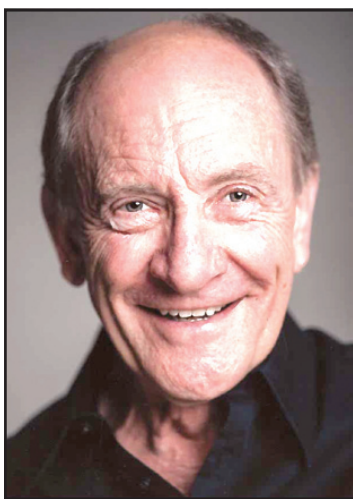
## Lewis named 2017 FHS Distinguished Graduate

Friona High School officials announced this week that Del Lewis has been named the 2017 FHS Distinguished Graduate. Lewis will be honored at the FHS Senior Academic Awards on Sunday, May 7 at 2 p.m. in the FHS Auditorium.

Long before Del Lewis was an actor, director, educator and member of both Actors Equity and the Screen Actors Guild, he was known as 1955 Friona High School graduate Don Edwin Lewis. Lewis was one of twenty-seven graduates that year. Lewis is married and now resides in Portland, Oregon.

Lewis studied acting with Uta Hagen, Irene Dailey, Joe Hardy and Alan Miller. He studied voice with Sergius Kagen at The Julliard School of Music. He holds a Bachelor of Sacred Music Degree with a concentration in Voice and Choral Conduction and a Master of Fine Arts in Directing.

He studied theatre-acting/directing at University of Wisconsin-Madison and voice & choral conducting at Midwestern State



University.

He was awarded a Kennedy Center Medallion for excellence in service to the field of theatre education. Lewis served as Chair of Region One KC/ACTF. He has also been on the national board of the University/Resident Theatre Association.

Lewis is the former Chair of Theatre Department, Director of Center for the Arts at Northwestern University for ten years before becoming the Director of The Center for the Arts for ten years leading up to his retire-

ment. He is the former Associate Professor, Head Graduate Acting, Director of Theatre at University of Wisconsin-Madison; and the former Assistant Professor in Theatre at East Carolina University.

Recently Lewis appeared as Mr. Higginbotham in episode 518 of "Grimm" on NBC and finished shooting two films: a short film "Desire's Masquerade" and a sci-fi thriller "The V-force."

His theatre accomplishments are many.

For Third Rail Repertory Theatre, Lewis appeared as Doyle in the 2016 production of "The Nether" and in 2015 as Maurice in their production of "The Night Alive".

In Portland Center Stage's 2014 production of "Othello", he was the Duke of Venice and in 2013, he was the Rabbi in "Fiddler on the Roof".

With the Sowelu Theatre Ensemble's production of "Hard Times Come Again No More" he was Yasha.

Just prior to moving to Port-

land in 2010, he created the role of Man in a one-person show entitled "Only the Words Break the Silence" from excerpts from Beckett's "Text for Nothing".

In 2007, Lewis played the Superintendent in My Fair Heathens's Off-Broadway production of "Death of an Anarchist". With the members of Gaiety, he played Pozzo in a production of "Waiting for Godot" in Dublin and Boston.

He has appeared on Broadway as Jacob Rothschild in "The Rothschild's" and in "Fiddler on the Roof" as Moishe, the Cobbler.

Some of his off-Broadway roles include Captain Fairweather in "Streets of New York", Sir Feeble Bredwell in "All in Love", and Chuck in "It's Only a Small Shower, Noah". With the National Company, he played Andrew in "There's A Girl in My Soup". With the National Theatre Company he performed Cleante in "The Miser", Captain in "Androcles and Lion", and Injun Joe in "Tom Sawyer".

Regional Theatre roles included Cervantes/Quixote in "Man of La Mancha", Gene in "I Never Sang for My Father", and Noah in "The Rainmaker" as well as seasons of summer stock in Michigan, Missouri and New York.

As a director, his credits include ten productions as founding Artistic Director of Madison Repertory Theatre in Madison Wisconsin, including a noted production of "A Streetcar Named Desire"; in North Carolina, he directed "A Christmas Carol" for The Playmakers Repertory and the outdoor drama "First for Freedom". As founding member of the York Players in New York, he directed "The Tiger" and acted in "The Interview". For the National Theatre Company he directed Ionesco's "The Lesson." As a director for University Theatre, he has directed over 80 productions.

Lewis now joins a long and distinguished list of graduates who attended and graduated from Friona High School.

## May 17 field day to highlight wheat research impact on food supply

At least 3 billion loaves of bread in the Texas Panhandle alone every year – that's the difference Texas A&M AgriLife Research is making, according to hosts of the annual Wheat Field Day.

Wheat research, and the difference it makes in the food supply chain, will be highlighted during the annual field day May 17 at the Texas A&M AgriLife facilities near Bushland.

"This year we want to invite the general public, along with producers, seed dealers and other key business associates, to come see our latest research in the fields and also see the difference it makes throughout our community and region," said Dr. Jackie Rudd, AgriLife Research wheat breeder in Amarillo.

AgriLife Research is co-hosting the event with the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and West Texas A&M University.

The field day is free and will include breakfast tacos, sponsored by Texas Wheat Producers Board, and a lunch, sponsored by the USDA-ARS Ogallala Aquifer program.

"We are very excited this year to show off our new hybrid wheat research, discuss the latest genetic discoveries and let producers walk through our field trials to see how different varieties are performing," Rudd said.

Additionally, attendees will get a chance to spend an hour viewing booths ranging from Texas Wheat's display for pro-

ducers and consumers to United Supermarkets' explanation of what types of wheat flour are used to make products ranging from desserts to tortillas to bread. AgriLife Extension will host a display, Going with the Grains, focusing on the value and importance of wheat in the diet.

Rudd said wheat breeding research and studies surrounding production practices of the crop have been conducted there since the 1940s. During that time, tremendous strides have been made to improve yields, drought resistance, insect and disease control, and production practices in general.

Since it started near Bushland, wheat research has improved dryland yields in farmers' fields from about 11 bushels per acre in the 1940s to more than 36 bushels per acre average today, he said.

With a bushel of wheat yielding 42 pounds of flour and making 90 loaves of bread, every acre of wheat is producing about 2,250 more loaves of bread annually. There are about 1.34 million acres of wheat harvested in the Texas Panhandle alone.

"Sometimes we don't do a good job of letting our neighbors and community know what is going on out on the research farm and what an impact it has on not only this region, but the nation and world," Rudd said. "We hope this event will help us reach out to more people and explain the importance of the work being done here."

Some highlights of the noon

program will be Texas Wheat's Role in the World by Steele Fischbacher, Texas Wheat Producers Board director of policy and marketing in Amarillo, and Valuing Wheat Quality by Dave Green, the Wheat Quality Council executive vice president in Lenexa, Kansas.

In addition to variety trials, one of the four stops will

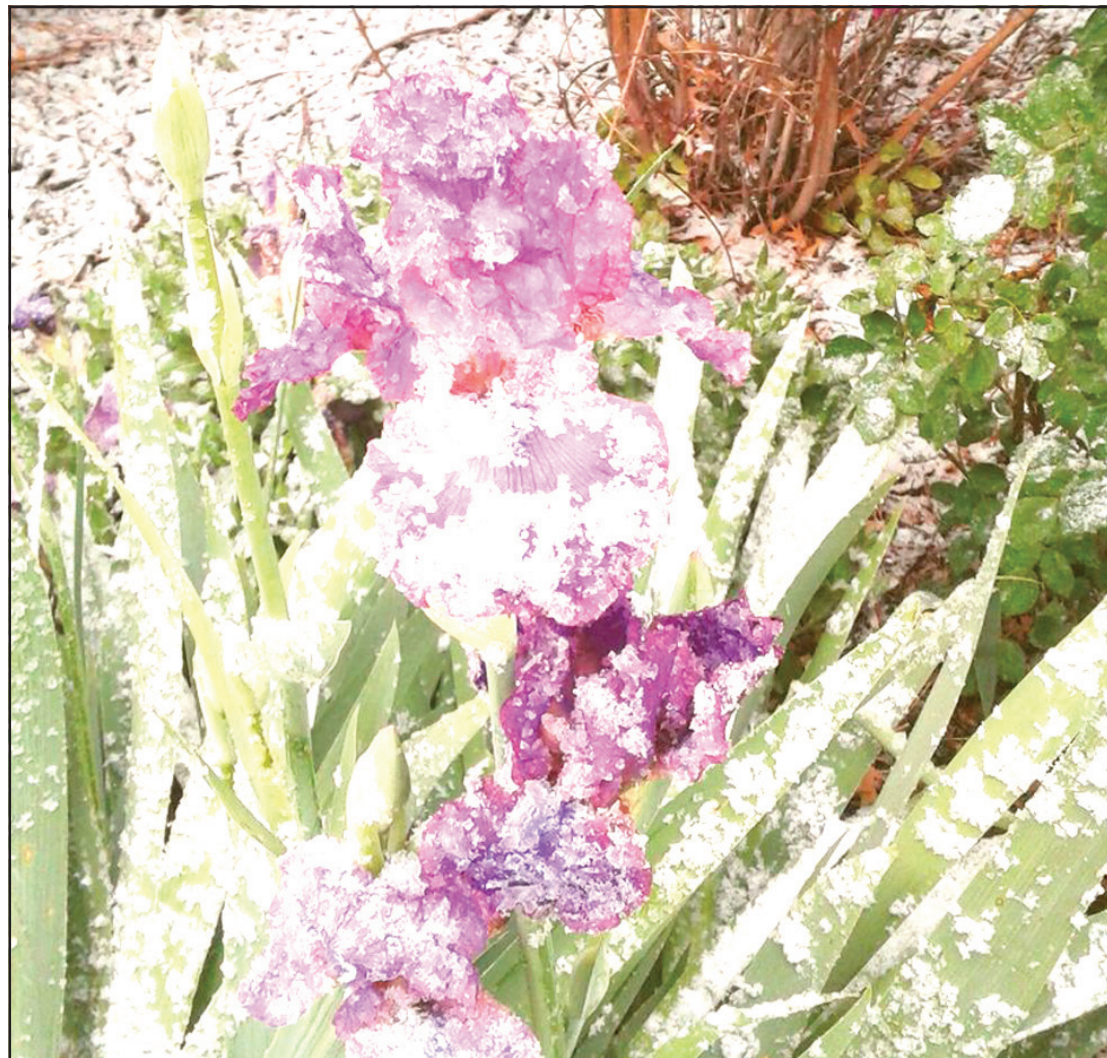
include discussion about how wheat breeders look for new and helpful traits by looking back to wheat relatives that might be considered weeds, Rudd said.

Presentations will also cover water-use savings, wheat curl mite issues, residue management for water conservation, management issues and genomics.

Once the tours are over, Dr.

Ron French, AgriLife Extension plant pathologist, and Dr. Ed Bynum, AgriLife Extension entomologist, both in Amarillo, will be available to discuss disease and pest issues. Producers are welcome to bring samples for one-on-one consultations.

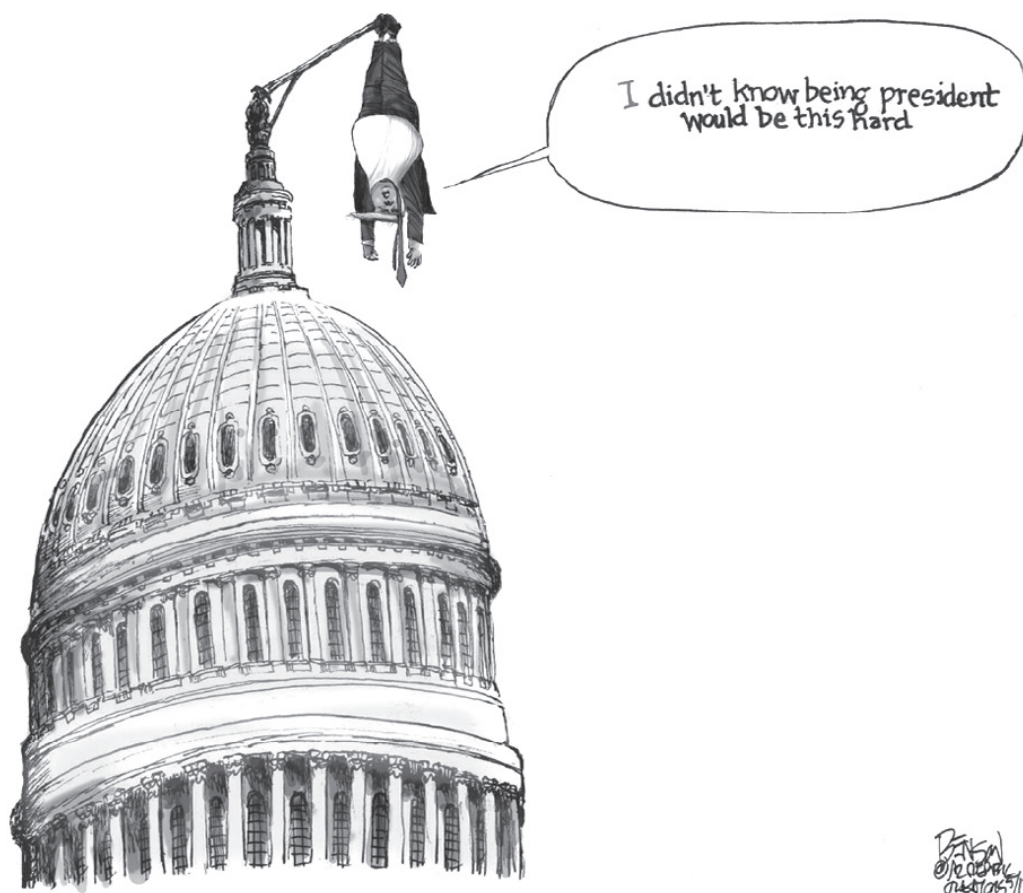
this country should be run.

## Library Corner

### Sunset Review

Could you pass a sunset review? We all have many beautiful memories of the Texas sunsets we enjoy and admire, but some Texas sunsets are not so pleasant. The State of Texas conducts a sunset review on all state agencies every 12 years (the last one was in 2007) which is overseen by the Sunset Advisory Committee who are currently collecting data input for the 2019 legislature. According to Ava Smith, Talking Books Director, in a recent newsletter Talking Book News: "as of March 2017 President Trump's preliminary budget for 2018 calls for the complete elimination of IMLS Institute of Museum and Library Services which is part of TSLAC Texas State Library and Archives Commission which receives nearly \$11 million federal tax dollars each year."

Budget cuts are not new to libraries, which are among the most resourceful of all government agencies. Libraries serve many people, all ages, all backgrounds and livelihoods and are always mindful of spending tax dollars wisely whether the funds are local, state or federal funds.

Even our small library, as a state accredited library, benefits from such programs as the Tex-Share Databases, Interlibrary Loan, Continuing Education, Summer Reading Supplies (although not as they formerly did) and Resource Sharing of all types. Our library serves as a demo site for the Talking Books Program that provides library ma-

terials for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. Texas State Library and Archives Commission also serves as the official archives for state records of all types. The Texas State Historical Commission provides an excellent resource in the Handbook of Texas online as well as preserving the state's history and placing historical markers. TSHC will also be under sunset review as a state agency. Evaluation and reviews are necessary and inevitable for most government programs to eliminate waste, but complete elimination is drastic.

Some of us can still remember the days of full service gasoline stations and phone calls before electronic mazes. Let's hope that other services do not become faint memories of days past and gone. Remember: the best way to support these services is to use them.

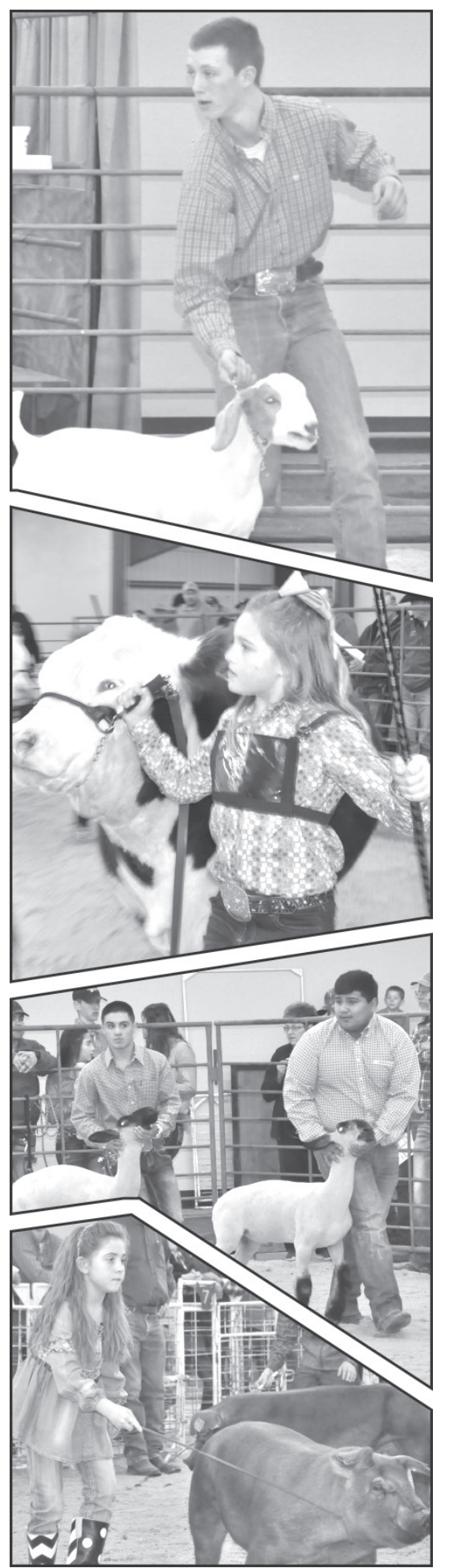

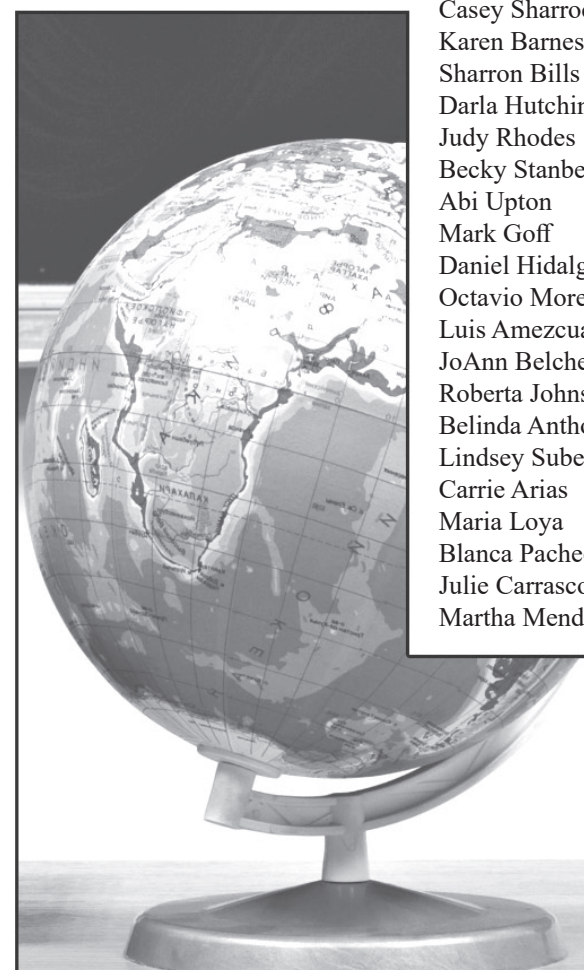
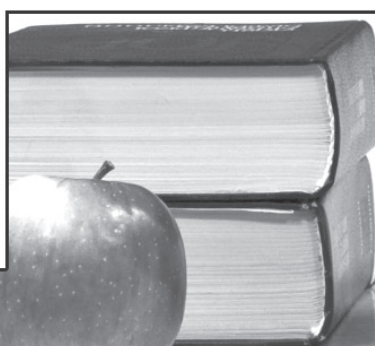
