per year. The city has hired a dog catcher to start work on October 1 and has created a pound where the stray dogs can be kept for a period to give owners an opportunity to meet requirements and claim the animals.

The new Heart-of-Texas Park on the highway between Brownwood and Brady is about complete and already a number of people have visited the park area. Those in charge of the work stated that one more feature will be added to complete the job. An observation tower will be built on top of a high knoll where visitors may look into four counties. Four complete picnic units have been added to the park and are in use often. There are six acres in the park which was donated by McCulloch County and the city of Brady.

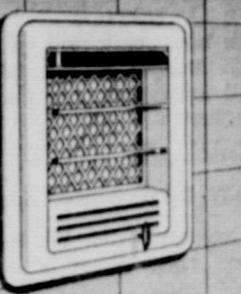

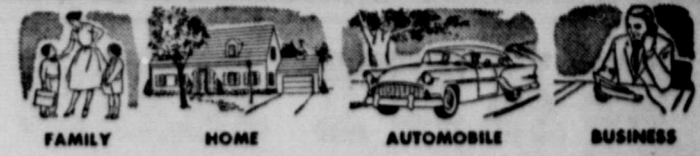

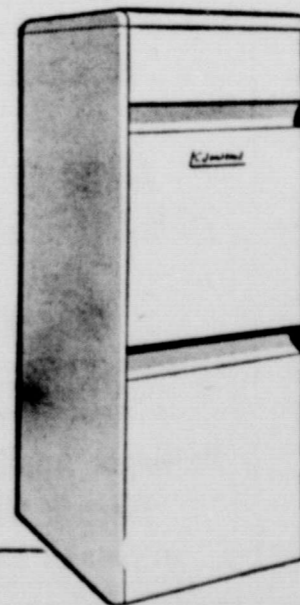
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
