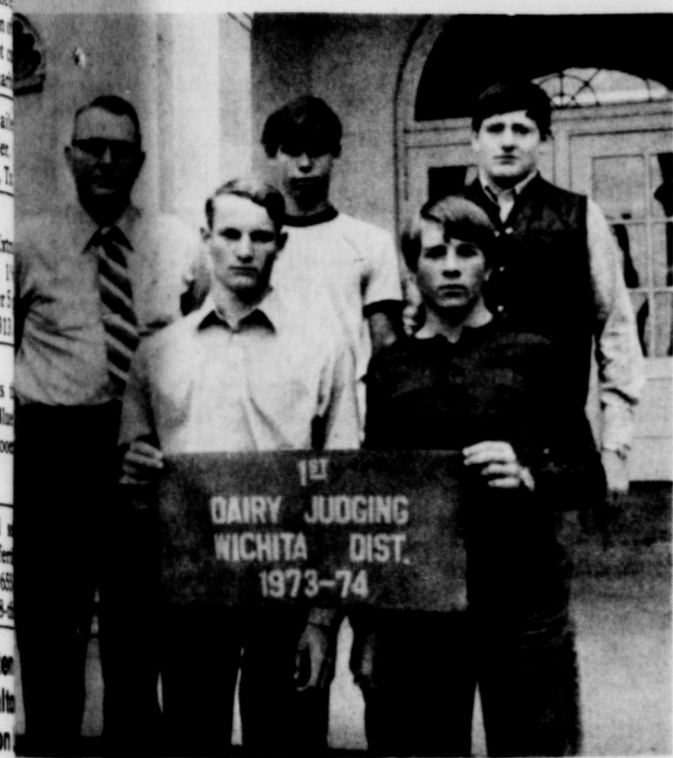

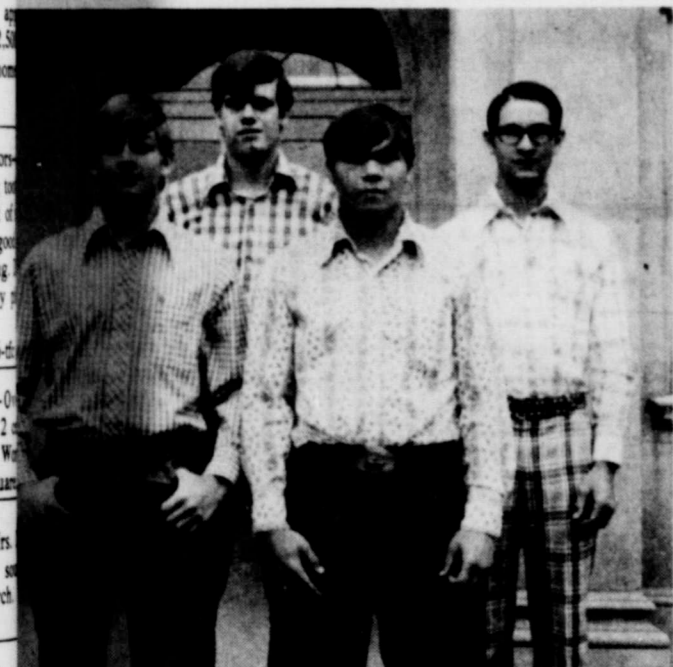

## Weather Changes Rapidly

Temperature Goes from Low to High; But it Stays Dry

Crowell will be the site of two elections on Saturday, April 6. One will be held at the City Hall at which time two incumbents, Guy Todd Sr. and J. H. Gillespie, are unopposed candidates for re-election as aldermen. Mrs. L. A. Andrews is election judge. The other election will be held in the court house and involves the election of three trustees for the Crowell school and three members of the county school board. Jeff Bell and Duane Johnson are unopposed as they seek re-election and the third candidate is Joe Coufal. On the county board, Walter Ramsey is unopposed as he seeks re-election from precinct 1. L. A. Andrews is a candidate for re-election from precinct 2 and Allison Denton is running unopposed from precinct 3. L. A. Andrews is also election judge for the school election. Voting hours are from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

Foard County weather has done considerable changing, temperature-wise, during the past week, but moisture-wise, it remains dry, dry, dry. Sunday of last week, a News photographer took a picture of a large hunk of ice formed when the local water tower overflowed. One week later, last Sunday, the mercury rose to about 100 degrees and was accompanied by one of the worst dust storms of recent years. Moisture-wise, the official measurement in Crowell has been .5 inch all this year and a total of .6 inch during the past four months. The county received one of the worst dust storms of recent years Tuesday, as skies darkened in the afternoon and a light sprinkle gave everything a thin coating of mud.

Hough of Crowell; five daughters, Mrs. Oma Crane of Rossville, Ga., Mrs. Belle Vest of Meadow, Mrs. Ava Cogdell of Louann, Ark., Mrs. Virginia Eubank of Paducah and Mrs. Mary Lynn Carpenter of Houston; one sister, Mrs. Era Patterson of Houston. Also surviving are 16 grandchildren and 30 great grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by one son, Billy Hough, who was killed in action in the Korean war. Assisting Coach Hobson during the season was Melvin Westover.

An opportunity for every resident of this section to see the complete steps in the manufacture of caps will be afforded Saturday, April 6. That is the day the Crowell Cap Company, Inc., has set as open house at its facility in Crowell.

The plant manufactures several basic designs of caps, which are sold all over the nation.

Joe Ray Settiff, plant manager, says the open house will be from 1 p. m. until 4:30 p. m. Visitors will see the cap manufacturing process from the time the material is cut from the bolt until the finished cap is blocked and ready for shipping.

The plant has been in operation for a relatively short time by its new owners—six Crowell men.

Mr. Settiff emphasized that everyone is urged to visit the factory during open house. He added that visitors at any other time are disruptive to production; consequently, this will be the only time that visitors will be permitted to watch the manufacture.

"If you are interested in seeing how the caps are manufactured, this will be your only opportunity," he concluded.

## 1973 REAP Funds Now Available

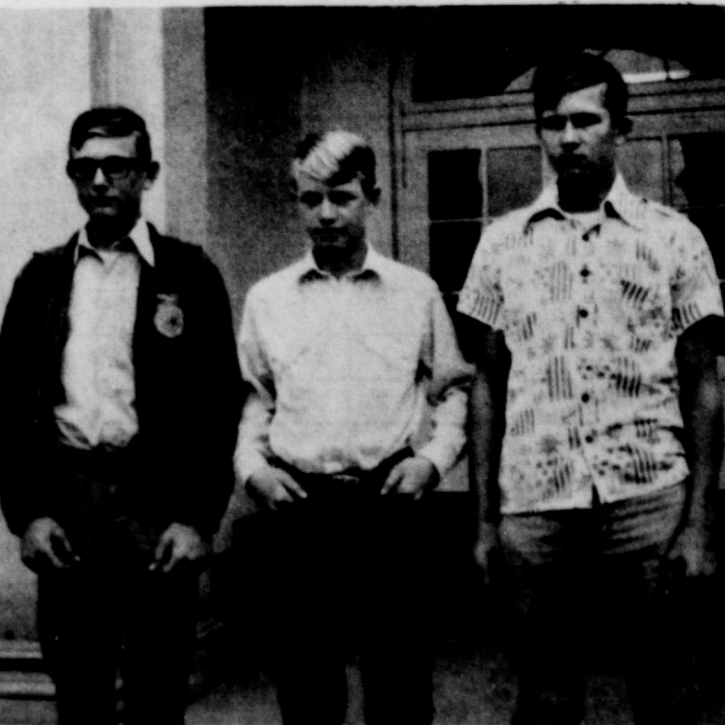

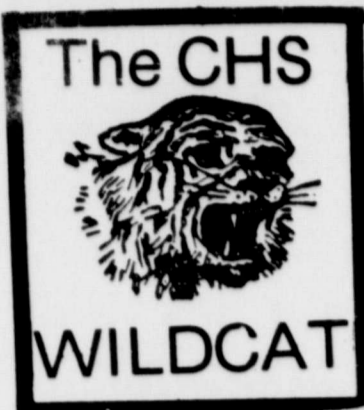

The Crowell Wildcats ran their best times of the track season at the Childress Relays Saturday. Crowell placed sixth in a field of eight teams.

Results of the varsity meet were:  
Crowell's team composed of Keith McDaniel, Chavelo Ranjel, Louis Cerda and David Bell won fifth in the 440 relay with a time of 47.2. Ranjel took fourth in the 880 dash with a time of 2:11. David Bell placed sixth in the 120 high hurdles with a 10.2. Jackie Eavenson, with a 23.8, took first in the 220 yard dash and Eavenson won second in the 440 with a time of 51.4. In the mile run, Randy Prince won

third with a 4:54. The mile relay, composed of Bell, Ranjel, Cerda and Eavenson, won fifth with a 3:40.5. Eavenson took third in the broad jump with 19'4 1/2" while Bell with a throw of 118' 10" won sixth in the discus throw.

The Crowell junior varsity boys placed fifth in the Childress Relays. Placing for the Cats were:

440 relay, sixth: Delbert Glover, Myron Halencak, Allen Tapp and Ricky Hammonds. 880 yard dash, first, Dee Finley, 2:13; 120 h.h., second, Melvin Westover, 16.9; mile relay, fifth, Halencak, Finley, Westover and Rocky Marlow; shot first, Westover, 41'8"; discus, second, Westover, 110'5". Other boys running on the JV team were Billy Halencak, Norman Hopper, William Bachman and Jimmy Daniel.

The local junior high teams posted the following results at the Childress junior high meet:  
Seventh grade: Steve Rodriguez scored a third in the 660 yard run and a fifth in the 100 yard low hurdles.

Ninth grade: high jump, second, Louis Cerda; 440 dash, sixth, Ronny Swan; discus, third, Audie Dunham; shot, sixth, Bachman; 100 low hurdles, third, Cerda; mile relay, sixth, Bachman, Marlow, Swan and Cerda.

All these track teams are coached by Jerry Don Anderson.

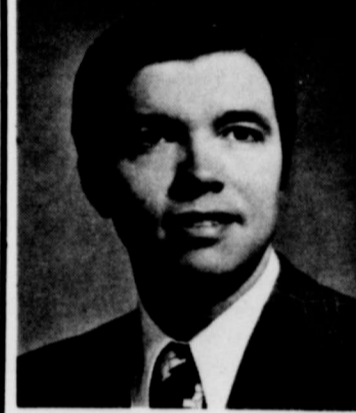

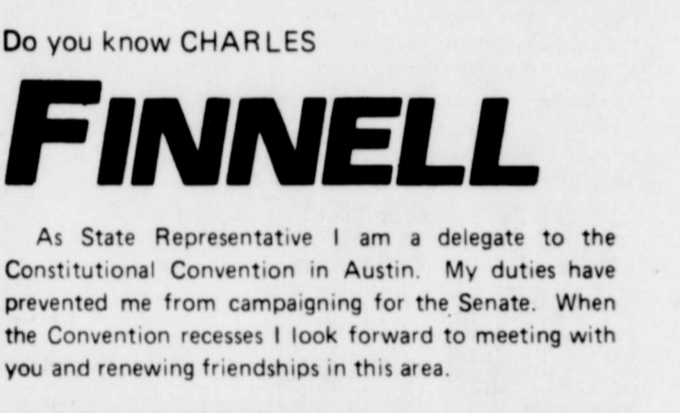

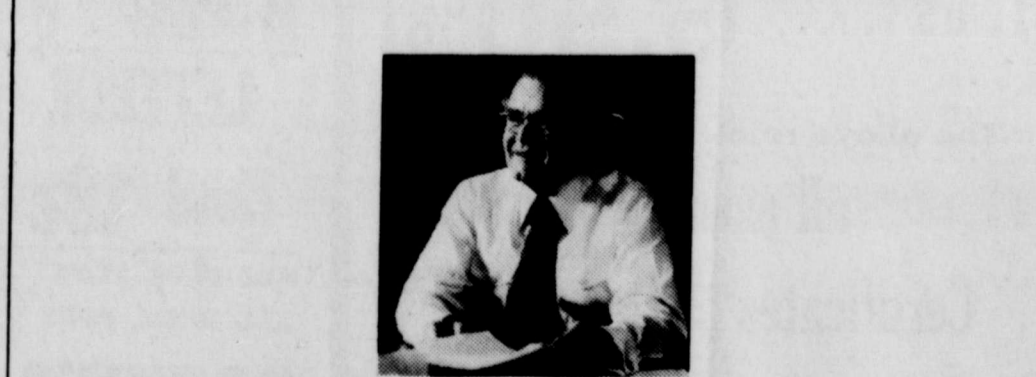
