



77,400 samples, compared with 47,900 at this date last year. Grades on North Texas cotton classed during the week were 52 per cent White and 44 per cent Light Spotted. Predominant grades were 41 with 39 per cent

and 42 with 26 per cent. Staples were predominantly 31 through 33, with staple 32 accounting for 57 per cent of the total. Micronaire readings were in the 3.5 to 4.9 range on 89 per cent of the samples. Four per cent was low mike and seven per

cent high mike. Pressley readings showed fiber strength mostly in the range 70,000 to 89,000 pounds per square inch. Thirty-four per cent fell within the 75 to 79 thousand pound range, with the average being 78 thousand pounds.

Courtney Candidate for Rep.

L. Max Courtney this week authorized the News to announce that he is a candidate for State Representative, 101st District. Mr. Courtney made the following announcement:

Max Courtney, candidate for the Democratic nomination for State Representative, District 101 thinks Texas needs a new constitution. Our present constitution is a hundred years old and has been amended some 212 times. The document the Constitutional Convention is now working with is much shorter and written where the average citizen can read and understand it. However, there are two sections in this proposed constitution that would not be in the best interest of this district that I would prefer rewritten. One is a requirement that county judges be lawyers. Some of our counties do not have a lawyer living in them and several of our present, very fine county judges are not attorneys. The other section would endanger our small rural schools. Those schools should be allowed to operate as long as those people want to maintain them and pay for them. My opponent says he doesn't think

WATERING HOUSE PLANTS Improper watering probably causes the highest per cent of home plant failures, says a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Plants use little water and fertilizer during the winter months since they grow slowly due to low light intensities. If the soil in which plants are growing is kept saturated with water, little or no oxygen can reach the roots, so they may often die. Plants in a cold room need less water than those in a warm, dry atmosphere.





Texans figuring their income taxes will be able to call toll free to Dallas or Austin regional Internal Revenue Service offices to get tax assistance this

The IRS says that only residents of Texas cities where field offices are located were able in the past to talk by telephone to their local IRS employes about taxes. Meanwhile, taxpayers who did not live in a field office city had to telephone at their expense or make a trip to get direct assistance in figuring their taxes.

This year, taxpayers in both categories will call either Austin or Dallas, headquarters of the two IRS districts in the state. Field office personnel will no longer be able to talk to citizens on the telephone about taxes, but field office doors "are always open" for persons wanting help face to face, said an IRS spokesman in Dallas.

The main reason for the new system is to give uniform advice from specially trained as-

'We have 17 different field offices in the Dallas district." said the spokesman, "and when changes occur as quickly as they often do, it is hard to communicate directly and accurately throughout the area.'



COMMON INCOME TAX ERRORS

Common errors are costly to farmers and ranchers at income

tax time, says an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Poor planning and record keeping are major mistakes along with failure to claim investment credit, failure to watch tax changes, failure to use capital gains fully, failure to deduct expenses for land clearing and soil and water conservation work, and failure to deduct expenses for business trips. Another major mistake is letting the tax accountant do all the work in preparing your income tax return.

MORE HOME GARDENING Home gardening is booming all over the country, says a

horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The latest Gallup Poll shows that three million more Americans took up gardening last year compared to 1972 figures. Four out of every ten families-about 27 million families-have a home vegetable garden. Most families are taking up gardening for economic reasons. They should be able to save \$200 to \$300 a year on their grocery bill. Home grown vegetables also tend to have superior flavor and freshness. And gardening offers wholesome, outdoor recreation and exercise.
