Chieftain Baseball Camp is a big hit



4 Skills Your Child Needs To Know **Before Entering Kindergarten**

Kindergarten is supposed to be fun and educational, and allow children an opportunity to blossom because it is usually the first time the tykes are away from their parents for any significant amount of time.

And while most kindergartens don't exactly have GPA requirements, for a child to succeed there are a few milestones that should be reached before they toddle through the door, says Alise McGregor, founder of Little Newtons (www.littlenewtons.com), an early education center with locations in Minnesota and Illinois.

"New parents especially can have a hard time understanding that there are actually things their child should know prior to kindergarten," McGregor says. "But if they take time to make sure their child knows some basics, it will make kindergarten a better experience."

McGregor says the typical things a child should know prior to entering kindergar-

• Basic shapes. The child should have learned basic shapes like the square, circle, rectangle and triangle in preschool. If not, parents should teach



them. In kindergarten, they will probably be introduced to the hexagon, star, heart and octagon.

- The letters of the child's name. They should at least be able to recognize the letters of their name. In kindergarten, they will learn their uppercase letters and begin lowercase letters. They will also begin to learn how to write freehand without tracing.
- Numbers 1 to 10. Although some children will be able to count to 100 by the time they reach kindergarten, all should be able to at least be able to count to 10. Numbers will be used starting on the first day of kindergarten

so the children need to at least understand and recognize numbers.

 Social skills - The child should be able to follow directions, be able to be separated from the caregiver and use the restroom independently. Children who scream and cry when they are separated from caregivers disrupt the rest of the class. Teachers simply do not have the time to supervise individual students who cannot independently use the restroom.

McGregor says that it is important for children to get off on the right foot early in school. By teaching children these skills prior to attending kindergarten it should make it easier for them to succeed.

Gas Prices inch downward

Gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 0.5 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.74/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 1.9 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.94/g, according to GasBuddy.

Average gasoline prices on

June 4 in Texas have ranged average has increased 13.4 cents \$2.18/g in 2017, \$2.14/g in 2016, \$2.55/g in 2015, \$3.45/g in 2014 higher than a year ago. and \$3.37/g in 2013.




> This same indictment that describes Israel is still alive and well today. It is possible to know about Christ, but not every need and care.

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USDA Partners with Texas A&M to Help Veterans Seeking Agriculture Loans and Careers

USDA announced a partnership between the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Texas A&M's AgriLife Extension Service to help military veterans obtain loans and pursue careers as farmers and ranchers. Secretary Perdue joined local dignitaries, members of the Armed Forces, veterans, and community leaders at the Dallas Farmers Market to unveil the new pilot program.

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) is collaborating with AgriLife Extension Service on the pilot, which is part of the Texas A&M Battleground to Breaking Ground project. The program makes it easier for veterans to meet federal requirements to get FSA direct farm ownership loans, which can help provide access to land and capital.

The pilot program, which will include 15 to 18 veterans, will roll out in three phases: an introductory workshop, a business planning curriculum, and a production curriculum over a period of 12 to 18 months.

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$2.76 Billion in May

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.76 billion in May, 10.2 percent more than in May 2017.

"Strong growth in sales tax revenue was apparent across all major economic sectors," Hegar said. "While the most rapid growth was in remittances from the construction and oil- and gas-related sectors, significant gains also came from information services, restaurants and retail trade."

Hegar also said state franchise tax revenue for May was \$3.23 billion, 1.4 percent more than in May 2017. Year-to-date franchise tax revenue is up 11.3 percent. As anticipated in the Certification Revenue Estimate, lower refund activity early in the fiscal year contributed to higher than average net franchise tax collections.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in May 2018 was up 10.4 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections.

Revenue from other major taxes on motor vehicle sales and rentals, motor fuel and oil and natural gas production also rose in May 2018:

motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$424 million, up 11.7 percent from May 2017;

motor fuel taxes — \$309.9 million, up 1.8 percent from May 2017; and

oil and natural gas production taxes — \$416.5 million, up 56 percent from May 2017.

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
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
