



Motorist arrested after slow-speed chase

Friona Police Department officials reported that on Wednesday, July 18th at approximately 1:00 a.m., Mr. Andy Chavez led officers on a one-hour vehicle pursuit. The Hereford Police Department initiated a vehicle stop in their city and Mr. Chavez, driving a silver Dodge Charger, then evaded police. The Deaf Smith County Sheriff's Office assisted in the pursuit which led them into Parmer County and eventually into the city limits of Friona. Friona Police Department officers and Parmer County Sheriff officers joined in the pursuit in an effort to bring Mr. Chavez to a safe stop. Mr. Chavez was pursued down several city streets in Friona for about 30 minutes and eventually came to a stop approximately 3 miles west of Friona on U.S. Highway 60. He was then apprehended and charged with Evading Arrest or Detention in a Motor Vehicle and with other charges pending. Mr. Chavez was booked into the Parmer County Jail on a \$15,000 surety bond awaiting action by the District Court.

Board of Trustees hire new Superintendent

The Friona ISD Board of Trustees hired Mr. Jimmy Burns to be the next Superintendent of the school district. The action was taken during the regular meeting of the Trustees on Monday, July 16th in the Board Meeting Room of the FISD Administration Building at 909 E. 11th Street, Friona, Texas 79035.



Mr. Burns became the 14th Superintendent in Friona school history. He is currently the Superintendent at Hawley ISD, just north of Abilene, and will begin his tenure in Friona on Monday, July 30th. It will mark the start of his 25th year in the education profession. A more detailed explanation of the new software, and its uses, will be highlighted in a future news story.

One of the first items on his agenda is to update the FISD website in order to improve communication between teachers, students, administration, and the public. The board also received a report that 98% of property taxes due the district for 2017 have been collected. The not so good news was that property insurance premiums increased 30% due to the flooding and hailstorms in other parts of the state during the past year. Employee Handbooks, the Student Code of Conduct, and Campus Handbooks were all approved.

The board then went into Closed Session to discuss resignations and the hiring of new personnel. The meeting was then adjourned. The agenda for this meeting can be found at frionaisd.com and clicking on the Boardbook link. In other business, the board approved the purchase and implementation of COPSINC software which will provide better communication between FISSD and Law Enforcement personnel. This innovative app can be used on mobile devices and has the capability to improve response times and decrease response errors. The cost of the program will be \$1200 per year per campus. The FISSD consists of four campuses, Primary, Elementary,

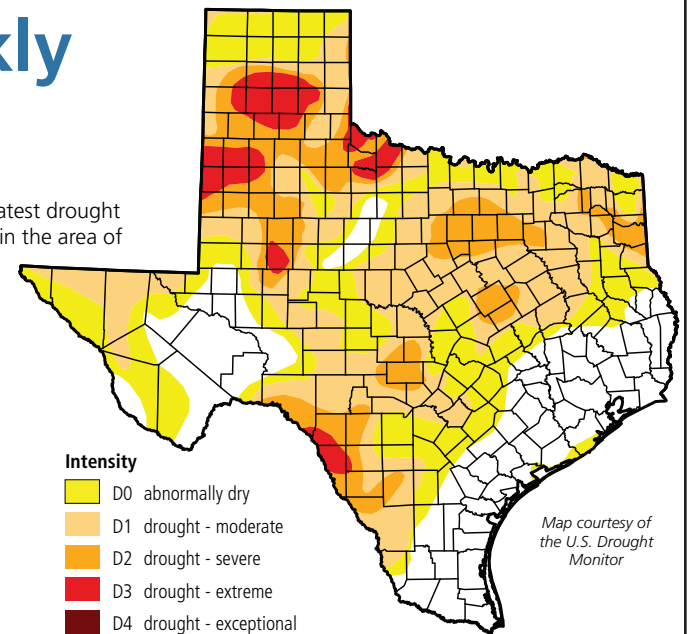

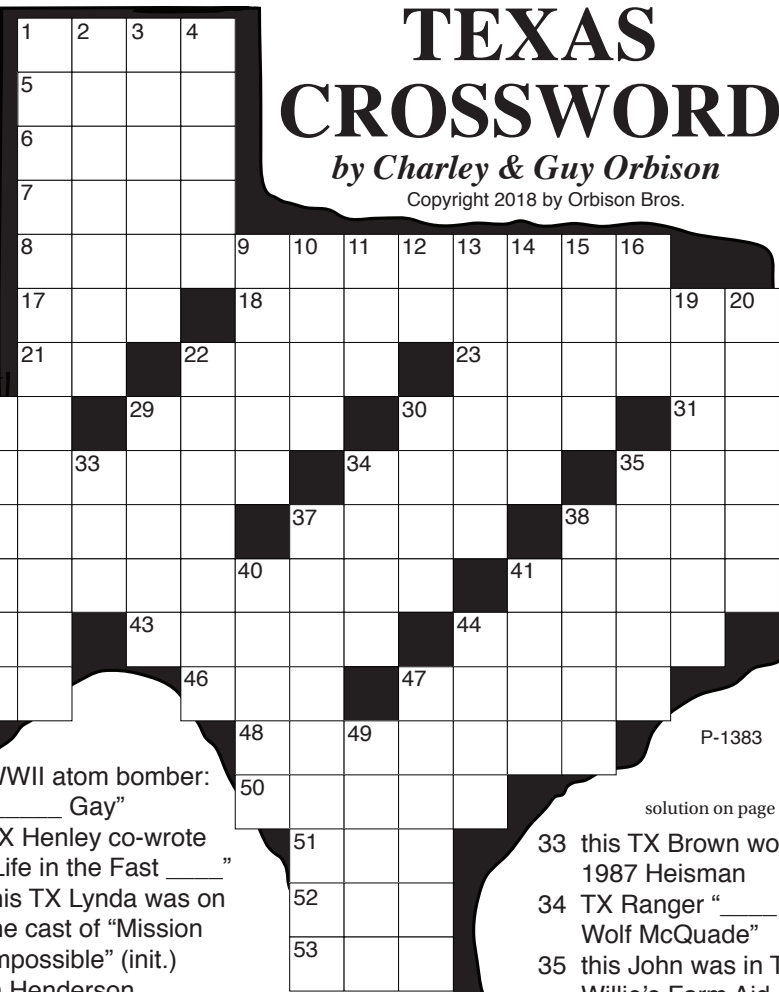

Northwest and PMC team up for scholarships

Parmer Medical Center is pleased to announce that three additional scholarships have been awarded to area high school 2018 seniors. The Northwest Texas Hospital Association selected Elizabeth Grado, Jacqueline Legarreta and Megan Stone each as recipients of a \$500 scholarship. Parmer Medical Center is matching the scholarships so each student will receive \$1000 towards their studies in the medical field.

Long-Time Curator, Michael Grauer Leaving PPHM

CANYON, TEXAS— Michael Grauer, curator of art and western heritage at Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, announced his resignation, Monday, July 16. His last day at PPHM will be August 31, and he will start at the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City shortly thereafter.

For 31 years, Michael Grauer has worked tirelessly on curating and exhibiting world class, award winning exhibitions for the museum. School children know him as “Cowboy Mike” and adults know him as a learned panhandle scholar and historian. As the curator of art and western heritage, he worked with the art, weapons, militaria, sports, and cowboy and ranching collections. The museum is grateful to Michael for his 31 years of service and exceptional care of the collection.

“Michael has garnered national and international attention for our museum in Canyon, Texas. At the same time he has created a large and loyal local support group for the museum’s art collection. Michael always tells me that everywhere he goes he is “riding for the brand.” That brand recognition he has created for



PPHM extends far beyond the Texas Panhandle,” said Carol Lovelady, director.

The Panhandle-Plains Historical Society will work with West Texas A&M University to seek a curator of history, a position encompassing some of Michael Grauer’s tasks as well as those vacated by Becky Livingston, history curator, who resigned in 2017. This position among other duties will curate exhibitions, care for the vast PPHM collection, and give public programs. 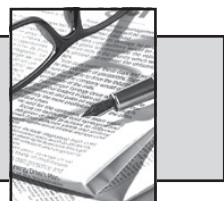
“Our collection is what makes PPHM an exceptional

From the Friona Archives of June...

June 1, 1945- Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Owens of the Hub Community south of Friona, have received word from their son, Pvt. Juel Owes informing them that he has been liberated from a German war prison, where he had been since the 4th of last October, and is in good health. He was liberated April 29. Pvt. Owens has been overseas a year and took part in the invasion on D-Day and was in combat most of the time thereafter until he was taken prisoner.

★★★

June 30, 1950- The demolition of the vault at the old Friona State Bank location, Fifth and Main this week, brought back memories to many pioneers of one of the most colorful banking histories ever

recorded in any era, or any locality. The bank has moved into its new location at Sixth and Main. Having survived through the threat of fire, depressions and bank robberies, the vault this week defied contractors as they began destruction last Saturday.

★★★

June 30, 1955- O.B. Moyer suffered severe bruises on his right leg early Monday morning when his tractor overbalanced and the front of the implement rose from the ground, pinning him beneath the steering wheel. He was digging a ditch on his farm six miles north and six miles west of Friona. L.D. Chiles, a farmer in a neighboring field, was servicing a combine when he heard cries for help. Chiles’

son, Jerry, took a truck, backed it up to the tractor, and Chiles pulled the injured man free.

June 30, 1960- Friona Lanes, Friona’s 12-lane bowling center, will hold its official grand opening Monday, July 4th, with two championship bowlers as the highlight of the day’s activities. These two bowlers, Norm Nicholas and Helen Duval, will give personal instructions during the morning, and then will give a match-bowling contest during the evening with local bowlers.

June 3, 1965- Open House for the new \$100,000 addition to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona will be held from 2-5 p.m. Sunday.

On a day unexpected, the Father sees his son a far way off. He runs to meet his son, and to do this the father has to raise up his tunic in order to run. For the Jews this was an embarrassment because it was showing the fathers nakedness. He was running to his son because the law was that any child who wasted there inheritance on wasteful living was to be cast out of the town and never to return home. However, the fact that the Father went and embraced his son, gave him his robe, shoes and his ring, was a sign of him restoring his son as though he had never left. The people respected the authority of the Father. But the Father had to reach his son before the people did in order to cover him. That is what Jesus does for us. He restores us and covers us with his precious blood. Moreover, he gives us another chance.

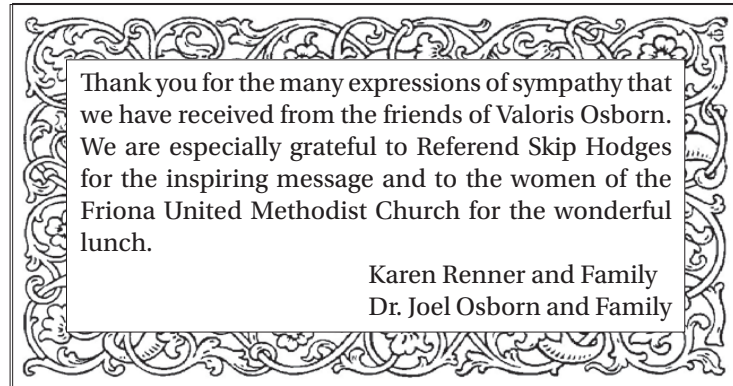
Where is the best place in the world to be? It's not the mountains, beach or resort, but smack dab in the middle of God's will. That's not to say God may not lead or allow you to go to one of these places, but if you go there

outside of the will of God, then you are walking on thin ice. In other words, it's better to be living for the Lord in Lazbuddie than living it up with the world in Las Vegas; it's better to be walking with the Father in Friona than

simmering in sin in Seattle, in fact, it is better to be about the Master's business in Bovina, than consorting with the wicked in Chicago. Do you get the point?

Psalm 84 expounds the joy, importance and blessing of worshipping God and being in His will and presence. The goal in worship is to intensely focus your mind and heart on God for who He is and what He has done through Christ for our salvation. 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5 Alternatives to Pursuing a Bachelor's Degree

I went to college after high school, and it proved to be a good investment. However, I also realize that the college path isn't necessarily the right fit for everyone, nor is it something to be embarked upon lightly and without planning. A college degree isn't a requirement for every skilled job and for some, the time and money it takes to earn a bachelor's degree could be better spent elsewhere.

Here are five alternatives to the bachelor's degree route that, if they are the right fit for you, could cost less now and set you up for a good career later.

1. Learn a trade from a career school. If you're already interested in a particular type of skilled work, you could look into programs at a trade, vocational or career school. There are many focuses within different industries to choose from, including healthcare, technology, the culinary arts, HVAC and business.

Career school training often lasts two years and could be expensive. Just like with the traditional college and university system, federal financial aid may be available to help you pay for the education. You may also be able to start working sooner than you would if you pursued a degree from a four-year bachelor's program.

Keep in mind there are also other options to consider. Career schools teach you the practical skills and knowledge you need to do a job and you'll graduate with a diploma or certificate and/or be ready to get a license. In some cases, though, you could receive similar training and credentials from a community college, which could be less expensive.

As with traditional four-year programs, not all schools are reputable. Before deciding, be sure to research schools, the training programs they offer, their record with respect to job placements for graduates and the fees they charge.

2. Apply for an apprenticeship. Rather than paying for and attending school, you could apply for an apprenticeship. As an apprentice, a company will employ and pay you while you receive on-the-job training and classroom instruction. According to the Department of Labor (DOL), the average starting wage is \$15 an hour, although it can increase as you gain experience.

Apprenticeships are currently available in a wide range of industries, including construction, energy, manufacturing, healthcare, IT, hospitality and telecommunications. The training can last one to six years depending on the occupation and program. Once you complete your apprenticeship, you will receive a nationally recognized credential that could be used to continue your career.

The average annual income for someone who completes a program is \$50,000, and those who go through an apprenticeship earn about \$300,000 more than non-apprenticeship workers overall, according to the DOL. Many apprenticeships are also available for occupations that are expected to grow as fast, or faster, than average.

Applying for an apprenticeship doesn't guarantee you a spot within the company upon completion. You may still need to pass tests and go through an interview process. Some apprenticeships require participants to have certain qualifications, such as previous work experience. If you don't currently qualify for an apprenticeship in your desired field, career schools may offer pre-apprenticeship programs in which you can enroll as a first step towards getting an apprenticeship.

3. Join the armed forces. If you are interested in serving as a member of the military, there may be several paths to consider. You could join the military

with the intent of continuing your career there or you can use the military as a starting point. The skills and experience learned as a member of the armed forces could help you get a civilian job after you finish your service.

Depending on your skills and experience, you could be eligible for a sign-on bonus when you enlist. Once you've joined, you may also receive on-base housing as part of your compensation package or could be offered a housing allowance if you'd prefer to live off-base. Additionally, you could receive financial assistance towards your education if you decide you want to go back to school after your service.

You'll need to pass the basic eligibility and physical requirements, as well as meet the age requirements, to qualify for military service. Your job can depend on the branch you join within the military, your experience, how you perform on the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery, your preferences and the current job openings.

4. Become a police officer or firefighter. If it appeals to you, look into a career of local public service by joining the police or fire department. Depending on where you live, the process can be competitive and difficult. Getting started in either profession can require rigorous physical training, written tests and in-person interviews. You'll also need to meet the minimum requirements, which could include some college experience and a clean criminal record.

Police officers and firefighters have very different jobs, and there's a lot to consider before entering either profession. You may want to reach out to local departments and set up informational interviews to get a sense of what the jobs entail before starting down either career path.

If you do pursue a career in

public service, both police officers and firefighters can make a good living - particularly in large cities. Depending on location and how many years you serve, you also may be eligible for a pension and healthcare benefits for life upon retirement.

5. Get an associate's degree. An associate's degree from a community college could be a good middle-ground option if you want to continue your education without committing to a four-year school.

Full-time students can earn an associate's degree within two years, or you could work

and study part-time and earn the degree at your own pace. You may still be eligible for federal financial aid, and community colleges are often much less expensive than other colleges or universities. The College Board found the average annual community college tuition and fees were \$3,570 for the 2017-2018 school year, about 65 percent less than what you might pay at a four-year in-state public school (\$9,970).³

An associate's degree could pay off for years to come, though. U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics data shows that for those over 24 years old, unem-

ployment rates are lower and median weekly earnings are higher for associate's degree holders than those who have only a high school diploma or some college but no degree.

Bottom Line: Pursuing a bachelor's degree isn't the right path for everyone, nor is it a requirement to have a prosperous or happy life. In the end, you may choose to pursue a bachelor's degree and then perhaps a graduate degree. However, you may first wish to consider the additional options available to you and even try out a few to discover which one suits you best.

Comptroller Raises Revenue Estimate by More than \$2.8 Billion

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today revised the Certification Revenue Estimate (CRE), announcing better than expected revenue growth in fiscal 2018 and an improved economic outlook for fiscal 2019.

In a July 11 letter to state leadership, Hegar said the state will have \$110.17 billion in General Revenue-Related (GR-R) funds available for general purpose spending for the 2018-19 biennium, resulting in a projected fiscal 2019 ending balance of \$2.67 billion, an increase from the \$94 million ending balance projected in the October 2017 CRE. The ending balance does not account for any 2018-19 supplemental appropriations the Legislature may make.

"An economic expansion exceeding our expectations from last year has resulted in revenue collections this fiscal year outpacing CRE projections," Hegar said. "Texas in particular benefited from rising oil prices and production and the consequent increase in economic activity. The best ongoing indicator of the robust Texas economy is the state's rate of job growth. Texas added more than 350,000 new jobs in the 12 months ending in May 2018, and the state's unemployment rate has been at or near historic lows in recent months."

Through June of fiscal 2018, sales and use tax collections, Texas' largest source of state tax revenue, are up 10 percent from June of fiscal 2017. The Comptroller increased the sales tax revenue projection for fiscal 2018 by more than \$1.2 billion.

Total tax collections through June, buoyed in part by oil and natural gas production tax collec-

tions exceeding last year's totals by more than 50 percent, are up 11.8 percent compared to a year ago. Total GR-R collections are up 9.8 percent compared to last year.

Proposition 7, an amendment to the Texas Constitution approved by Texas voters in 2015, provides that the first \$2.5 billion in sales tax collections exceeding \$28 billion in any fiscal year be deposited to the State Highway Fund (SHF). Sales tax collections in fiscal 2018 are likely to exceed \$30.5 billion, meaning that Hegar will allocate the full \$2.5 billion to the SHF from fiscal 2018 collections.

The Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF; the state's "Rainy Day Fund") and the SHF both receive funding from oil and natural gas severance taxes. In November 2017, Hegar deposited \$734 million in each of those funds. Hegar estimates a deposit of \$1.37 billion in each fund in November 2018, up from the October CRE estimate of \$777 million. The ESF will have a balance of \$11.85 billion at the end of fiscal 2019, the largest ending balance in the fund's history.

"Though nearly all current economic indicators remain positive and revenue collections have exceeded our previous expectations, there are significant risks to the forecast," Hegar said. "A trade war, a withdrawal from the North American Free Trade Agreement or a significant downturn in the price of oil would reduce our potential economic growth. The current outlook, however, is for continued growth through fiscal 2019 for both the economy and state revenue."

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DPS Warns Texans of Safety Concerns in Summer Heat Tips to help residents stay safe as extreme heat continues

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans to take extra safety precautions as temperatures and heat indices continue to reach 100 degrees and above in many parts of the state.

"We have already experienced extreme heat in most parts of the state this summer, and DPS wants to remind all Texans that the dangers from sustained high temperatures should not be taken lightly," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Heat-related injuries and deaths are often preventable if we take the necessary steps to protect ourselves and others."

Extreme temperatures place children at greater risk of injury or death if left unattended in a vehicle. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, temperatures inside a car can rise more than 20 degrees in only 10 minutes. Even with an outside temperature of 60 degrees, the temperature inside a car can reach 110 degrees.

Heatstroke is one of the leading causes of non-crash-related fatalities among children, and every year, children die from heat-related injuries after being left in a vehicle or by entering a vehicle unnoticed. Leaving windows partially rolled down does not help. A child should never be left unattended in a vehicle.

Additionally, extreme heat events or heat waves are one of the leading causes of weather-related deaths in the United States, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Periods of severe heat and high humidity tax the body's ability to cool itself and can lead to heat exhaustion and heat stroke, which can be fatal.

DPS offers the following tips for staying safe and managing the heat:

- Drink plenty of water throughout the day even if you do not feel thirsty; you may not

realize you're dehydrated until it's too late. Also avoid alcohol and beverages high in caffeine or sugar during periods of prolonged outdoor exposure.

- Pay attention to your body. Heat-related illnesses such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke can develop quickly. Know the warning signs and seek medical attention if necessary.

- Check on others, especially the elderly, sick, very young and those without air conditioning.

- Don't forget pet safety. Animals are also susceptible to heat-related injury or death – don't put your pets in these dangerous conditions.

- Monitor local weather updates and stay aware of any upcoming changes in weather.

- Limit exposure to the sun and stay indoors as much as possible. If possible, avoid strenuous outdoor activity during the hottest part of the day.

- Light-colored, loose-fitting clothing and a hat are recommended while spending time outdoors.

- Wear sunscreen. Sunburns can affect your body's ability to cool down. Protect yourself during periods of sun exposure by putting on sunscreen SPF 15 or higher 30 minutes prior to going outside.

- Be extra careful when cooking outdoors, building campfires or driving off-road to avoid igniting dry vegetation. Also, stay aware of burn bans in your area and always abide by restrictions on outside burning.

What is Texas Boys State?

American Legion Boys State is among the most respected and selective educational programs of government instruction for high school students. It is a participatory program where each student becomes a part of the operation of his local, county, and state government.

Boys State has been a program of The American Legion since 1935, when it organized to counter the fascist-inspired Young Pioneer Camps. The program was the idea of two Illinois Legionnaires, Hayes Kennedy and Harold Card, who organized the first Boys State at the Illinois State Fairgrounds in Springfield.

The American Legion Auxiliary sponsors a similar program for young women called Girls State.

At American Legion Boys State, participants are exposed to the rights and privileges, the duties and the responsibilities, of a franchised citizen. The training is objective and practical, with city, county, and state governments operated by the students elected to the various offices.

What is Texas Girls State?

The American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary began an effort over five decades ago to devise a means to:

educate our youth in the duties, privileges and responsibilities of American citizenship

give future citizens, in a realistic manner, an opportunity to learn the problems of government by performing the same duties as real office holders in the everyday world

inform them of the rights and privileges of American citizenship instill a deep sense of the personal responsibilities and obligations which this citizenship entails.

The Girls State program in Texas has been one of constant improvement and growth. The number of participants has grown from 94 to over 500. The progress of Girls State in Texas could not have been accomplished if it had not been for the pioneers of Bluebonnet Girls State; the full cooperation and encouragement of the Department Presidents of the American Legion Auxiliary; former directors, members and chairmen of the Girls State Committee; the press, radio and television; school and state officials; interested individuals; most of all the local units who sponsor girls; and last but not least, the citizens.

One of Girls State's most influential pioneers was Frances Goff who began working with Girls State in 1947. She used her considerable experience in state government to shape the program as Director from 1952 until 1994.

During past sessions of Girls State, citizens have been privileged to hear many outstanding speakers including: then Governor George W. Bush, former Presidents George Bush and Lyndon Baines Johnson, First Lady Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson and Miss Barbara Jordan. Former Girls State citizens Gov. Ann W. Richards, Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, Judge Bea Ann Smith and others have also returned to the program as guest speakers.

The Girls State Committee is the policy-making body of Girls State. The four members are appointed by the President of the American Legion Auxiliary from its membership. The Department President and the committee select the Director who is responsible for the administration of the policies set forth by the committee. Girls State requires an operating budget of approximately \$200,000. Counselors and staff members are unpaid volunteers.
