# CRP changes still uncertain

WASHINGTON — Most agriculture producers have adopted a wait-and-see approached toward the release Wednesday of a retooled Conservation Reserve Program.

The federal program has pumped more than \$1.8 billion into the state's rural economy over the last decade by paying farmers and ranchers to keep highly erodible land out of production.

The final regulations will stress the environmental benefits of idling acreage and not focus solely on soil erosion factors, according to Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman.

But Glickman said he did not expect the new rules to cause huge geograpic shifts in the land idled under the program like some critics have predicted.

"The CRP is no longer just a soil protection program but a true conservation program," Glickman said. "Under the new CRP, we will enroll only the most environmentally sensitive lad.'

Under the new rules, equal weight will be given by the Department of Agriculture to erosion, water and air quality, and wildlife habitat in determining which of the estimated 240 million eligible acres na-

tionally will be accept into

Wind erosion was a recently added evaluation factor.

USDA will accept CRP bids from landowners from March 3 through March 28. USDA has previously indicated that CRP land will be selected in late May.

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest will chair a House Agriculture subcommittee hearing Feb. 26 to examine the new rules.

"It is critical that the USDA's new rules meet the need for keeping fragile soils protected," Combest said. "I will hold a careful but timely examination into the effect of USDA's regulations on landowners with acres currently in


"This information is long overdue from the USDA, with landowners now faced with uncertainty about re-bidding land or plowing under acreage for planting."

There are some 4 million plus CRP acres in Texas, which more than three-quarters of it in the South Plains and Pan-

#### Playoff win earns Longhorns No. 2 seed

Chris Smith struggled to pull the tape from

His strength sapped by 32 minutes of a pressure-packed playoff game, the junior guard from Lazbuddie High School barely managed a smile as he sat on the lockerroom bench.

"Yeah, I'm pretty tired," said Smith, who scored all 15 of his points in the second half as Lazbuddie held off hard-charging Farwell 64-55 Thursday before a packed house at WJHS gym. The win earned the Longhorns the No. 2 seed in District 3-1A.

"They're so quick and play with so much intensity," said Smith, who was dogged by fullcourt pressure most of the game. "They play with so much heart, that's what makes them so tough."

By winning the rubber match between the Parmer County rivals, Lazbuddie 20-7) advances to the state bi-district playoffs where they play District 4-1A champion Texline (14-9) at 7 p.m. Friday at Amarillo High School.

Lazbuddie and Farwell (20-7) split their regular-season series, forcing a one-game playoff. Top-ranked Nazareth won the district.

Fueled by scrambling full-court pressure and relentless offensive rebounding, Farwell shaved Lazbuddie's 15-point third-quarter lead to 58-55 with 42 seconds remaining.

But Smith hit a pair of free throws with 33 seconds to push the lead back to five and Lazbuddie held on for the win.

"I was scared to death," admitted Lazbuddie coach Gary Grahn, who witnessed a similar comeback during a 75-74 loss to the Steers in January. "I was trying to take timeouts to help us

### Legislative battle brewing over TAAS testing

Two bills have been introduced to the state legislature, each calling for changes in which school students must take state standardized tests.

House Bill 481, introduced by Rep. Gary Walker (R-Plains), would reduce the number of students who take the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test.

Walker proposes testing students grades 3,5,7, and 10. Currently, students in grades 3 through 8 plus students in 10th grade take the test.

Muleshoe Independent School District Superintendent Bill Moore believes his district has nothing to lose, and maybe some to gain, if the bill is passed. Students would be tested every other year, which Moore believes is often enough to keep track of their learning progress.

MISD could also benefit financially from a reduc-

tion in the number of students tested, saving \$2,200 if the tests are eliminated.

"It would cut in half the number of kids we test every year," Moore said. "It would be a significant savings."

According to Moore, the state pays the cost of administering the TAAS, but the money comes from funds that would otherwise go directly to school districts.

"The bottom line is more money for other reasons," Moore said.

MISD currently tests approximately 800 students per year, at a cost of approximately \$7.50 per student. Under the proposed bill, the district would test around 300 fewer students per year.

On the other end of the spectrum, Rep. Maxie Walker (D-Austin) has introduced House Bill 582, a bill that would increase the number of students the state tests every year.

Walker's bill, if passed, would implement TAAS tests to assess the reading skills of students in grades 1 and 2, in addition to students the state currently tests. It would also begin a pre-reading test for students in kindergarten.

Moore does not support the testing of students at such a young age.

"It would be a mistake to test little kids," Moore said. "Kids that young aren't ready for standardized test and that kind of pressure."

House Bill 582, similar to the Governors Reading Initiative, would help to identify reading problems

among students while they are still at an early age. Moore said that the district already assessed the

reading skills of young students on a regular basis. He also said that additional TAAS testing would further reduce funds the district would receive from the state.

#### City holding public hearing Thursday to discuss grants

The City of Muleshoe will hold a series of public hearings Thursday at Muleshoe City Hall to discuss community development grants.

One hearing, which starts at 5:15 p.m., will be held to gather public input on existing housand community development needs within the city.

According to Muleshoe City Manager James Fisher, the city applies for block grants from the Texas Community Development Program each year. Before they send an application for such grants, they will use citizen input to formulate a plan that will address the needs of local residents.

TCDP grants can be used for projects such as improving streets, as well as water and sewage systems.

The City will also hold a closure meeting for their 1996 TCDP grant at 5 p.m.

Council will receive comments on the \$250,000 paving project completed last year in the Morrison addition.

The TCDP funds were used to pave several roads in north-

ern Muleshoe.

#### Farm credit meeting in Lubbock

The hearing will examine the factors which affect the availability of credit to agricultural producers.

USDA officials, commercial bankers, Farm Credit System representatives and Small Business Administration officials will testify.

The public may submit written comments and testimony at the hearing or by mail to the U.S. House Committee on Agriculture, Room 1300 Longworth, Washington, D.C. 20515.

#### Maple gets 4 inches of snow

After a few days of sun, area residents received a visit from Jack Frost.

Muleshoe residents received an inch of snow Thursday, most of which melted away by the next day.

Four inches of snow fell at Maple Co-Op gin, according to manager Marvin McCaul.

"It's gonna help the dry land," McCaul said. "It's about half an inch of moisture."

McCaul said that farmers in the Maple area could benefit more from a substantial rain, but the snow shouldn't throw farmers off schedule as they prepare their fields for the upcoming growing season.

"Things are pretty slow around here, but farmers will start to apply their herbicides within the next two or three weeks," McCaul said.

The extended forecast from the National Weather Service in Lubbock calls for mostly sunny skies early in the week, with lows in the 20's and highs in the 50's. Highs should reach the 60's by Tuesday, with fair skies and minimal chances of precipitation.



as much as 37 percent of the currently enrolled acreage in Texas, or 1.5 million acres, could be eliminated.

According to a rough USDA estimate, the new rules could mean a shift of 2 million CRP acres to the Northeast and a reduction of 1 million acres in the mountain states. Slight decreases are predicted in the southern Plains and the South-

CRP contracts covering about 22 million acres nationally expire Sept. 30.

About 32.9 million acres are now in the program.

Although about two-thirds gible for CRP, Glickman said only about 15 percent of that will actually be enrolled in the

In 1998, USDA expects the new criteria to reduce about 2 million acres of CRP acreage. But it is expected to eventually reach the 36.4 million acres allowed by Congress in the new farm bill.

Tuesday, Muleshoe won its 20th game of the season — with one game to spare — beating rival Friona 74-67 in a District 1-3A game at WJHS.

Dustin Cleavinger led a balanced Muleshoe attack with 19 points and 13 rebounds.

Quint Ellis had 20 points for Friona, including four of the Chieftains' eight 3-point-


"I'm an optimistic person," Mason said, "but I think we're about a year ahead of where I thought we'd be."

Putting pressure on the guards, that's how you keep the ball out of the big guys' hands," Grahn said.





#### 'Productivity appraisal' may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value," of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber — not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

#### When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1997 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

#### Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

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




