Temperatures were near-normal with a few days above normal near the end of the reporting period. Soil moisture was mostly adequate. Rains delayed cotton harvest for most producers. Wheat fields were booming. Cattle producers were beginning to prepare to turn out yearlings on wheat pasture. Deaf Smith County producers were trying to get into fields following heavy rains the previous reporting period. Silage chopping began in limited areas. Cotton bolls were opening, and producers were waiting for drier conditions to harvest. In Hall County, a few warm, dry days allowed producers to harvest cotton and peanuts in a few fields. 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

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

From the Friona Star Archives

October 31, 2013

The Healthy Baby Coalition of Parmer County, Parmer Medical Center and Texas Department of Health and Human Services teamed together on October 22nd to make Parmer County a safer place for children. A free car seat inspection was offered in the hospitals employee parking lot. Certified technicians worked with each family to instruct them on how to assure their child was fitted properly in their car seat and that the car seat was installed properly in the vehicle. Each family received 20-30 minutes on one-on-one instructions from the technicians who answered questions and assured that each child was safe in their family vehicle. In addition, DSHS provided 20 car seats that were distributed free to parents who did not have a seat for their child or whose current car seat was considered unsafe or not appropriate for the age of their child. Overall, 29 children were assisted.

October 30, 2003

At the Tri- State Fair Lamb Show in Amarillo, Kelby Monroe of Friona FFA won the Reserve Grand Champion honors. He is the son of Alan and Leigh Monroe. The youngster also showed the Reserve Breed Champion in Medium Wool Class. Other local youth winners were Zack Fair, fine Wool Class 1, 2nd place; Caleb Monroe, Fine Wool Class 2, 2nd place. Kelby Monroe also placed 4th in Fine Wool Cross, Class 3 competition; Jordan Monroe was 2nd in Class 1, Southdown and 1st in class 3 Medium Wool; Luke London placed 6th in Class 3 Medium Wool. In Class 4 Medium Wool, Rowdee Rhodes was 5th; Keith Hunt was 7th, and Caleb Monroe 8th. Kelby Monroe placed 2nd in Class 5th Medium Wool and Ty Williams was 11th. In Class 6, Steven Hunt placed 9th. Jordan Monroe was 4th in Class 7 and Kirby Frye was 7th. In Class 8, Kelby Monroe won 1st place.

October 30, 1993

The Cargill foundation will sponsor \$1,000 scholarships for 2,050 high school seniors from U.S.farm families for the ninth year this spring. The Cargill Scholarship Program for Rural America is open to all high school seniors who will graduate in the spring. The seniors must come from families that derive at least half of their income from farming. Scholarship candidates must enroll full-time next fall at an accredited two- or four- year college, university or vocational- technical school. "The program has helped to honor academic achievement among rural students," said Bill Pearce, president of the Cargill Foundation. "It's an endeavor that has received an enthusiastic reception in rural communities. We are committed to this scholarship program." The Cargill Foundation established the program in 1986 to recognize and encourage academic achievement, accomplishment, and talent among rural youth. Thus far, the Cargill Foundation has presented 1,503 awards for a total of \$1.75 million.

October 30, 1983

Miniature monsters will soon invade the neighborhoods and the cry, "Trick or Treat," will be heard through out the land. Major V.J. Cawthon, regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Motorists and parents need to take precautions to protect children and prevent disasters this Halloween". "I would suggest house or block parties for the kids. Children will invade many neighborhoods in spite of past unfavorable incidents, and he offered the following safety rules to help protect the kids." Cawthon said, "Small Children should be accompanied by older children or adults and trick or treating be confined to their own neighborhood. Costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping and non-flammable. Facial make-up should be used instead of masks or hoods that restrict vision." Trick or Treaters should not eat unwrapped candy until the parents inspect it and fruit should be washed and cut into small pieces to be sure nothing has been placed inside. Children should be told to look in all directions before crossing the streets and to walk, never run. A flashlight carried by a child can serve as a warning to motorists and children should be instructed to use sidewalks when possible.

November 4. 1973 Friona Jaycees passed a resolution this week in support of proposed amendment one on the Constitutional Election to be held next Tuesday. The first amendment provides a raise in annual salaries for Texas legislators from \$4800.00 to \$15,000.00 and calls for annual sessions of the legislature. "The Jaycees, like many other organizations across the state, feel that Texas can attract a better quality legislator by providing a salary in keeping with the times," stated Don Gatlin, president of the local chapter. The JCs feel that under the present set-up, only wealthy persons can serve in the legislature or else representatives must have additional source of income. "We feel that being a state representative is a position worthy of adequate pay," Gatlin said. He urged that all qualified voters in the Friona area exercise their voting right regardless of how they might care to vote.

*** October 31,1963

Friona's Kendrick Oil company team won first place at the Western Open Bowling Tournament, which concluded the past weekend in Amarillo. The local team won in a field of 100 teams representing five states. The winning team was presented \$300 in cash, plus a handsome team trophy as well as individual trophies. The Friona team won by 39 pins over its closest competitor, an Albuquerque team which rolled a 2873 series. They missed out on two other first- place trophies by the narrow margin of one pin in class C doubles. They plan to enter the state tournament in Midland and the national tourney in Minneapolis, Minn., early next year.

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
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Psalm 102—Truth on Trial

Truth has often been placed on trial in the college classroom, various movies and books, but every time you face a crisis in your life truth goes on trial. The question becomes whether you will walk in faith or fear, truth or terror, trust or doubt in Jesus Christ. Psalm 102 is a prayer for God's help in the midst of crisis. As the psalmist prays to the Lord, we see how truth is on trial, and that the truth of who God is, wins.

The first eleven verses are downright dark and miserable, because the psalmist is bold enough to be honest with God about the devastation, despair and misery that he is going through. He doesn't reveal whether he is being attacked by enemies, persecuted for the faith, suffering consequences of sinful decisions or simply going through a general trial in life, but what is revealed is that things were tough. When crisis hits, be honest with God about your situation, feelings and frustrations. He knows them already, and when you confess your heart to Him it opens you up to walk with Him through the difficulty at hand.

From a realistic assessment of the crisis at hand, the Psalm shifts to focus on the Lord 's power, might, eternality and sovereignty. The trials in our lives must be processed as you focus on the Lord's character, and sovereignty, not the difficulty of the trial. Remember, Jesus can calm the seas, walk on the water or even lead you across on dry land, but the aim is for you to cling to Him each step of the way. Psalm 102 does that, so much so that the Psalmists trust in God is strengthened, hope is renewed and faith increased because he was willing to get honest about his misery, and look up unto the Master.

Other excursions brought the Evans group to



Don't delay anymore - get that flu shot today

It's not too late to get a flu shot.

Even though the flu season usually begins about now, the vaccine will protect you within about two weeks. The season typically peaks in January or February and runs through May.

The flu hospitalized and killed more Americans last winter than any seasonal influenza in decades. More than 900,000 people landed in the hospital, double the number of many seasons. More than 80,000 people died, far exceeding the previous high of 56,000 for a flu season over the past 30 years.

The hospitalizations and deaths were mainly among people 65 and older. As people age, their immune system typically weakens and their ability to ward off diseases declines. Moreover, the flu virus can cause complications for those already struggling with chronic health prob-

Last year's heavy toll underscores the importance of getting a flu vaccine as soon as possible. The shot can prevent infections and reduce the severity of complications from the disease.

If you're enrolled in Medicare Part B, your flu shot won't cost you anything, as long as your doctor, health clinic or pharmacy agrees not to charge you more than Medicare pays. There's no deductible or co-payment.

If you were vaccinated last year, you'll still need another shot this year, since your immunity to flu viruses wanes after a year. Also, the types of viruses usually change from season to season, so new vaccines are made each year to fight what scientists believe will be the season's most common strains.

You have many flu shot options. Besides the traditional flu vaccines that help protect giving it to family and friends.

against three strains of the virus, there are now "quadrivalent" vaccines that help protect against four strains. There's also a high-dose vaccine approved for people 65 and older.

If you have any questions about which is best for you, talk to your doctor or other health care professional.

Despite the risk that flu and its complications pose, the vaccination rate remains much lower than it should be. Even during last year's horrible season, less than half of the U.S. population was vaccinated.

Why? Some people don't understand that the flu can be serious and life-threatening, so they don't think a flu shot is worth their time and effort. Others resist annual vaccination because they believe it's risky, even though decades of experience have shown flu shots to be

If you're concerned about a serious allergic reaction or some other medical condition that may make the flu vaccine unsafe for you, you should consult your doctor before a vaccination. Otherwise, it's important to remember that you can't get the flu from the flu shot.

Side effects are rare. Most people notice nothing after their vaccination. A few may have a slight fever or some soreness where the shot was given. But those side effects usually last just a day or two.

As flu season begins, you'll want to wash your hands and stay away from sick people to reduce the spread of germs. But as useful as those steps are, an annual vaccination remains the best way to protect yourself and those around you. By avoiding the flu, you'll avoid



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Being that November is BLAZE COFFEE ACCIDENT AWARENESS Month, we would like to share our story...

In August 2009, our son, Blaze Coffee, was in an accident while working with heavy equipment. He was rushed to the hospital where a surgeon was awaiting his arrival. Blaze was taken to surgery immediately. After what seemed like an eternity, the doctor came to talk to us. The doctor informed us that Blaze had sustained a terrible trauma and that his injuries were life-threatening.

When they let our family see Blaze for the first time after the surgery,

it was then we noted the large number of blood components that were being used. This day was the start of our twenty-eight day stay in the hospital. Each day, Blaze would overcome one crisis and then another would arise. He required blood products daily - platelets, plasma and red blood cells. We quit counting how many he was given at about 68 yet the transfusions continued. Through all of this, Blaze demonstrated a remarkable will to live and a fighting spirit that astounded those around him. Thanks to donors that responded, we never

worried that blood would be available...and we never lost hope!

On September 8, our hometown of Panhandle pulled together for one of the biggest single blood drives for an individual. The communities of Booker and Darrouzett held drives in Blaze's honor as well. The drives brought in about 140 units of blood thanks to the community of Panhandle, to our friends and neighbors and to the other communities who showed their support.

Our story is a little different from those usually shared with Coffee Memorial. Blaze did not receive an earthly healing, he passed away on the very day the blood drives were held in his honor - September 8, 2009. He was 20 years old. We wanted to share our story because the blood products Blaze received gave us 28 extra days with our son to say the things we needed to say. That is why we contacted Coffee Memorial (name is just a coincidence) to ask if we could obtain sponsors and host blood drives in our son's honor. With generous support from our friends, family and area businesses, the Blaze Coffee Memorial Drives have grown so much that we are now able to sponsor t-shirts for the entire month of November in Blaze's memory.

Blaze truly lit up his little corner of the world during his 20 years. We may no longer be blessed with his physical presence, but his flame still burns brightly through all of those who have already donated blood in his memory, and those who will do so in the future. Because of the gracious donations from strangers every day, families in crisis do not have to worry about blood being there for their loved ones.




The Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000, as amended, requires that local governments, develop, adopt, and update natural hazard mitigation plans in order to receive certain federal assistance. A Mitigation Action Team ("MAT") comprised of representatives from Parmer County, the City of Bovina, City of Farwell, City of Friona, Bovina ISD, Farwell ISD, Friona ISD and Lazbuddie ISD, was convened to assess the risks from and vulnerabilities to natural hazards that are endemic to the Parmer County area, and to make recommendations on mitigating the effects of such hazards. The original Hazard Mitigation plan was adopted in 2006 and in order to maintain its approved status by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), it has to be updated every five (5) years.



Kiki and the History of Red Ribbon Week

Enrique (Kiki) S. Camarena was born on July 26, 1947, in Mexicali, Mexico. He graduated from Calexico High School in Calexico, California in 1966, and in 1968 he joined the U.S. Marine Corps. After serving in the Marine Corps for two years, Kiki was a Calexico fireman, Calexico police officer, and an Imperial County Deputy Sheriff. Kiki joined the Drug Enforcement Administration in June of 1974. His first assignment as a Special Agent with DEA was in a familiar place - Calexico, California.

In 1977, after three years in Calexico, he was reassigned to the Fresno District Office in Northern California. Four years later, Kiki received transfer orders to Mexico, where he would work out of the Guadalajara Resident Office. For more than four years in Mexico, Kiki remained on the trail of the country's biggest marijuana and cocaine traffickers. In early 1985, he was extremely close to unlocking a multi-billion dollar drug pipeline. However, before he was able to expose the drug trafficking operations to the public, he was kidnapped on February 7, 1985. On that fateful day, while headed to a luncheon with his wife, Mika, Kiki was surrounded by five armed men who threw him into a car and sped away. That was the last time anyone but his kidnappers would see him alive.



It is believed that Special Agent Camarena's death actually occurred two days later, but his body was not discovered until March 5, 1985. He was 37 years old and was survived by his wife Mika and their three children—Enrique, Dan-


iel, and Erik. During his 11 years with DEA, Kiki received two Sustained Superior Performance Awards, a Special Achievement Award and, posthumously, the Administrator's Award of Honor, the highest award granted by DEA.

Shortly after Kiki's death, Congressman Duncan Hunter and high school friend Henry Lozano launched Camarena Clubs in Kiki's hometown of Calexico, California. Hundreds of club members including Calexico High School teacher David Dhillon wore red ribbons and pledged to lead drug-free lives to honor the sacrifices made by Kiki Camarena and others on behalf of all Americans.


Red Ribbon Week eventually gained momentum throughout California and later across the United States. In 1985, club members presented the "Camarena Club Proclamation" to then First Lady Nancy Reagan, bringing it national attention. Later that summer, parent groups in California, Illinois, and Virginia began promoting the wearing of red ribbons nationwide during late October. The campaign was then formalized in 1988 by the National Family Partnership, with President and Mrs. Reagan serving as honorary chairpersons. Today, the eight-day celebration is an annual catalyst to show intolerance for drugs in our schools, workplaces, and communities. Each year, on October 23-3, more than 80 million young people and adults show their commitment to a healthy, drug-free lifestyle by wearing or displaying the red rib-
