The future 'Cattle King of Texas' had humble beginnings when at age 12, when he participated in his first cattle drive and drove the family herd of 92 head from Sabine County to a new ranch in Freestone County near the Trinity river. Because he had experience driving cattle through the often swollen river, drovers hired him to help drive cattle as far away as Shreveport.

At age 17, he hauled lumber from Anderson County to Dallas and processed Collin County wheat for flour back to Anderson County, for which he made a profit of \$520 on this one trip.

With this profit, he purchased his uncle's share of the family herd and he continued to work with the family business and convinced his father to move further west to Palo Pinto Coun-

In 1856, C. C. drove 1,500 head to the new ranch; but in 1859 war broke out with the Indians and he volunteered his services to help fight. As a volunteer, he just happened to be with the party that accidentally rescued Cynthia Ann Parker from a Comanche Camp. Later Sabine County Texas. As one of as a Texas Ranger, he served as a Lieutenant under Captain William Peveler.

After the war, he continued to participate in cattle drives and he eventually became known as the "Cattle King of Texas" establishing the Long S, the Lazy S and the Running Water Ranches, some of the largest in Texas. Mr. Slaughter had a very strong desire to become a 'gentleman breeder' and by purchasing Herefords from Charles Goodnight to develop the poorly bred, yet hearty longhorn and a World Fair grand champion Hereford bull, Ancient Briton, he was on his way.

By 1898, he purchased land in Cochran and Hockley Counties-246,699 acres and leased additional land to establish the Lazy S and allowed his oldest son to manage it. In 1899, he acquired the famous Hereford bull Sir Bredwell for \$5,000.

By 1906, he owned a million acres of land and 40,000 head of cattle and became the largest taxAt one time his land stretched from north of Big Spring 200 miles west to the New Mexico Border close to Lubbock.

He organized the Northwest Texas Cattle Raisers Association later the Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and served as president. He later opened up the large tracts of land for colonization, but due to poor management, the land reverted to him and by 1915 was again profitable for him.

He also became involved in the banking business helping to establish City Bank and later American National Bank.

C.C. Slaughter married Cynthia Jowell and they had five children. Widowed, he then married Carrie Averill and they had four children. He was heavily involved in helping to establish the First Baptist Church of Dallas and later the Baylor Hospital

in Dallas. C. C. Slaughter died at his home in Dallas on January 25, 1919 just shy of 82 years of age.

#### Wildfire dangers increase with high winds despite recent moisture By Kay Ledbetter

High winds and drying grass and brush should prompt homeowners and landowners alike to take time to prepare before wildfires spark across the state, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension

Service specialist. "Folks might think the recent rains will keep things from burning, but these winds will dry things out very quickly," said Dr. Ted McCollum, AgriLife Extension beef cattle specialist in Amarillo.

"It might even be time to get the mower out to knock down

any dry grass around homes and outbuildings, and ranchers will need to be checking their water supplies and fire suppression equipment," McCollum said.

The National Weather Service has issued a number of fire danger warnings for regions of the state due to high winds and low humidity, stating "outdoor burning and activities that cause open sparks or flames are discouraged....weather conditions will be favorable for the devel-

opment of large grass fires." McCollum said conditions are right for wildfires to start with any ignition source if the available fuel is dry and the winds are high in the coming weeks. Primary ignition sources include motorists who throw cigarettes out along the highway or drag chains that cause sparks, and swinging electrical lines.

Ranchers and landowners bordering any roadway, particularly, need to tend to fire breaks along fence lines and check water tanks and other firefighting equipment to make sure they are in working order, he said.

Some other specific precautions homeowners and landowners can take now are:

- Develop an escape or evacuation plan. The evacuation plan should include how to transport animals and livestock that may be in danger.

- Place fire extinguishers in all barns, vehicles and tractors. Check extinguishers periodically for charge. Discard damaged or used fire extinguishers.

- Keep barns and buildings clean of trash and other combusber and empty feed sacks. Keep outside areas clear of high grass, weeds and other debris.

– Make sure your farm has an adequate water supply, such as an irrigation ditch, water tank or pond.

- Park tractors and implements away from combustible materials such as hay stacks and fuel storage containers.

- Keep aboveground fuel storage tanks at least 40 feet from buildings.

McCollum said when the

power lines and electrical sources above heavy growths of grass and brush, conditions are such that any spark could start a wild-Any locations where

an electrical source is present, such as oil and gas well pumps, should be checked to ensure the lines cannot swing into contact with one another and create a spark, he said.
